MONTREAL (CP) - Industrials cooled off from their mid-afternoon surge but still closed with a solid increase on index Tuesday after an active session on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges.
Banks, utilities and papers also had gains in a day that saw the market catch the trend in New York and run upward about an hour before closing. Advances outnumbered declines two to one.
Nickel closed with an increase of 2 1/2. Other gains in base metals were 1/2 to Noranda and 1/4 to Consolidated M and S.
Steels weakened late after a mainly inactive session with Standard Structural falling off 1/2 at 19 1/2.
M and O was the only paper with a change outside of fractions making 1 1/2 at 32. Texaco had an increase of 2 1/2. 53 to lead a strong pipelines and oils section.
Utilities made an index gain on the strength of a series of small fractional increases. Biggest changes were in Quebec Phone, down 2 at 30, and Canadian International Power, up 1/4 at 14 1/4.
Producing mines had solid gains to Falcon, Ventures and McIntyre while speculators stayed up in a narrow range.
Volumes were 92,100 industrials and 378,000 mines and oils.
Closing averages showed banks up .65 at 60.58, utilities up .1 at 143.5, industrials up 1.8 at 315.6, combined up 1.2 at 258.2, papers up 2.6 at 453.4 and golds off .15 at 78.65.
Of 247 issues traded, 102 advanced, 50 declined and 95 were unchanged. There were two new yearly highs and four new yearly lows.

TORONTO

TORONTO (CP) - The stock market, for the eighth consecutive day, struck higher levels amid some of the heaviest trading in two weeks Tuesday.
Base metals were up 2 1/2 points on index, while western oils advanced nearly a point.
The only loser was golds, dropping several decimal points.
Mines had a good day with senior base metals ploughing ahead. McIntyre-Purcupine went up 1 1/2 at 89 to lead gold issues, while International Nickel rose two points to 104 1/2. Earlier it set a new high when it reached 105 1/2. Senior uraniums rambled around at lower levels all day. Algom fell 1/4 and closed at 11, while Consolidated Denison lost five cents at \$9.95. Gunnar was unchanged at \$9.60.
Western oils also enjoyed one of their better days. Hudson's Bay recorded a 1/2 increase at 11 1/2 to top the list. Other changes moved in the 10-25 cent range with gains well ahead of losses.
