SCOTT ACT.—At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, John J. Trainor was, on complaint of R. H. Crawford, Prosecutor, fined \$100 and costs for a breach of the Canada Temperance Act.

THE Halifax City Council has rescinded its former resolution and decided to ask the legislature to pass an act authorizing it to collect \$50 for each vessel license and \$100 for each tavern, hotel, or shop license.

THE CANADIAN RUBBER CO.—The public generally have no conception of the large proportions to which the business of the Canadian Rubber Company, of Montreal, has arrived. Its sales in the month of November last amounted to the sum of \$250,000, and the amount in February, just past, were 40 per cent. in excess of the sales in the same month of 1883. The daily production is 4,500 pair of hands. The daily production is 4,500 pair of hands, \$5,000 are expended annually for latex, and 4,000 tons of coal are consumed in the factory every year.

Mr. Matthew Arnold lectured on the 21st at the Royal Institution, London, on Emerson. A brilliant audience crowded the hall, and the speaker was generously applauded. The discourse was largely a repetition of his American lecture, supplemented by allusions to his recent tour in America and his impression of that country and its people. "There is a good deal of crudeness in America," the speaker said, "but I was more struck with what had been achieved in the development of the country, its resources, and its culture than with what had been left untouched." To the crudeness of the people he attributed his partial failure. In his concluding remarks Mr. Arnold made reference to "my dearly loved America; great, intelligent, avicious America."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

Fighting the Rebels.

LONDON, March 27.

Despatches from Gen. Graham says the British advanced to-day to Tamaniab, and burned the village. The Arabs fled and the fighting is ended. The British forces began to advance on Tamaniab at five in the morning. Firing at half past seven was brisk on both sides. The rebels were in larger numbers than yesterday. The English cavalry and mounted infantry led the attack and drove the rebels from the rocks, dispersing them among the hills. There were no British casualties. The loss of rebels is unknown.

Parnell Predicts a Dissolution of Parliament.

DUBLIN, March 27.

The Freeman's Journal publishes an interview with Mr. Parnell. The House of Lords, Mr. Parnell believes, will reject the new Franchise Bill. The result will be a dissolution of Parliament, and an appeal to the country. The Government, he says, is dependent, in committee of the whole, upon the Irish vote for a majority. The raising of a general fund is contemplated to meet the exigencies of the Parnellites.

Gen. Graham and the Rebels.

LONDON, March 27.

The latest news from Gen. Graham says the rebels fired on the British troops from the rocks on the left. The cavalry dislodged them and advanced to within a hundred yards of Tamaniab. As soon as Gen. Graham came up with the infantry and guns, shells were thrown among the flying Arabs, and exploded close to them. On reaching Tamaniab the men and horses made for the wells and slacked their thirst, and afterwards the cavalry went out to the right and left of the village. The village forthwith was burned to the ground.

The Campaign in Egypt Ended.

LONDON, March 27.

Gen. Graham will explore the region in neighborhood of the wells of Tamaniab, and then return with the whole force to Suakin. The campaign is at an end.

Gen. Graham Ordered Home.

LONDON, March 27.

Orders have been sent to Gen. Graham to return immediately with his troops.

Barnum's White Elephant.

NEW YORK, March 27.

Barnum paid duty to-day on his sacred white elephant, the value sworn to being £40,000, or \$200,000.

Gladstone Recovered.

LONDON, March 27.

It is announced that Gladstone has recovered his usual good health, and will return to Parliament on Monday next.

The Rising Waters.

NEW ORLEANS, March 27.

A despatch from St. Martinsville says the water is rising rapidly. Many families have abandoned their homes. The outlook is discouraging, and everybody is preparing for the worst.

The Ontario Bribery Case.

OTTAWA, March 27.

Further hearing in the case of Wilkinson and Kirkland took place at Toronto, to-day. Nothing new was brought out. Mr. H. P. Dwight, Montreal, manager of the G. N. W. Telegraph Company was called by the Crown, but he refused to divulge telegrams.

Dominion Political Notes.

OTTAWA, March 27.

The House of Commons were employed to-day in considering the expediency of amending the Act respecting the treatment and relief of sick and distressed mariners. Bills amending the Customs Act of 1883, and a bill amending the Act respecting certificates of Masters and Mates was passed through committee.

A long discussion was indulged in on the Northwest. The House then went into supply.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

THURSDAY, March 27.

The bill, respecting Liquor Licenses, was passed and sent to the Legislative Council for their concurrence.

The Provincial Treasurer's Accounts for the year 1882 were submitted by Hon. Mr. Ferguson, and were referred to the Committee on Public Accounts.

A message from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor was received and read by Mr. Speaker, transmitting to the House copies of despatches, minutes of Council, reports and other documents relating to the subject of the claim of the Government of the Province against the Government of the Dominion for the construction and maintenance of piers in the public harbors and navigable waters of this Province; and also for a refund of the amount expended by the Government of this Province for such services from July 1st, 1873, to December 31st, 1883.

The despatches and documents alluded to in message were read by the Clerk, and laid on the table of the House.

The Legislative Council, by their Clerk, announced that they had passed several Bills sent to them by the House for their concurrence.

Hon. Mr. SULLIVAN presented a Bill to incorporate "The Charlottetown Water Works Company," which was received and read the first time, and referred to the Private Bill Committee to report thereon.

Hon. Mr. McLEOD presented a Bill to be entitled "An Act to protect Wild Fowl," which received the first reading and referred to the House in Committee of the Whole to-morrow.

At four o'clock this afternoon, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor came to the Council Chamber, and gave his assent to the Bill intitled "An Act respecting Liquor Licenses."
