Summerside's Mayor Henry Wedge last night at approximately 9:30 o'clock threw a switch which gave the Town 1130 kilowatts of electric energy. In pulling the switch he officially took over in the name of the Town a new 1600 h.p. diesel electric unit for the Town's electric light department, making the plant the largest diesel plant in the Maritimes, and possibly in Eastern Canada.

Work has been going on for some months on the installation of this unit, which raises the capacity of the plant to 2760 kilowatts. The placing of this unit in operation was performed last night in the presence of members of the Town Council, civic officials, and representatives of Fairbanks-Morse Company, manufacturers of the unit.

Previous to this that company had held a dinner at the Olympia Restaurant for the Town representatives. Present were: Mr. H. E. Race, Maritime manager of Fairbanks-Morse; J. H. Maclure, engineer for the company; S. E. Naugler, field service man who installed the unit; Mayor Wedge, Councillors T. D. Morrison, J. L. Gorrill, J. L. Driscoll, H. B. Schurman, G. B. Sheen and Clarence Steele; Mr. J. H. Strong, Town Clerk; L. W. Hacker, plant engineer; George Morrison, plant foreman and representatives of the press.

Mayor Wedge welcomed the Fairbanks-Morse people and expressed the appreciation of those present for a very fine meal. He congratulated Mr. Hacker and Mr. Morrison for the fine work they have done in their respective capacities at the plant.

Mr. Race said he came to Summerside to see the job finished and to make sure that everything is in order. He said he was sure that the new engine would give satisfaction and his company would stand behind it.

Councillor T. D. Morrison, chairman of the electric light committee, said that he is very happy to see this unit installed. For the first time in many years the Town will have a surplus of power. He said that the men at the plant have saved the Town thousands of dollars as they had done most of the work of installation.

Mr. Hacker said that the engine had performed well in its trial runs and he was satisfied with it.

Mr. Maclure explained many of the technical details in connection with the unit and pointed out that the engines only make the exact amount of power that is being used at any time. None is wasted.

Mr. J. H. Strong said that it has been most satisfactory to deal with Fairbanks-Morse and their equipment has stood up well. He congratulated the Council on being brave enough to take this step.

Chief Justice Speaks On United Nations

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell addressed the Summerside Rotary Club yesterday at their weekly noon luncheon meeting held in the Olympia Restaurant.

Yesterday's meeting was the local club's observance of United Nations' Day and the address delivered by the Chief Justice was one appropriate to the occasion. He complimented the Summerside club on their observance of the day and their sponsorship of an essay contest "Why I Should Support the United Nations."

He reviewed the history of the United Nations, beginning with the formation of the League of Nations at the end of the First World War, which, although it did not succeed in its objective of world peace, nevertheless laid the foundation on which the present day United Nations is built.

Outlining the various councils which comprise the United Nations, he dealt in particular with the Security Council and its work. Chief Justice Campbell gave a brief outline of the events leading up to the Korean war and said that many people wondered why the Soviet delegate absented himself from its meetings when by his presence he could have vetoed the decision of the Council to put an end to the aggression there by armed force.

He suggested that possibly Russia felt that her absence from the Council would delay any definite military action... however, the speaker pointed out, the United States and Britain had gone into the conflict with the sanction of the cooperative voice of the Security Council and therefore could not be charged as representing armed imperialistic aggression.

The meeting was presided over by president Dr. A. A. Lockhart, who said that the 7100 Rotary Clubs sponsoring the United Nations week have a wonderful opportunity to influence the minds of the people everywhere towards the paths of peace.

The president turned the meeting over to Rotarian L. W. Hancock, who, he said, had done so splendid a job in attending to all the arrangements for the observance. Rotarian Lowell then introduced the five winners of the essay contest sponsored by the club and presented each with his or her prize.

The winners in order of merit were: Eric Perry, commercial department, Summerside High School; Betty Tobin, St. Mary's convent; Janice Morrison, Summerside High School; June Geddes, Summerside High School; Marie Gaudet, St. Mary's convent.

Former Missionary To Korea Speaks At S'side Church
Dr. Florence Murray, formerly of O'Leary, who has been a missionary doctor of the United Church and a war refugee from Korea, spoke last evening in Trinity United Church, Summerside, under the auspices of the Women's Missionary Society.

This was the seventh talk given by Dr. Murray yesterday, having spoken at Alberton, Kildare, Montrose, to the Senior Assembly of the Summerside High School and to several societies of Trinity Church during the afternoon.

This gifted speaker was introduced by the minister, Rev. K. G. Sullivan, and her talk dealt with her work in Korea where as a missionary and medical doctor she practised her profession and carried on her missionary work. Dr. Murray spoke of the manner in which the North Korean people had been "won over" by the Communists and stated that North Korea was actually 90 per cent anti-Communist but by torture and liquidation the people were forced to become Communists.

She pointed out that ten thousand soldiers had been sent to that country to fight a war and only nine missionary workers and asked if this would indicate that this is a country really willing to spread peace.

She made a strong appeal for clothing and warm bedding, something which at this time is vitally important if a vast number of the people there are to be kept from freezing to death during the coming winter.

She plans on returning to Korea to pick up her work at the first opportunity, just as soon as transportation is available. Last evening the music was under the direction of Miss Mary Geldhart and a solo was beautifully rendered by Mr. Ralph Emery "The Homeland."

Mrs. W. A. Allen, president of the Afternoon Auxiliary presided and Mrs. Ian Jenkins of the Evening Auxiliary read the Scripture. Members of the C.G.I.T. acted as ushers and collectors. Hymns sung during the evening were: "O Come Let Us Sing To The Lord," "Father, Who's Will Is Life and Good" and "Lead On O King Eternal"—S

DESTINATION
brought out these main points about eventual destination of the special brigade:

2. Dispatch of the advance party direct to Korea lends weight to expectations that part of the force—probably not more than a battalion or two raised from among the force's reserves—will go to Korea in an occupational role.

3. References by Mr. Claxton to recent statements by Prime Minister St. Laurent that Canada would be willing to send the force to Europe pointed up the belief that the main combat group eventually will go there after advanced training in the United States.

In his statement—issued by defence headquarters during his absence in Montreal today—Mr. Claxton said: "Termination of hostilities in Korea will neither terminate the needs for the force nor the purpose for which it was raised—to be ready to take action on behalf of Canada under the United Nations charter or the North Atlantic Treaty."
