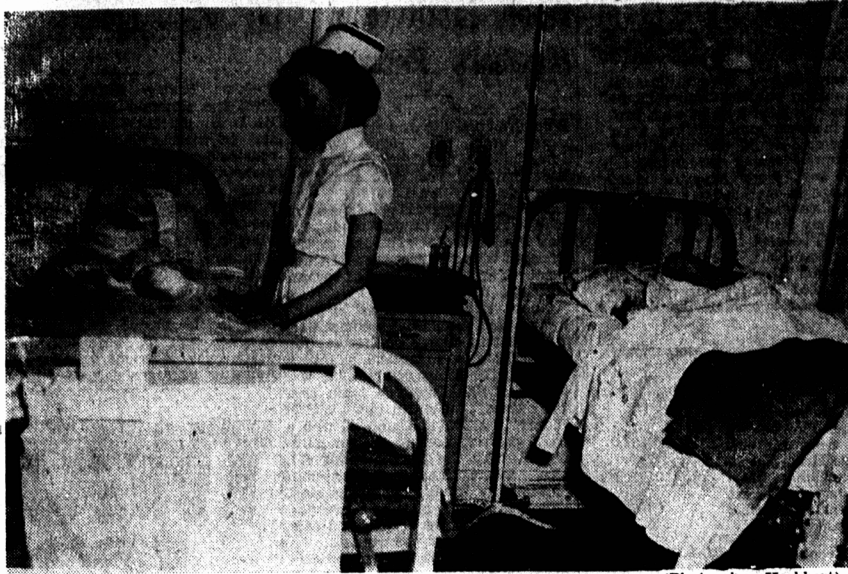

Fire Victims In Prince County Hospital

With face and hands swathed in bandages that cover the extensive and very severe burns received in a disastrous explosion that hospitalized seven people and completely destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Alphonse C. Gallant, of St. Chrysostome, two of these fire victims are seen in hospital at Summerside.

In the same room as seen above are the father, three sons and a nephew, while Mrs. Gallant and another son occupy another room.

So badly burned are these people that they will be confined to hospital for many days, and much time will be required for recovery from their ordeal by fire.

These people, in addition to their physical suffering, are also left without their home and all its contents which were completely destroyed by fire.

The fire is said to have resulted when gasoline vapor became ignited in the kitchen of the home and touched off an explosion that badly burned the face and hands of the seven people in the room at the time.

Although suffering from shock and burns, these people rescued five other children from the burning house—four of these having been upstairs in bed. In hospital are Mr. and Mrs. Gallant and four of their children, Alban 15, Melvin 12, Ervin 10, and Cyrus 8, also a nephew, Arthur Gallant, age 21.

Through the Red Cross organization at Summerside, all the citizens of the Province are given an opportunity to exercise the virtue of charity in helping this family who were victims of a tragic fire which left Mr. and Mrs. Gallant and their family of nine children without clothing, and homeless.

The five children who were uninjured are being looked after by neighbors. The other five, together with the father and mother, are being taken care of in the Prince County Hospital, suffering from shock and severe burns.

Arrangements have been made by Mr. J. F. Arnett with the Summerside branch of the Red Cross Society to accept, distribute, and act as trustees for the donations and cash received.

A list of names of those donating clothing, bedding, kitchen utensils, etc., left at the office of Rogers & Arnett, Ltd., in Summerside, is being kept, and receipts issued for all cash donations.

It is felt that the citizens will contribute generously to this very charitable appeal, Mr. Arnett yesterday reported that the response to date has been quite generous. He said that a considerable amount of clothing had been received, and that cash donations would be particularly welcome, in view of the great expense and loss suddenly thrust upon this family.
