Reviews Record-Breaking Year In Swine Production

During the past year the swine industry in this Province has reached a production level which breaks all previous records, reports Mr. H. W. Clay, senior livestock fieldman, Federal Department of Agriculture, at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Swine Breeders Association last night.

An all-time high of 97,574 head of market hogs were shipped to inspected packing plants at an approximate value of \$5,000,000. This, together with the number slaughtered on the farms for home and village consumption and the number of weaning pigs shipped to other provinces, makes the annual value of the industry close to \$6,000,000.

"When we consider this figure and when we know that swine production rarely has involved our farmers in financial difficulties," Mr. Clay said, we should agree that this industry is not far from being the most important in the Province.

Fisheries Delegates Leave For Ottawa

Mr. John B. Myrick, Tignish, director of Fisheries Council of Canada, and Mr. Lorne L. Noonan, Charlottetown, Vice-President Prince Edward Island Fisheries Federation, are leaving today for Ottawa where they will attend the sixth annual convention of the Fisheries Council of Canada, which is to be held at the Chateau Laurier on March 19, 20, and 21st.

Other prominent speakers will be Charles E. Jackson, General Manager National Fisheries Institute of Washington, D. C.; Mr. M. B. Buryse, Trade Commissioner (Fisheries) Department Trade and Commerce, New York; and Dr. G. B. Reed, Chairman Fisheries Research Board. Matters of general interest to be discussed at the convention will include export trade, research, conservation, inspection, and other Allied subjects.

meeting. This is a decrease in rate from the present 3.25 percent, but will be offset by the new assessments which are now being completed by the Assessment Board.

This by-law, together with one in regard to the installment payment of civic assessments will be given third reading at a special meeting of the Council this morning at 9 o'clock.

Police Estimates The estimates voted yesterday provide for an increase of approximately 10 percent for the entire staff of the police force and provisions are contained in a letter which was read to the meeting by Coun. Cox, chairman of the Police Committee. The text of his letter was as follows: "At a meeting of our Committee held on Wednesday afternoon, the following recommendations were made with a view to increasing the efficiency of our department: A general increase of approximately 10% in pay and promotion in rank where most deserved. 'In view of Sergeant Higgin's 27 years of faithful service, we felt some recognition should be made and we suggest a step up to Deputy Chief. 'Sergeant Mrlanis, with 15 years of faithful service, to Staff Sergeant. 'Corporal Lund, who has made a remarkable comeback and is doing good work as investigator, be

P.E.I. Capital For Local Industries Urged By Premier

"If those with the capital on Prince Edward Island were as keen on investing in industries here as they are in investing in Alberta oil and Ontario gold, this Province would be well off," stated Premier J. Walter Jones last Thursday during the debate on the Draft Address in the Legislature.

"I do not know why some one does not invest in locker storage here," he stated. He told the House that he had been talking to a young man who operated a locker storage plant in Sussex and that it was a profitable business.

He was speaking on the cold storage plant here and stated that it could quite easily show a profit. "I believe that if we lost \$25,000 a year on it, the Province would still profit by it."

"Through it we can bring in new industries. With regard to smelts he noted that 800,000 pounds had been stored here last year and that these smelts were bringing 7 cents a pound on the New York market at the peak of the prices. "And this industry is only in its infancy," he added.

Industrial Area

"The north side of the City was shut off from industrial development by St. Dunstan's University and the Experimental Farm," he stated, "so we had to go to the east side where we took over the Kensington rifle range.

"We sold one site to a fertilizer company for \$15,000 and we now have the biggest fertilizer plant east of Montreal. A site was sold to the Associated Shippers for \$2,000 and another to Schurman's for \$5,000, and we have land yet, he added.

"If those with capital would invest in things like that we could make money at home and benefit the whole province."

"The average salary of the licensed rural school teacher here is \$1,000 and I think that it exceeds those of the rural teachers in New Brunswick and Quebec." The Premier heatedly referred to a misstatement made in the House of Commons and left uncorrected the effect that Island teachers were the lowest paid in the Dominion.

"Our schools are better, we are going ahead faster and we are getting teachers," he continued. "Why these statements are made and not denied is beyond me. The people in the House of Commons should be informed and not make loose statements." He added that the people who should have denied such untruths and failed to do so were as bad as the people who made them.

He commended the work of permit teachers and said that in many cases they were just as competent as those who received licenses lately.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "They would not be any better than yourself."

Premier Jones: "No, I was granted an \$800 fellowship in the United States on the basis of my teaching ability."

Land Valuation He predicted that the whole Province would be using the Land Valuation Board within the next ten years and stated that the manual was being brought right up to date.

The Premier and the Leader of the Opposition talked horns over the cattle industry with regard to the relative values of beef and dairy animals.

Premier Jones referred to the Opposition leader's proposal that all livestock be bonused. He asked Mr. Bell which cow would receive the most bonus, a dairy or beef type?

Mr. Bell replied that it would depend upon the returns of the animals, to which the Premier answered: "You will need three times as many beef as dairy cattle in order to bring in the same returns."

The Island would never stand this, he continued, as it could not produce enough hay. "We have 95,000 dairy cows in the Province now and we would need 300,000 beef cattle to get the same returns. We should teach our boys to milk cattle in the evenings instead of running to hockey games."

"The people in towns will be pretty hungry for butter soon," he warned. "Some people will be short sighted enough to say give us margarine."

"If we got into a war and were depending upon margarine, do you suppose that we could get the oil and cottonseed from which it is made? Margarine should be closed out and it is time that the people of Canada get a National policy on the dairy industry."

He stated that the Government would have built a high tension wire from Charlottetown to Summerside had it been necessary, but they got so much co-operation from the Maritime Electric Company that they did not have to.
