Work of the late Session

The following is a list of the Acts passed during the last session of the Dominion Parliament:—

Act to extend Act entitled Act respecting offences against persons and to repeal Act entitled Act to provide that persons charged with common assault shall be competent as witnesses.

Act respecting Credit Valley Railway Company.

Act to extend power of Manitoba South Western Colonization Railway Company and to further amend Act incorporating the said Company.

Act respecting Ontario Reformatory for Boys.

Act to repeal Act extending Dominion Land Act to British Columbia, and to make other provision with respect to certain public lands in that Province.

Act for relief of permanent Building Societies and Loan Companies.

Act to provide for winding up of La Banque Ville Marie.

Act to incorporate Great North Western Telegraph Co. of Canada

Act to authorize Corporation to Emerson to construct for passengers and traffic a Bridge over the Red River in the Province of Manitoba.

Act to amend Acts incorporating Montreal Telegraph Co.

Act to incorporate Pontiac and Pacific Junction Railway Co.

Act for appointment of resident representative agent for Canada, in the United Kingdom.

Act to amend the Act forty-second vic. chap. 15, entitled Act to alter duties of Customs and Excise.

Act for extending Consolidated Act, of 1879 respecting duties imposed on Promissory notes and bills of exchange to whole Dominion.

Act to enable Harbor Commissioners of Montreal to pay life annuity to widow of the late John Young.

Act to authorize raising of further sum to enable Quebec Harbor Commissioners to complete tidal dock.

Act to repeal Act 42nd vic. chap. 5, for granting annual subsidy toward certain telegraphic communications.

Act further to amend Act respecting harbor of Pictou, N. S.

Act respecting the reformatory for juvenile offenders, P. E. I.

Act respecting Industrial refuge for girls, Ontario.

Act to amend Acts respecting Canada Central Railway Company.

Act to authorize and provide for winding up Consolidated Bank of Canada.

Act to incorporate Assiniboine Bridge Co.

Act to incorporate Seuris and Rocky Mountain Railway Company.

Act to incorporate South Saskatchewan Valley Railway Company.

Act to amend and consolidate several Acts relating to North-West territories.

Act respecting administration of criminal justice in territory in dispute between Government of Province of Ontario and Dominion of Canada.

Act to amend Acts respecting Dominion notes.

Act to authorize making certain investigations under oath.

Act to amend loss of evidence in criminal cases as respects taking and use of depositions of persons who may be unable to attend at trial.

Act to amend Act respecting cruelty to animals.

Act to incorporate Nelsen Valley Railway and Transportation Company.

Act to amend General Inspection Act, 1874, and Act amending it.

Act to amend laws respecting removal of obstructions in navigable waters by wrecks.

Act respecting Montreal Assurance Company.

PITTSBURG, May 9.

James Campbell, employee of Fort Wayne R. R., has received a letter from his son William, now in Pennsylvania, which brings news that a son of James was captured by the Chilians in a raid, and after being subjected to various cruelties was tried and shot.

NEW YORK, May 9.

Mary Anderson, aged 28, died of starvation in a 2nd Avenue tenement yesterday. She had been sick and had neither medicine nor nourishment.

The North German Lloyd's steamship "Strasburg" arrived yesterday with 1000 emigrants, among whom small-pox had broken out during the voyage. One of the passengers died.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., May 9.

An extraordinary story is published here from Franklinton. It is stated a negro and white man, while examining the body of a lady who died two days before, were accosted by the woman when the lid of the coffin was raised. They had intended to steal the jewelry from her person, and fled in fright. When they returned she asked to be assisted home, and is now recovering.

CHICAGO, May 9.

An unnatural murder was committed by James Tobin, a boss slaveholder, last night, his own daughter being the victim. He went home partially intoxicated, and turned his family out of the house during a terrible thunder storm, which was raging, because his wife refused to go for beer for him and a friend who was with him.

Later his daughter, Mollie, a girl of 17, ventured back, and he sent her out with five dollars to buy a valise, saying he was going to pack up his things and leave his family for ever. She got the valise and returned, but had neglected to provide a key. This so enraged the unnatural parent that he tore the lock to pieces and ordered Mollie to return the valise and get back its price. She went into an adjoining room, but he, suspecting she was not obeying orders, followed and dragged her back by the hair of the head, and threw her violently on the floor. He then jumped on her breast with his knees, and began pounding her, she crying "Oh, father, do not kill me."

When he stopped, a Mrs. Robinson, who had been calling for help, assisted Mollie into the next room, but blood came frothing to her lips, and she died in a few minutes. Tobin was arrested.

DUBLIN, May 9.

A deputation of the Mansion House Relief committee waited on Mr. Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, on Saturday, to call attention to the continued distress in Ireland. Lord Mayor Gray said the distress was not likely to be mitigated before the end of July, and as the committee had no reason to hope that their resources would suffice until then they left the matter in the hands of the Government. The Mayor read telegrams from Clifden, Galway County, stating that if relief was not given immediately the people would die by the score. Mr. Forster replied that the Government fully recognized the extent of distress, and added: "We are doing our utmost to alleviate the suffering, by means of loans to landlords. Subsequently a deputation from the Canadian committee asked Mr. Forster to urge upon the Government the necessity of directing the Lords of the Treasury to advance funds for the construction of fishing piers, etc." Mr. Forster said they had made a strong case and he would lay it before the Government.

BRUSSELS, May 9.

In the Chamber of Representatives the whole bill prolonging the operation of the law relating to the treatment of foreigners in Belgium was, yesterday, adopted. The law will be applied to Jesuits from France, as it was to the religious bodies expelled from Germany.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 9.

"Agence Russe" denies that the Russian Government has addressed a circular to its representatives abroad dwelling on the peaceful tendency of the Russian policy.

The appointment of M. DeCrais as Minister at Brussels is gazetted.

Peace prevails throughout the Republic and business is good. There has been a considerable increase in exports, mostly in Europe. The Government finances have greatly improved. The Presidential question has taken another complexion. General Ignacio Majair, formerly Secretary of War under Jaurez and Lerzo, has been proclaimed a candidate. The partisans of all weak candidates are flocking to his support. It is believed he will unite a large majority of suffrages.
