

Last Manchu Emperor Now Studys Marxism In Prison

 PUSHUN, China (Reuters)—Pu Yi, last of the Manchu emperors who as an infant was recognized as the ruler of all China, is studying Marxism during his imprisonment here.

When I visited him Thursday it was the first time Pu Yi had spoken to an Englishman for more than 20 years. He had not been interviewed since being proclaimed puppet emperor of Manchuria under Japanese protection in 1934.

Pu Yi, a portly-looking figure, said his past behavior had been that of the devil and only now is he living like a human being. Pu Yi is 50 but at times looks 40, his young face still retaining its sensitivity.

He started speaking slowly but gained confidence, especially when confessing his "sins," as he told for the first time the story of his disappearance 11 years ago. The mystery of his whereabouts ended last month when he gave evidence at the trial of Japanese war criminals.

This is the story Pu Yi told in reply to questions:

On Aug. 18, 1945, he was at an airport at Shenyang (Mukden) with two senior Japanese officers. They were on their way to Japan but Pu Yi said he "managed to signal to a general behind their backs that I wanted to stay in China."

The next day he was flown to Chita in Siberia, where he stayed for a month and then was moved to Habarovsk (Chinese name Ball) where he was imprisoned for about five years.

In August, 1950, Pu Yi was handed over to Chinese Communists. Since then, except for a short period in Harbin, he has been kept at Fushun.

The Chinese have treated him as an ordinary prisoner, and he said, "I shouldn't be regarded as a former head of state as I was a traitor to China and helped the Japanese to carry out their aggressive policy."

"I was surprised at the lenient treatment I received on returning to China," he said.

11 YEARS IN PRISON

He did not know if, or when, he would be tried, and said he did not think it unjust that he had now been in prison for 11 years without trial. He said he had received everything he had deserved and would do everything he could to help in the socialist construction of China.

The ex-emperor, who once lived in lavish apartments in the forbidden city, now shares a room with 14 other prisoners who treat him as one of themselves.

For two hours he talked, mostly repeating his admission of past crimes and confessing the error of his ways in a room which contained portraits of the two men who had imprisoned him — Stalin and Mao Tse-tung.

As he rose to leave, he bowed to me and to the three officers who had sat silently through the interview and whose grandfathers would have prostrated themselves in his presence.

4:41 a.m., the latest hour in at least 20 years.

The opposition counter-attack of block and delay was to challenge the legality, under House rules, of nearly every government move. Each time the chair upheld the government. Twenty-five rulings by the chair were challenged, voted on and upheld. Altogether an unprecedented 70 votes were taken during the bill's passage.

NOTABLE SIDELIGHTS

There were side developments to the battle.

Stanley Fleming (PC—Toronto Eglinton) on May 25 defied an order by Chairman W. A. Robinson to be seated and was suspended on a motion by the government for the rest of the day. It was the first such occurrence in 19 years.

Mr. Drew said he would seek to have Mr. Robinson censured. Instead, he proposed a motion charging the government with subordinating the office of Commons chairman to serve its own partisan interests. The motion was ruled out of order.

The debate also produced a departure in Conservative ranks. Carl Nickle (PC—Calgary South) backed the pipeline bill down the line. He told reporters he would not seek reelection.

Stanley Knowles (CCF—Winnipeg North Centre) charged Mr. Nickle with having a pecuniary interest in the measure. Mr. Nickle, a wealthy oil man and publisher of periodicals on the gas and oil industry, denied the allegation. The matter ended there.

LOANS TO FARMS

Early in the session the government required 12 days to get passage of a bill which ratified government action begun in November, to guarantee bank loans of up to \$150,000 five per cent interest on farm-stored grain. All three opposition parties argued at length that the Canadian Wheat Board should instead provide interest-free cash advances.

There was no opposition, however, to a bill to permit the government to levy a year's storage charges on wheat carryovers in excess of 178,000 bushels at the Aug. 1 start of each crop year. It meant a \$32,000,000 payment for the 1955-56 year.

Parliament also approved the first trade agreement ever signed with Russia. Russia agreed to buy a minimum 44,000,000 bushels of wheat during its three-year term. The budget presented by Finance Minister Harris March 20 cut a small \$12,000,000 from government income by freeing a scaling of special-use rice from the 10-per-cent sales tax. It forecast a peacetime record of \$4,650,000,000 in budget spending and a \$113,000,000 surplus for the year ending next March 31.

