WILL CHANGE HIS SCHEDULE.—The steamer Florida will not sail from Charlottetown on Friday next, but will leave on Tuesday, June 26th and every Tuesday thereafter, leaving Hawkebury on Wednesday mornings. She will sail from Boston on Saturday morning, leaving there at ten a. m., and arriving at Hawkebury Monday morning and Charlottetown the same evening. On Saturday, June 23, the steamer Olivette and Halifax will commence their regular summer tri-weekly schedule between Boston and Halifax. Both ships are in fine condition and prepared to make fast time the Halifax having just completed extensive alterations in all departments. The agents say that the outlook for a good tourist travel is excellent, as the inquiries received for information regarding the provinces is much larger than in previous seasons. DISTRICT MEETING.—At the Charlottetown Methodist District Meeting, at Pownall yesterday, representatives of the various conference committees were elected as follows: Stationing Committee, Rev. G. C. P. Palmer; Epworth League Committee, Rev. W. J. Howard; Missionary Committee, L. L. Beer, Esq.; Sunday School Committee, George Backham; Gouling Howard. Schedules were read setting forth the state of finances, membership, Sunday schools, church property, etc., of all circuits within the district. A resolution was passed recommending the conference to receive the Rev. B. Hedley Balderston of the Methodist Episcopal Church, his standing to be the same with us which he now holds in the Methodist Episcopal Church; and a resolution was also passed expressing the great sorrow of the brethren that the Chairman, Rev. THAT BICYCLE RACE. SIR.—A contribution about the famous bicycle race in THE EXAMINER of the 11th inst., signed "Psycho," was so utterly absurd as to be altogether unworthy of notice. But notwithstanding its absurdity and foolishness, a response to it and an emphatic endorsement has come from Mr. W. P. Doull. The stupidity of "Psycho's" complaints is only equalled by his extravagance when he mentions Messrs. Doull, Young and Rogers as "flyers." Unless he has reference to them in a future state, it is incomprehensible how he imagines them as being fast-wheeled on bicycles. Now, Mr. Editor, the bicycle championship app. E. Island was lost and won in a perfectly honest and legitimate way in the last race betwixt Moore and Davies. Davies held the championship of P. E. Island, which he had won in the regular and legitimate way in a regularly advertised race on the Charlottetown Driving Park, and held it until beaten by Moore. Now Moore holds the championship of P. E. Island. For it is a well established and duly recognized law, in all contests, that to defeat the champion is to win the championship. It is not necessary (as Doull, "Psycho" and "Charlottetownian" appear to think) to defeat every nerve and "petty" and most contemptible character in the world to become Mr. Doull to disparage Mr. Moore as the winner of the trophy, and his contemptuous reference to brute force is characteristically childish. Brute force! Pluck, courage and endurance, and intelligence rather did it and not brute force. But in the eyes of Mr. Doull the "laurels are petty" and the "cup of no value." How can laurels be "hard won" and "petty"? There is a certain species of fruit which Mr. Doull, "Psycho," etc., have been masticating, namely, sour grapes; and these appear to have left a very acid flavor on their teeth, for they are all on edge and plainly visible. COLUMBIA. GENTLEMEN VS. PROFESSIONALS. SIR.—All true lovers of sports and pastimes must feel grieved at the mercenary spirit manifested in the letters of our wheelmen that have appeared in public print. If our wheelmen were professionals no one could complain of their desire to gain money, or money's worth, by their trade; but as they pose as gentleman riders, or amateurs, the case is different. Amateurs from pure love of mainly sport compete for honors, and usually some small memento. In older times runners, wrestlers, &c., trained steadily for months and strained by long, arduous, and fatiguing races in order to gain a wreath of leaves. To-day "eleven" practice for months and afterwards travel perhaps hundreds of miles, to compete for honor and a cricket ball worth about two dollars, and sometimes fit out their boats at very large expenditure to compete for a pennant worth no more; amateur athletes walk, run, row, swim, play racquets, pitch quoits, &c., for cups, medals, the lower ribbons, &c., the symbolic value of which by far exceeds the intrinsic value. As symbols they are highly valued and kept as heirlooms—even though, intrinsically, they resemble a trade dollar. Therefore, it is becoming an amateur to speak with contempt of the "pewee mug," or to complain that the prize is, of itself, not sufficient remuneration for the labor expended to procure it. Those who desire to make money out of sport are professionals at least, and ought to be ruled out or expelled from every amateur club. AN AMATEUR.
