The Aces have pulled this "up-to-the-floor-and-out" act more than once this year, but this time it was a case of too little and too late. This rousing finish did help the customers to get their money's worth, however.

For two periods the boys were outplayed by S. D. U. fair job goals as well as a fair job. The forward lines were doing fairly well but couldn't turn the trick often enough to make up for a shaky defence. Something usually went wrong with the Aces attacks at the last split second, and when they did click for a scoring play, the townsmen, getting himself in the way. The Ace defence, which has played a lot of good hockey this year, never was worse than on Wednesday night. In those first two periods the Forum management could have charged them the regular price of admission to see the game without being taken up for extortion. TV Reception Reported In P.E.I.

Television pictures are being clearly received in at least two places in P.E.I. from the newly opened station in Saint John, N.B. It was learned yesterday that a television receiver installed in Jelly's department store in O'Leary, by Mr. George Matheson, who is in charge of the radio department of that firm, has been receiving pictures from the Saint John station since Tuesday evening.

Their receiver is using a temporary 26-foot antenna, while waiting for one of 40 feet in height which has been ordered.

At Ralph Calbeck's general store in Central Bedeque, the manager of the radio department, Mr. Arthur Murray, last evening completed alterations to the antenna located on top of the store, and was successful in receiving a continuous and good clear picture. In North River last evening Mr. Wendell Mayhew, of Mayhew's Radio Service, was busy erecting a 40-foot antenna on the roof of his home, after the encouragement of receiving sound without picture from an antenna located inside the house.

Mr. Mayhew has been experimenting with a television receiver for almost a year at his radio service building in Crapaud, and previous to the opening of the Saint John station had intermittently received sound on several occasions.