There were a few other changes in the budget, notably the announcement of a new excise tax of 20 per cent starting next Jan. 1 on gross advertising revenues of special Canadian editions of foreign magazines—those carrying Canadian advertisements not appearing in the magazine's domestic edition.

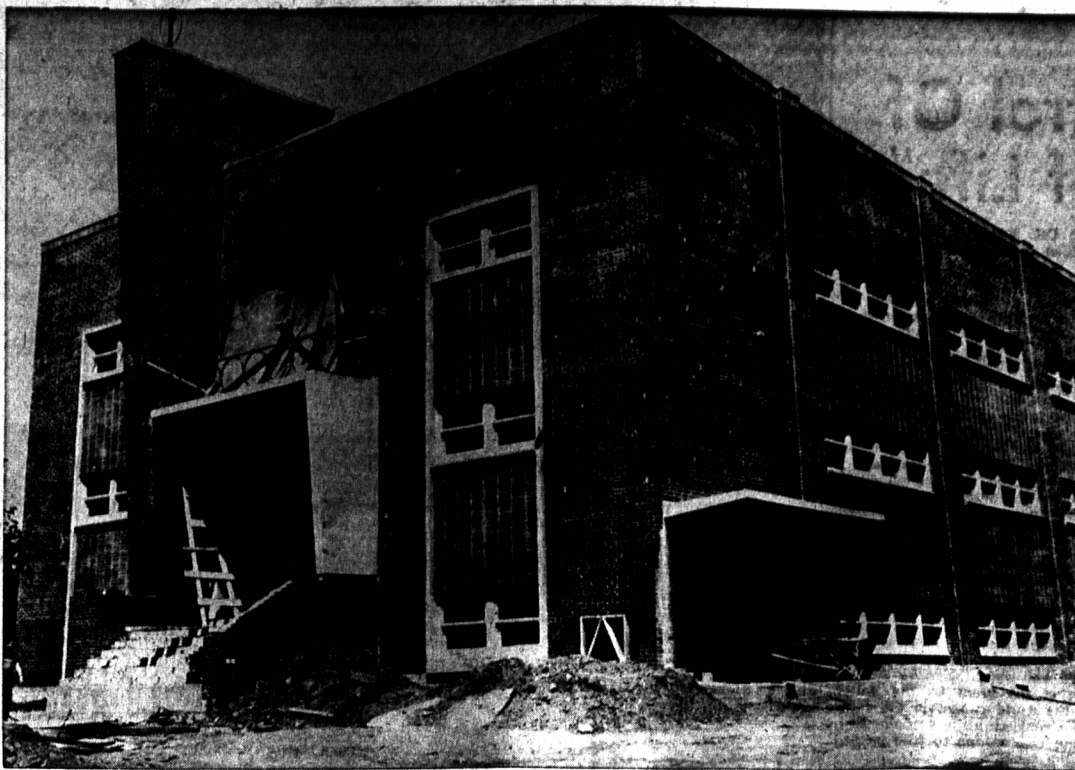

THE NEW CIVIC AUDITORIUM HAS MANY FEATURES

The new civic auditorium will be ready for use in about one month, and some 30 men are presently busy in completing the project which will give Summerside a very fine civic building with a modern auditorium, large enough to provide seating accommodation for about 1,200 persons, and facilities for kitchen services, a public library, rooms for small assemblies and showers.

The main floor of the auditorium measuring 80 by 60 will seat 1,000 persons on chairs that can quickly be removed for indoor sporting activities, banquets etc.

A balcony, overhead at the entrance to the auditorium, together with overhead walks extending along both inside walls of the auditorium at mezzanine level, will provide accommodation for at least another 200 persons, and will also serve as an excellent vantage point for basketball games, etc.

In addition to ticket wickets, the south end of the building also contains kitchen facilities, and a room for the storage of chairs.

The stage measures 25 by 44 feet. The ceiling of the new auditorium is of the latest steel acoustic tile having special sound absorption and insulation qualities.

The basement or ground floor contains boiler rooms, dressing rooms, showers, a large room for use as a public library, a librarians office, a large room for meetings or youth activities, and two rooms for small meetings or assemblies.

The building which will cost in the vicinity of \$225,000.00 is of steel frame construction, with concrete slab, thermocrete block interior, and outside brick wall construction. The M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. are the general contractors.
