Chinese Ancestor-Worship.

Rev. D. D. Moore writes as follows from Singapore, Straits Settlement, East Indies:—
"Saturday night was a great one among the heathen Chinese. It was the conclusion of the annual feast connected with their ancestral-worship. One hundred thousand Chinese densely crowded the street where the brilliant festival was held. Fancy a long street, with tables extending over the sidewalks and well over them from end to end, these tables forming one long, broad stand, spread with white, and heaped, piled, bending with every Oriental meat, drink, fruit, sweet and luxury; scores of whole-roasted pigs; thousands of turkeys, chickens, ducks, quails, cooked in every form; pyramids, yards high of nuts, candies and fruits; tobaccos, wines, spirits, brandies, pies, huge iced cakes, ten thousands smaller. Brilliant gas decorations in form of crowns, crosses, words and letters (among them profusely V. R.) lighted up the wonderful scene; joss-sticks burning all over the expanse of the offerings; here and there, in brilliantly lighted porticos, Chinese Punch and Judy shows, Chinese opera composed of poor sold girls singing, and two open air stages, with their actors performing freely Chinese plays dressed gorgeously, dancing, singing and reciting to the passing crowd. Perfect order prevailed. Tall Seik and Punjaub-Sepoy, with many Malay police, lined the two streets. They took much notice of Rev. Dr. Lewing and myself, making always a passage for us through the crowd. This is all offered to their ancestors whom the Chinese highly venerate. Saturday night's feast was made by the opium and brandy farmers, an association something like our licensed victuallers, to whom is sold the right to do these businesses in the Straits settlement. The expense must have been enormous.

The spirits are supposed to partake of the sumptuous feast, supping upon its more ethereal essence, and are highly delighted at being remembered. There is a fine sentiment, apart from the idolatry, here, you see. These people have homes, married, it is true, by plurality of wives. But they are remarkable for the respect they pay to parents and elders. One of my Chinese friends told me that really a more evil feature was connected with this great feast. It is partly offered to evil spirits to propitiate them, especially to the devil, that he may be pleased with worship paid to him, and help the offerers to get very, very rich. When he has done this they worship him no more. Thus these poor darkened ones hope to delude the devil and cheat him.

We entered a much worse place. We also looked into opium dens. The confirmed opium smoker is a terrible sight. The Chinese quarters, that is the poorer parts of them, are full of vile stench. Only for our almost daily heavy showers, Singapore would always have fatal plagues.

An Occult Power.

A GEORGIA WOMAN POSSESSED OF A MARVELOUS FORCE—SIX STRONG MEN UNABLE TO LIFT HER FROM THE FLOOR.

(Hudson Wis. Despatch.)

The eighth wonder of the world, Mrs. Abbott, of Georgia, upon invitation of some of our prominent citizens, spent two days in the city and gave two exhibitions of her wonderful force and power. Many prominent citizens were on the stage, among whom were Mayor Dr. L. Wilkron, Judge Reid, Drs. Johnson, McIntyre, Thomas, William, Andrews, A. P. Goss, F. Cray, C. Getchell, J. B. Price and others.

Dr. Johnson says she is beyond doubt the most wonderful woman on this continent; that she possesses some power that is unknown and cannot be explained upon any principle of known laws or forces. Six of the strongest men could not lift her. She turned around and lifted them. Four men could not pull or push a stick off her open hands.

Again Drs. Johnson and McIntyre laid their hands between her's and the stick, while Judge Reid tried to pull it off, but it clung on as if riveted, but not the slightest pressure was felt against the gentleman's hands. She had the heaviest man sit one end of a pole and seven to swing on it to hold it down. When Dr. McIntyre placed his hand between hers and the stick she lifted the entire mass, but not the slightest pressure was felt against the doctor's hand.

