WOMEN'S ORGANIZATIONS

Minimum Wage Law Urged By Provincial CWL

The establishment of a minimum wage scale that would see a skilled trained worker receiving not less than \$200 monthly and unskilled labour not less than \$1 an hour, was one of the resolutions passed at the annual convention of the P.E.I. Council of the Catholic Women's League recently in Charlottetown.

The theme of the convention was "The social responsibilities of the Church" and in connection with this theme the convention delegates, representing all parts of the province, passed a number of resolutions pertaining to the social and economic affairs of a province.

A second resolution dealt with the establishment, by the Government, of a convalescent home which would be available to reasonable rates for patients who have no one to look after them after discharge from hospital, or failing that, that some sort of suitable type of home care be provided. Another resolution requested that the Government pass the necessary legislation to enable farmers in the province to sell their produce at the sale of their own products so that they might gain a greater part of the consumer's dollar.

It was also urged that the department of education include a course in the high school curriculum as the co-operative movement and that French courses be made compulsory for all persons enrolling in teacher training and taking summer courses in order that they may be qualified to teach French in the primary grades.

Other resolutions dealt with low-cost housing for the aged and rental controls; the abolishment of the property value and the establishment of the "one vote per person" system; increases in the provincial sales tax from 10 to 15 per cent as well as a number of resolutions of particular interest to the organization itself.
