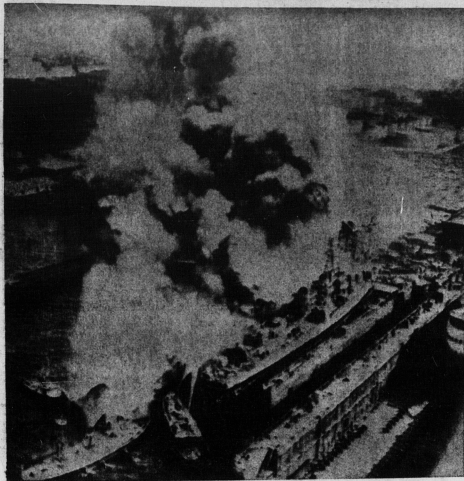

Soviet Scientist Reports Man Okay In Space Travel

By JACK BEST MOSCOW (CP) — A cosmonaut scientist said Wednesday human beings can "live and work" in the weightless condition of space travel. Konstantin Feoktistov, one of three men aboard the Soviet spaceship Vostok (Sunrise), which orbited the earth 18 times last week, told a crowded press conference his research led him to the conclusion man can become accustomed to a space flight condition. "One can live and work in this environment," he declared. Another member of the crew's first multiple space crew, Dr. Boris Vozgov, said: "I believe that the men's capacity for work and their spirits remained high throughout the 24-hour flight. In the weightless condition one can work with the most diverse scientific apparatus," Vozgov said.

Five Winter Projects Approved For Prince

CAPITAL BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN OTTAWA — Five winter works projects, which will provide a substantial number of man-days of work this fall and winter, have been approved so far in Prince County, Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaught announced here Wednesday. The largest single project is the reconstruction at the Sumner Road RCAF Station which will involve an expenditure of \$291,000 and provide 11,334 days of work. Other projects which should commence about Nov. 1 are: repairs to Cape Traverse wharf in the amount of \$3,000; north pier repairs at Miramichigan; \$2,500; repairs to the north and south breakwater at Tignish; \$4,000; Holman's wharf repairs at Summerside, \$3,000. "Prince County, which last year benefited greatly in a number of winter works projects, has initiated projects which will provide a total of 13,001 days of work to laborers and tradesmen in the county," Mr. MacNaught noted. "I am pleased that the county is again taking advantage of the program this year and I anticipate that many other projects will be submitted for approval to the federal department of labor."

Favreau Gives Up Position As House Leader For Gov't

OTTAWA (CP)—Justice Minister Guy Favreau is giving up his role in the Commons as Government House Leader. The job that has broken more parliamentarians than it has made, Mr. Favreau is stepping down from the leadership because of pressure of his justice department duties and the burden of the federal Liberal party into the next general election. The post usually goes to a minister who has had many years of parliamentary experience and relatively light administrative duties in his department. In recent months, the 47-year-old Montreal lawyer who was formerly charged with the position of justice minister has found the triple-tiered job just too much for one man to handle and give adequate attention to all its demands. In a Montreal speech Tuesday, Mr. Favreau said that Quebec separatists and dissidents who oppose the House leader's role in the Commons are a major task for the federal Liberals in preparation for the next election, whenever it comes. In addition to speculation on Mr. Favreau's successor, there are reports the job may go to George McNeil, MP for Ottawa West, a member of the Pearson cabinet as the president of the Privy Council. He is also a chairman of the treasury board, the budget-trimming and spending-control agency. Mr. Favreau's resignation was announced in a letter to the House leader last week. He was parliamentary assistant from 1958 to 1963 when he was assistantship. TENDERS CALL IN 1966? Two Reports of 4 Ready In Planning For Causeway

By FARMER TISSINGTON CAPITAL BUREAU, The Guardian OTTAWA — Silence continued to hang over the government's intention with regard to the proposed Northumberland Strait crossing and there has been virtually no new information forthcoming from any official source for several weeks. The expected statement on the causeway from Public Works Minister J.P. Deschamps has been delayed from week to week and there is now no prospect that it will be made before the end of next week, if then. Some weeks ago, the minister promised to give some details when his department's estimates were called again in the Commons. Queens' MPA, J. Angus MacLean and Heath Macquarrie are both ready to bring the matter up again when the public works estimates are up for debate. But while a number of other departments have been called in the past few weeks, public works has not. Mr. Deschamps is absent from Ottawa this week, so it is certain his estimates will not come up until, at the earliest, next Wednesday. Another fact that is also accepted here is that the offer of a private firm, A.D. Marzison and Associates to construct the crossing on a special arrangement with the government make a private deal without calling for competitive bids from other people or firms," one official here pointed out. It is still believed to be government planning that tenders will be ready for call on the projects by 1966 and that some six years will be required for construction, making a reality of the crossing by 1972. Gang Slaying Fears In Joe Bananas Case

NEW YORK (AP)—Two men in dark clothing were reported to have overpowered Ontario boss Joseph (Joe Bananas) Bonanno at gunpoint on a rain-swept Park Avenue sidewalk Wednesday. He was spotted struggling in a car. Bonanno, one of the United States' top mobsters, was said to have appeared before a crime-probing federal grand jury last Friday. The FBI stepped into the case, as bizarre as any fictional movie plot—so much so as to raise the suggestion of a hoax. However, there was no trace of Bonanno and fears were expressed he may have met a grisly end. Lawyer William P. Maloney told police Bonanno was a client of his and that they were together, having just left a taxi, when the crime syndicate leader was seized. "Any suggestion that this was a dodge to get him out of appearing before the Grand Jury is utterly ridiculous."
