

# Airliner Was Afire Before Taking Off On Fatal Flight

CHICAGO (AP) — Passengers testified Monday that during a stop at Wichita, Kan., they had seen a fire in the left engine of an airliner which crashed here Sunday, killing 22 persons.

Several of the less seriously hurt passengers gave their versions of the ill-fated flight at an inquest.

Daniel L. Haas of Park Ridge, Ill., said he was seated next to the forward left window of the Grand Airways twin-engine Convair.

"Just before the plane left the ground at Wichita," he said, "a

flash fire developed in the left engine. This was quickly extinguished by mechanics on the field, and we took off for Kansas City."

The plane, carrying 40 passengers and a crew of three, struck an electric sign just outside the northwest corner of Midway airport, then smashed through a fence and cartwheeled to a skidding upside down stop a half mile inside the airport. Twenty-one persons were injured.

John Edward Foust of Youngstown, Ohio, recounted how stewardess Mary Teel had told passengers to fasten their seat belts for a landing, and added: "I hope I see you again soon." She died in the crash.

Coroner Walter E. McCarron, conducting the inquest, said "the plane should never have attempted the landing."

**Big Movie Deal**

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—In perhaps the largest cash deal in movie history, industrialist Howard Hughes Monday sold RKO studio and its assets to General Tire and Rubber Company—making the latter a new giant in the entertainment industry.

The price: \$25,000,000 in cash. The deal was announced after days of secret negotiations between Hughes and Thomas J. O'Neil, vice-president of the rubber firm and head of Mutual News and General Telradco Inc., companies controlled by General Tire.

Under the agreement the new RKO owners acquire control of 400 to 600 of its old films, which presumably will be shown on its television network.

The announcement by Hughes' public relations firm said it is believed "the largest single financial transaction in the motion picture industry and one of the largest cash sales by an individual in the history of American finance."

The contract was signed today and General's cheque for \$25,000,000 will change hands July 25.

Hughes was sole owner of the studio, the first such owner in Hollywood history.

The sale involves RKO's Hollywood studio and a distribution company; studios in New York City and facilities in Mexico City; 101 domestic and foreign motion picture exchanges; the facilities of RKO Pathe Inc. and RKO Television Inc., but not RKO Pictures Corp.

# Duke Sponsors Study Of Young People's Problems

LONDON (Reuters)—The Duke of Edinburgh is sponsoring a conference next year to study "the human problems that industrialization creates," it was announced Monday.

Some 200 persons from Britain and Commonwealth countries will gather at Oxford next summer for the conference.

The Duke, in a statement published Monday, stressed that the conference is not for research workers, but "for young people actually engaged in industry."

His aim, he said, is to help ensure that ultimately throughout the Commonwealth, "industrial enterprises are so organized that they form an integral part of a happy and healthy community."

COUNCIL SET UP

A year ago the Duke called a meeting of industrial and trade union leaders, and this group set up a council of 48 men and two women to arrange the conference.

The conference would conduct "a practical study of the human aspects of industrialization," but this would not include "matters which come within the normal scope of industrial negotiation."

Its central theme would be the question of how the benefits of industrial development can be reconciled with personal needs, and "how can the life of a community assimilate the changes which accompany a technical and economic revolution?"

Conference spokesmen estimated that Canada might send "rather more than 25" people to the conference, but said no precise figures could yet be given.

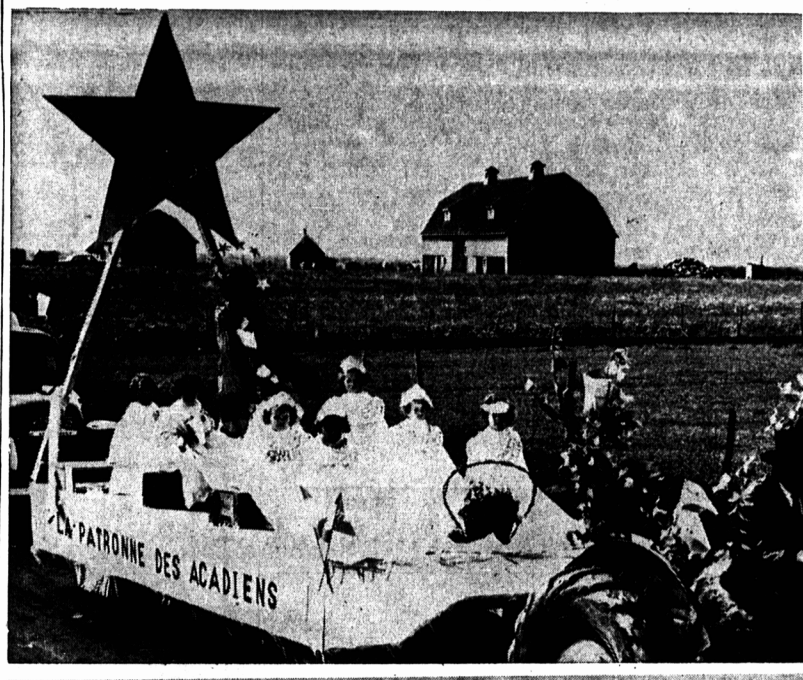

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# Let's Talk It Over

Some people drive a car as if they were playing Russian roulette. In the Russian game the odds are 6 to 15 you will survive. In comparatively quiet street corners the odds are much better that some drivers take a chance. In Summerside there is a blind corner where Summer and Convent Streets intersect, and twice in a week we had to jump on the brakes to avoid a collision. Cars travelling north on Summer Street and swinging west into Convent, instead of making a wide turn took short cuts with our car, approaching the stop sign, directly in their path. Fortunately on both occasions we were not quite up to the corner, or a collision could scarcely have been avoided. On both occasions, flaming youth was enthroned behind the wheel. . . .

Having this happen twice within a week was rather startling, but we figure the law of averages will take care of us now for a long time at that particular corner. Not being an addict of the "Russian roulette" gamble, however, we'll keep an eye open just the same. We still think a thorough grounding of "safety first" principles in the schools — not just mentioning those things occasionally — not holding a "Safety First" week once a year — but taking a few minutes every day of every week of the school year to hammer home the desirability of always playing it safe could be worth while. It could be a part of the health exercises for nothing plays puck with the health so quickly as being run over by a car.
