

MacDonald & Cotton Win Island Amateur Ch'ships

Don MacDonald and Mrs. Fred Cannon, two Charlottetown golfers won the Island's Amateur Golf Titles on Saturday.

At Summerside MacDonald won the crown with a 38-hole total of 152 when he scored a 77 Saturday to go along with his 75 in the first round.

Meanwhile at Charlottetown Mrs. Cannon had a much tougher assignment on her hands as she came from behind to tie the defending champ Blanche Hogg of Summerside and won the championships in a playoff on the fourth extra hole.

Frank McInnis, Charlottetown shot 73 in Charlottetown and 80 in Summerside to gross 153 and earn

the runner-up spot in the championship division.

Mrs. Dorothy Kuce of Summerside and Mrs. M. Underwood of Summerside topped the non-handicap division.

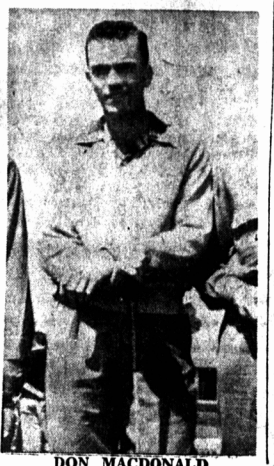
PRESENTS PRIZES

Sir Joseph and Peter Clugg placed and showed in the first outing and Newport Express and Downtown were second and third in the second mile.

Army Private Shatters Mark For Second Time On Sunday

Berlin (AP) — Pte. Willie Williams, 24-year-old soldier from Gary, Ind., Sunday shattered the official world record for the 100-metre dash for the second time within 72 hours with a brilliant sprint of 10.1 seconds on a rain-soaked track.

Williams nosed out his buddy, Pte. Ira J. Murchison of Chicago, a member of the U. S. Olympic team who equalled the 20-year-old official mark of 10.2.

Williams and Murchison, before the race, had expressed hope that they would win in a photo finish in 10 seconds flat.

Williams first ran the 100 metres in the record smashing time of 10.1 on Friday in the preliminary trial heat of an international military meet in Berlin's Olympic Stadium. Murchison followed up Saturday with a similar 10.1 performance and the two men squared off Sunday for a showdown final.

Williams ran with a back wind of 0.55 metres a second. For record purposes, a back wind of up to two metres a second is allowable.

Athletic Federation held five watches on Williams as he broke the tape. All registered 10.1.

All three 10.1 marks are subject to review and approval by the international federation, but officials anticipated as difficult in obtaining the confirmation.

The official record of 10.2 was first set by Jesse Owens at Chicago in 1936.

Murchison himself equalled this record in June at the Olympic tryouts. Williams failed at the same tryouts to win a place on the team when he was forced to drop out during a trial heat at 60 yards with a bad leg cramp.

"I feel fine," Williams, a former track star at Illinois, panted to reporters after the race. "This track is still the best I have ever run on."

A heavy rain drenched the crushed red brick track surface of the massive stadium just an hour before the race. But the track's good drainage put it back in good enough shape to allow Williams to pull his second record breaking performance.