A little boy was selected from the audience. He laid his hand on Mrs. Abbott's hand, when the little fellow was so thoroughly charged that they could not lift him from the floor. A glass or stick held against the little lady emitted a muffled vibratory noise not unlike a telephone sound. Many other tests were made. It was marvellous beyond conception and exceedingly interesting.

Mrs. Abbott is a very attractive lady, about 23 years of age, and weighs about 90 pounds. She is devoid of stage airs. She knows as little as the many hundreds who have made the tests as to what her strange force is.

News Notes.

The olive crop in Dalmatia has been ruined by a hailstorm.

The United States Government is spying on the railways to detect suspected breaches of the Interstate Commerce Act.

A new Dominion Line steamer is being built at Belfast. She will be the largest steamer built for the Montreal trade.

The Prince of Wales and the Austrian Emperor exchanged visits at Vienna yesterday, and the prince was banquetted in the evening.

Two hundred Jewish students, in order that they may remain in Russia, have renounced the Jewish faith and become Christians.

There was a collapse in the price of iron in the Glasgow market yesterday on the report that the strikers would be compelled to return to work.

The London Standard's correspondent at Rome states, on Vatican authority, that the Pope will decline to receive Dillon and O'Brien if they should visit that city.

Henry Kron and wife, who lived near Blairsville, Ind., quarrelled. The husband took a double-barrelled shot-gun and shot his wife in the presence of their three children and then shot the top off his own head.

At a public meeting in London, Engineer Barton submitted a plan for a tunnel under the Irish Channel. He estimates the work can be completed in twelve years at a cost of \$40,000,000. A committee was appointed to enquire into the scheme.

N. Bolet Boraza, Venezuela's prime minister at Washington, who is at present in New York, says that the reports of Venezuela being on the brink of a revolution are absolutely false. The country was never in a more peaceful condition.

Medical experts are interested in the case of Mrs. Wm. A. Maxson, of Trenton, N. J., who has recovered from hydrophobia after having reached the advanced stage wherein she barked and snapped like a dog, and required three men to hold her in her spasms.

O'Brien says he relies for support of the Irish nationalist mission to America on the Irish Roman Catholic archbishops of Chicago and St. Paul, and on the Irish American Catholic clergy in general. He also hopes for the sympathy of Cardinal Gibbons in his undertaking.

There is an interesting interview with Sir Charles Tupper in a recent issue of the London Pall Mall Gazette, one of the few English papers which go in for interviews with public men. Sir Charles, as Canadian High Commissioner, is asked in this interview the prospects for emigrants in Canada.

He replies that the Dominion wants settlers for the vacant lands, with capital if possible, but in all cases strong and industrious, able to take off their coats and be agriculturists in deed as well as in name. Other occupations, the professions, clerkships and employment for mechanics are already well supplied, if not overstocked. What is needed is a farming population to raise wheat and cattle for the British market, and the prospects for such are excellent. Sir Charles Tupper's views if rightly circulated, will certainly tend to stimulate the emigration to Canada of the right kind of persons.

It is said that Lord Dufferin has affected a complete understanding with Premier Crispi of Italy in regard to jurisdiction in the Red Sea territory. This is satisfactory. The question has been a rather difficult one. Italy and Britain have long been firm allies; there has been nothing up to lately to conflict with their separate interests; there has been very much of an obvious nature induce them to work together. But the Red Sea territory involves some difficulties. Italy's interests appeared to demand control of the coast up to Sussim, the most southerly littoral post occupied by Britain. This portion of the coast ceded to Italy, with it would go the trade back to Khartoum and the middle portion of the Nile valley. And with the trade it would be convenient to have the political control also. Italian rule here might be supposed to interfere with British influence, which has nominally extended, though not in actual fact, up the entire valley of the Nile. No doubt the nature of the adjustment made will shortly appear, and will probably be such that, while strengthening Italy's commercial and political position, will secure to Britain, through Italy's hold on Abyssinia, a more effective control of the Upper Nile and Central Africa.
