COST OF WAR NEWS.—In the course of an article discussing the cost of war news an exchange points out that the New York Herald pays the Western Union Telegraph Company fifty dollars an hour for a special leased wire between New York and Key West, and it has set up in the latter place and in Tampa newly invented long-distance photo-telegraph instruments, by means of which its artists can transmit a finished picture to the home office every twenty minutes, while at the same time the text to accompany the picture is going forward on the other side of the duplexed wire. The world and the Journal are each credited with spending something like \$30,000 a week, while the Herald's weekly bill for war news is said to be in excess of this figure.

BAD NEWS FROM MANILA.

Sickness Among The Spanish Troops.

THE INSURGENTS IN FORCE AND WELL ARMED.

Aguinaldo Has Called Upon the Governor to Surrender.

MADRID, June 29.—Manila advices received here are to the effect that Manila is completely isolated and the city is surrounded by twenty-five thousand rebels. The number of sick among the troops is increasing and is making the situation very distressing and is causing increased desertions of native soldiers.
General Augusti says:
It is estimated that the insurgents number thirty thousand armed with rifles and a hundred thousand armed with swords.
Aguinaldo has summoned the Governor to surrender, but I have treated his propositions with disdain, for I am resolved to maintain the sovereignty of Spain and the honor of the flag to the last extremity.

SANTIAGO HAS BEEN REINFORCED.

But Cannot Hold Out Very Long.

GENERAL SHAFER SENDS A DESPATCH TO WASHINGTON.

Has Occupied a Good Position and Commands the City.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

SANTIAGO, June 29.—It is announced on high authority that almost twenty thousand Spanish soldiers have arrived at Santiago de Cuba since the American advance begun, and it is added that General Pando may be able to effect a junction with General Linares at Santiago de Cuba.

General Shafter has sent the following despatch to Washington.

"All well. We occupy an advanced position abandoned by the enemy on the Sevilla and Santiago road, west of the San Juan River, within three miles of Santiago and from which it can be plainly seen."

General Lawton, General Chaffee and General Wheeler have thoroughly reconnoitered the Spanish position, and with the aid of information furnished by the Cubans have made every good map of roads and defences of the city.

Much information has also been obtained from the Spanish pacificos who escaped out of the city and gave themselves up in hope of getting food.

They report starvation and disease to exist in Santiago.

The Cubans believe that if the water supply of the city can be cut off, Santiago will have to yield at once.

They say that General Cerveras entire fleet, except the torpedo boats Destroyer and Terror, is in the harbor.
