**POLITICAL MEETING
 AT ST. MARY'S ROAD.**

The joint political meeting held at St. Mary's Road on Oct. 25th, resolved itself into a Conservative demonstration.
 The new Attorney-General tried to uphold the conduct of the Brit government in a long speech. But the great bulk of his argument was praise of his own works. He tried to force the people to believe that the Farquharson Government is making ends meet.
 Mr. Prowse, the Conservative candidate was received with great applause. He pointed out that our finances are in a wretched condition as is shown by the public accounts. The debt has increased since the Liberals came into power from \$154,000 to \$600,000, and the interest we pay has increased from about \$3,000 to \$18,000 under liberal rule.
 The speech of Mr. Cyrus Shaw, who was the next speaker, was interesting and to the point. He showed on good authority that our debt was about \$600,000 no \$483,000 as Mr. McKinnon had said. He completely scattered Mr. McKinnon's strongest points of argument; he even showed that Mr. McKinnon was at one time in favor of receiving money to pay our debt instead of the railroad for Murray Harbor and Belfast; for the (Mr. McKinnon) voted for the resolution providing that all our claims should be submitted to arbitration.
 Mr. McKinnon, the new Attorney-General tried to refute the statement that he had voted for the resolution that all our claims should be submitted to arbitration. But his attempt was vain and unsuccess-
 ful.
 Mr. McKinnon, when asked about the date of the election was in blissful ignorance. When asked about the terms of the agreement made at Moncton between the representatives of the Farquharson Government and the Hon. A. G. Blair, concerning the construction of the bridge across the Hillsborough, he refused to give any satisfaction to the electors.
 Mr. Alex. Martin, M. P., who spoke next said that he saw no sign of either the railway or the bridge, except that the government have hired a scow (which cost \$15) for \$15 a day, and of course they are surveying the river in order to get a few votes. Mr. Martin also pointed out that the railroad which the Brits say they are going to build is not as long as the road which the Conservatives had estimated to build.
 The order was perfect and all the speakers received a good hearing. At the close of the meeting a hearty vote of thanks was extended to the chairman, Mr. B. McGaugan, to which he fittingly replied.

ARTILLERY DUEL CONTINUES

Lieut Egerton Wounded—Casualties at Dundee
 The following were received last evening too late for insertion in THE EXAMINER:
 LONDON, Nov. 2.—Nothing is known here of the report circulated in New York of a great British victory at Ladysmith.
 LONDON, Nov. 2.—The War Office this afternoon issued the following despatch:—
 LADYSMITH, Nov. 2.—Lieut Egerton, of H. M. S. Powerful, was dangerously wounded this morning by a shell. His life is not in danger at present.
 It is inferred from this despatch that the artillery duel between the Boers and the British continues, as Lieut. Egerton was a gunnery Lieutenant.
 LONDON, Nov. 2.—A special despatch from Ladysmith says:—
 Twenty British dead and one hundred wounded have been counted on the scene of Monday's disaster, while 870 prisoners were sent to Pretoria.
 The War Office officially declares that it has no information of any further engagement at Ladysmith or of a British victory as reported in New York.
 Another list of the casualties at Dundee was issued by the War Office this morning. It gives eighty-two non-commissioned officers and men of the Dublin Fusiliers indicating that the Boers captured as many Fusiliers as they did Hussars.
 CAPE TOWN, Nov. 2.—Grave anxiety is felt here regarding the situation at Ladysmith.
 If the Boers should destroy the bridge at Coleenso, General White would be isolated.
 General White, it is believed, would abandon Ladysmith if it were not for the stores there. These amount to about one half of the total British stores in South Africa.
 When they were placed there it was not dreamed that the town was to be besieged.
 LADYSMITH, Nov. 2.—The Boers have unmasked new batteries, which are easily silenced only to break out again when the British fire slackens.
 It is thought the bombardment which is not serious is designed simply to attract attention while Boers are being moved to the rear of the town.
 The Naval Brigade has now four long-range guns mounted.


