ARBOR DAY.—As will be seen by referring to our advertising columns, the Arbor Society has appointed Queen's Birthday (Thursday) next as Arbor Day. We understand that the Superintendent of Education has decided that the same day be observed by the children of the public schools as Arbor Day. We trust that there will be a general turnout of all citizens interested in the improving of our city.

SHORT TEMPERANCE LECTURE.—An enterprising grocery firm of Kirkville, Mo., makes the following offer: "Any man who drinks two drams of whiskey per day for a year and pays 10 cents a drink for it, can have at our store 30 sacks of flour, 20 pounds of granulated sugar and 72 pounds of good green coffee for the same money, and get \$2.50 premium for making the change in his expenditure."

TAKING THE VEIL.—The Catholic Record of the 19th inst., contains an able and lengthy article, descriptive of "Taking the Veil" at Villa Marie, the Mother House of the Congregation de Notre Dame, Montreal. Among the twelve young postulants, three are recognized by the writer, Miss A. M. Pope, viz., Miss Chisholm, of Antigonish, Miss McInnis, of Summerside, and Miss Florence Eden, of Halifax. The last mentioned is daughter of Frank Eden, Esq., who is a native of our city.

NUISANCES.—His Honor the Stipendiary Magistrate had several cases of nuisance up before him this morning. He fined the offenders, and threatened that on a repetition of the offence he would make the fine \$30 in each case. In the cases heard the offence consisted in piling manure in heaps within the city limits. We trust that the Magistrate will punish all such offenders as they deserve. The health of citizens must not be allowed to be endangered through the carelessness or ignorance of any person.

GUYSBORO IN DANGER.—A New Glasgow N. S., lawyer has received a correspondence from a legal firm at Washington, D. C., relating to the claims of the heirs of one Hon. Col. Archibald Montgomery, who claims a tract of land situated on Chebucto harbor, County of Guysboro, comprising twenty thousand acres. The land was, it is said, deeded to Montgomery by Gov. Wilcox, in 1764, but was lost sight of by the heirs until the present time. If the heirs push their claim there will be some trouble, as part of the town of Guysboro is situated on the land.

A NICE YOUNG MAN.—The New York Sun prints a sensational story concerning Harry Phillips, John L. Sullivan's manager, which charges that Phillips is a burglar and that he organized a gang in Montreal to rob the vault of the Grand Trunk railway company and then went abroad to escape the consequences. The Sun's informant is Frank Hayner, a private detective, who gives in detail the facts in connection with the organization of the gang of burglars in Montreal, he himself being one of those selected by Phillips to do the work, he (Hayner) having formed Phillips' acquaintance for the purpose of trapping him.

SOME SHIPMENTS.—On Thursday morning last Mr. C. A. McNutt, of Kensington, a well known horse and cattle dealer, shipped by the steamer St. Lawrence for J. A. Leaman & Co., Halifax, thirty-nine head of fat cattle, valued at \$2,200, twenty pigs, \$300, and two horses, \$275. Three of the cattle in this consignment weighed 425 lbs., and all were good.

Mr. John McDonald, of St. John, shipped to that city by the St. Lawrence on Saturday morning last, twenty cattle, averaging in value \$10 each, and twenty-one sheep. Mr. McDonald arrived here on Tuesday last, and purchased the above between these two days.—Summerside Agriculturalist.

A By-Law to Amend the By-Law to Prevent Nuisances. (Passed 14th May, 1888.) ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:— 1. The By-Law passed on the Nineteenth day of December last past, 1887, intitled "A By-Law to amend the By-Law to prevent Nuisances," is hereby repealed. 2. Immediately after the publication of this By-Law, every sign or other projection, fixed or attached to any building, or to any wall, or to any fence, or to any other structure, which is in violation of the provisions of this By-Law shall, upon conviction before the Stipendiary Magistrate of said city, forfeit and pay at the discretion of the said Magistrate a penalty not exceeding Ten Dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs (every day he neglects to remove or permits the sign to remain, or to amend the sign, or to remove the same, shall be considered a separate offence), and in default of payment thereof it shall and may be lawful for the said Magistrate to commit the offender or offenders to the Common Jail of the said City for any period not exceeding fourteen days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid.
