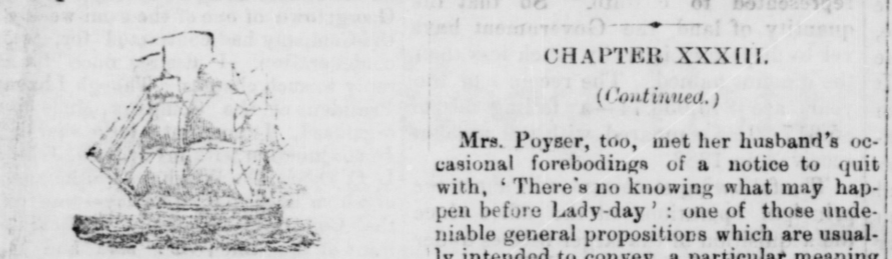

cheek and neck and arms, by the liquid depths of her beseeching eyes, or the sweet childish pout of her lips. For the beauty of a lovely woman is like music; what can one say more? LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

The Temperance Question in the East.

Sir,—As it is some time since anything was written to you on the Temperance question from this vicinity, a few words now might not be out of place.

About two years ago a great temperance agitation sprang up in this village and adjoining country, on account of an unfortunate man who lost his life through the vile decoctions known as liquor, sold in some of our taverns. Public meetings were held, strong resolutions were adopted, vigilance committees were formed, money was subscribed, and active measures taken for the suppression of the unlawful traffic. But mountains of obstacles had to be overcome, as many of our magistrates and law-givers are in direct sympathy with the traffic, or indirectly interested in its profits, and men who had sworn to uphold our laws witnessed their daily violation. However, one obstacle after another was overcome, the great majority of the people worked with a will, and, backed by the clergy of all denominations, they did a noble work. One step after another was taken. Souris was twice invaded by the sturdy yeomanry of the country, headed by brawny constables of their own choosing, and aided and encouraged by the law-and-order-abiding citizens. Tavern doors were broken in, their contents confiscated, and their keepers sent to jail. Rum was subdued, Temperance triumphed, and a quiet and soberness prevailed through the village unknown to this generation. Old toppers hunted for their allowance in vain, and returned home sober to the joy of their families, temptation was removed out of the way of the young, and Temperance people were rejoicing that the millennium for which they had so long strived had at length arrived.

But just at this instance, when rum was prostrate, when its votaries were turning their attention to a new branch of industry, viz., stealing the tools of two blacksmiths who were actively engaged against them, the Canada Temperance Act came into force, taking the business out of the hands of the people, and transferring it to officers well paid for its enforcement. The Vigilance Committee, finding these officers in the field paid for the work which they had done gratuitously, with no pay but the ill-will of the rum-seller and his hirelings, gradually withdrew from the conflict, and left all in the hands of the Inspectors. And what is the result? One after another of the rum shanties opened out; new ones followed in quick succession, till to-day there are more selling liquor in Souris—selling it openly, than ever before was known in its history.

The chief inspector (now I see happily, and I hope worthily superseded) never visited us at all, though I suppose he did not forget to draw his pay, while the assistant inspector who lives near here, though visiting and enforcing the law in other sections, did little or nothing in this vicinity, though informed many times, and seeing proofs every day of the gross violation of the law.

Though the Canada Temperance Act has been declared *ultra vires*, I see that it is still to be the law of the land. I suppose till it is adopted or rejected by a higher legal tribunal than our Dominion affords; however, while it is law, the law-abiding people of this vicinity, and they are in an overwhelming majority, wish some better enforcement of its provisions than has been attempted here for the last year.
