How Can I... By Anne Ashley

Q. How can I keep mashed potatoes light and fluffy? A. Before adding the milk to mashed potatoes, it should always be heated. This is even more important to remember during the winter months, because then the milk is so cold and the potatoes are chilled by it, therefore becoming heavy in texture. Q. How can I hasten the work of pressing woollens? A. When a damp cloth is used for pressing woollens, be sure to wring the cloth out of warm water, not cold. Cold water will only cool the iron more quickly and prolong the job. Q. How can I clean the tiles in the bathroom? A. Use a soft cloth dipped into kerosene for cleaning tiles in the bathroom or kitchen. Then wash the tiles with warm water and wipe dry with a soft cloth.
