Georgetown Magistrate's Court Has Heavy Docket

GEORGETOWN — Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, handled a large docket in Magistrate's Court in Georgetown yesterday. The crown was represented by Crown Prosecutor G. Gordon Tweedy.

Hallowe'en damage to property had a court sequel when private citizens laid charges against George William Martin, Valleyfield, and Charles Richard Kemp, Albion. Martin pleaded guilty to five charges of damage to property and to one charge of unlawfully removing a traffic sign. The total amount of fines, costs and restitution assessed against him was \$137. Kemp pleaded guilty to four charges of

damage to property and was assessed a total of \$96 in fines, costs and restitution. The damages involved in both cases involved broken windows, a door, mailboxes and signs.

Wilfred John Prosper, Jr., Georgetown, charged with squealing tires, and represented by Kenneth MacDonald, was convicted as charged and fined \$10 and costs following the evidence of Iona policeman Charles Jackson for the crown, and evidence for the defence including that of the accused and of Noonan McCullough and Harry King.

IMPAIRED DRIVING
Douglas Christom MacMaster, Dundas, charged with impaired driving and represented by Kenneth MacDonald, failed to appear in court after repeated adjournments at his request, and as the crown evidence of Constable Charles Jackson had been heard at an earlier sitting the court found MacMaster guilty and fined him \$100 and costs or 10 days.

Robert Bruce Taylor, Sturgeon, charged with impaired driving, was granted an adjournment to November 17 to consult counsel.

Herbert McGuigan, St. Mary's Road Post Office, pleaded guilty to causing a disturbance at the Royal Canadian Legion Home in Montague by fighting. He was fined \$25 and costs.

A number of cases under the Liquor Control Act were also dealt with by the court.

A motor vehicle with impaired driver was granted an adjournment to November 24 for trial of his case.

Norbert Lawrence Murphy, Sturgeon, and John Elmer Doucette, Souris, both charged with hunting game birds after one half hour after sunset, both pleaded not guilty and both parties informed the court that they are to be represented by Melvin J. McQuaid, QC. Both cases were adjourned to November 17 for trial.

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City Police Report Accident

An accident in which a car did not stop was reported last night by Charlottetown Police at approximately 9 p.m. on the North River Road.

A 1964 Ford being operated by Jan Verhulst of Mount Edward Road suffered damage to the left front fender when in collision with another vehicle. The Verhulst vehicle was proceeding north on the North River Road at the time of the collision.

No injuries were reported and no estimate was available as to the damage. This city police reported that an arrest had been made in connection with the mishap. However no further information was available.

Tuberculosis Program Is Carried Out In Kings

An energetic tuberculosis diagnostic and preventive program has been carried out through the combined facilities of the Provincial Health Department and the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League during the months of September and October. It has been jointly announced.

Some 2,897 entrants to St. Dunstan's University and Prince of Wales College received chest X-rays by the Christmas Seal Mobile Chest X-ray Unit which was purchased and is maintained by the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League.

Over 300 staff and employees of Bathurst Marine Limited and Gulf Garden Foods Limited were X-rayed.

During the month of October, an all-out tuberculosis diagnostic and preventive program was launched in the town of Souris.

On October 11 and 12 the staff and employees of Eastern Fisheries Limited and Usen Fisheries Limited received chest X-rays.

On October 19, grades 7 and 8 school children received a very delicate tuberculin test in order to determine those who had been infected and those who had not.

Those who had not been previously infected will receive tuberculosis vaccination in order to increase their resistance, not only against the occasional infectious adult in their community, but also to give them more resistance against the disease, tuberculosis, if and when they migrate to larger centres in Canada and the United States during the next fifteen years.

On October 6, a large group of women attended a pre-clinical organization meeting at the Legion Hall in Souris. Following a short talk by the Director of Tuberculosis Control on up-to-date trends in tuberculosis, I.B.M. cards were distributed by Mrs. J.E. Cameron, R.N., supervisor of Clinics to the various teams who undertook the arduous task of carrying out a house-to-house canvass of the town of Souris.

On October 20 and 21, tuberculin testing of all under the age of 40 and X-raying of those over 40 was conducted at the Legion Hall. On October 24 and 25, positive tuberculin reactors and those over 40 were X-rayed.

Working chiefly in Kings County during the spring and summer of this year, Islanders from 75 school districts were given the privilege of having a tuberculin test or an X-ray as indicated to rule out the presence of active contagious tuberculosis.

The public were reminded that within a week, once again it will be Christmas Seal Sale Time in Canada.

Fertilizer, Potato Ships Here

Two ships tied up at the railway wharf during this past week.

The Annilee Port, a fertilizer ship, docked in Charlottetown at the railway wharf last Tuesday for the second time within a month. The vessel delivered a cargo of fertilizer on the 10th of last month but has since returned with an additional load of fertilizer which she picked up in Baltimore, U.S.A.

The captain of the German vessel is Theodore Niemeier. The ship is expected to finish discharging Monday pending good weather.

POTATO CARGO
A second ship, the Mathias Reith, also a German ship registered in Hamburg, West Germany, tied up at the railway wharf Wednesday night at 11 o'clock. She is to take on approximately 25,000 bags of potatoes supplied by Associated Shippers Incorporated. The cargo of potatoes will be taken to San Juan, Puerto Rico.

The Mathias Reith is captained by Captain H.M. Sickinger and carries a crew of approximately 18. Pending good weather, the loading should be completed Saturday at which time she will leave for Puerto Rico.

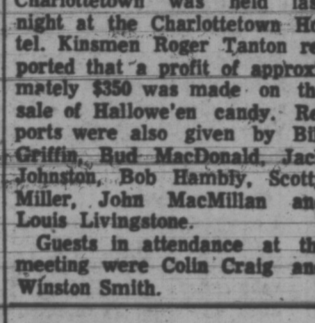

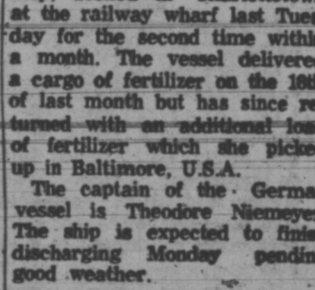
