FRENCH ARE STIRRED UP

Over Mr. Chamberlain's Last Speech.

THOUGHT THAT PASRODA WOULD SATISFY ENGLAND.

They Now Think England Will Settle All Pending Questions.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

PARIS, Nov. 17.—The speech of Mr. Chamberlain, the British Secretary of State for the Colonies, at Manchester, has had a disquieting effect upon French official circles, where it had been expected that the evacuation of Fashoda would satisfy Great Britain.

Mr Chamberlain's statements were regarded here as indicating that Great Britain's desire is to discuss and settle all questions now pending, while she is in a state of preparedness to exert force in support of her views.

High officials suggest that the result of the British attitude may be a close understanding between France and Germany on colonial matters.

Happy Schreiber.

OTTAWA, November 16.—The wedding of Collingwood Schreiber, deputy minister of railways and canals, to Miss Gwynne, daughter of Judge Gwynne, of the Supreme Court, took place yesterday afternoon at Grace Church. The wedding was private, only near relatives being invited. Miss Gwynne was charmingly gowned in an exceedingly graceful costume of French gray, much trimmed with white bebe ribbon, a becoming chapeau in the same lovely soft shades, and she carried a magnificent shower bouquet of white roses and maidenhair fern.

She was accompanied by her two nieces, Miss Marguerite Crombie and Miss Nora Gwynne, of Toronto. Immediately after the ceremony Mr and Mrs. Schreiber left in a special car for New York. Mr. Schreiber is 67 years of age.

Attitude of Spain.

MADRID, Nov 16.—According to semi-official statements here the Spanish peace commissioners will maintain their present attitude in regard to the Philippine Islands and will certainly not accept the conditions of the United States. Further, if the discussion does not return to the limits of the protocol, as viewed by the Spaniards, the Spanish commissioners have decided not to sign a treaty of peace.

It is also learned from the same source that complete accord prevails between the Spanish government and its peace commissioners.

Truth Coming Out.

LONDON, Nov 15.—In the Bankruptcy Court yesterday Mr Hooley, on cross-examination, flatly contradicted the evidence of Sir William Marriott. He reiterated his statement that he had promised and had paid to Sir William £1,000 for an introduction to the Carlton Club. Sir William, Mr Hooley added, told him that he did "all the dirty work" for the Conservative party. Sir William suggested the giving of £50,000 by Mr Hooley for a baronetcy, and he was to get £10,000 if Mr Hooley was made a baronet.

LOBSTER REGULATION REVOKED

They May Still be Taken 9 1/2-10 1/2 Inches in Length.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—An Order in Council has been passed suspending the order passed very lately which increased the size of lobsters to be taken from 8 1/2 to 10 1/2 inches until the year 1900. In the meantime the old order of affairs will exist and lobsters 9 1/2 inches can be taken.

Shot By The Minister.

NEW YORK, November 16.—Rev Maurice Rosenthal, a Jewish clergyman, was aroused from his sleep early yesterday by hearing a stranger in his house in East 116th street. Arming himself with a pistol he went into the parlor, where he was attacked by the intruder. The two men fought desperately for a few moments, the burglar proving to be the stronger. At last the clergyman fired his pistol, full in the face of the burglar, who fell unconscious, a bullet having torn out his left eye and entered the brain. The wounded man was taken to a hospital where he recovered sufficiently to give his name and address as William Farrell, of West Third street, Philadelphia. He is about 21 years old and of powerful build. The surgeons say he cannot recover.

General Merritt's Opinion.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov 15.—Major-General Merritt is quoted as saying:

"It would not surprise me to see that the negotiations between the United States and Spain have been broken off. If the work of the commission proves fruitless it means a renewal of the war. If Spain refuses to accede to further demands it will show that she has secured substantial hope of assistance or European intervention. Should Germany take a hand in this matter, England will follow suit and then look for France to put her finger in the pie."

Anglo-American Co-operation.

BERLIN, Nov 16.—A despatch from Madrid says, according to reliable information received there from London, Lord Salisbury is disposed to act in concert with the United States, and that reinforcements which are being sent to Gibraltar make the British policy seem suspicious.

It is quite generally the opinion that for this reason this government ought to make peace with the Americans forthwith before England gets her opportunity to put her finger in the pie.

Khartoum Honors.

LONDON, November 16.—The Khartoum honors have been gazetted. Captain Kenau, Lieut. Montmorency and Private Byrce, of the 21st Lancers and Captain Smyth, of the second dragoons, received the Victoria Cross; Lieutenant Sir Francis Greenfell, and Major General Lord Kitchener are made knights of the grand cross of the Bath; Slatin Pasha is made a knight commander of St. Michael and St. George and many others are yet to receive various decorations.

Dreyfus Informed

PARIS, Nov. 16.—The court of cassation has informed the minister of the colonies, Guillaumet, that it has decided that Dreyfus be informed by telegraph that the revision proceedings have commenced and to prepare his defence.

The ministry of the colonies has received a cable despatch saying Dreyfus is in good health. The decision of the court of cassation to inform the prisoner of the revision proceedings have commenced and notifying him to prepare his defence, is very significant, as it has heretofore been admitted that no innovation has been introduced into the Dreyfus proceedings. Questions will now be drafted and posted to Dreyfus, who will formulate his replies.

"God Save The Queen."

NEW YORK, November 16.—The 130th banquet of the New York chamber of commerce was held at Delmonico's last night. Lord Herschell, General Miles, Seth Low, Bishop Potter and many other persons of distinction were present. The president in his opening address called the assembly to its feet, and they sang "God Save the Queen."

The Spaniards have received orders to quit Cuba by the 1st January next and all efforts on their part to prolong the occupation of that island have met with a flat refusal from their American conquerors.

ALLAN NAPIER M'NEIL DEAD

A Native of P E Island—For Twenty Years in Civil Service.

OTTAWA, Nov 17.—Allan Napier McNeil, Chief Clerk of the Department of Indian Affairs, died yesterday.

About six weeks ago the deceased contracted a heavy cold which developed into pneumonia, and resulted in his death.

For over twenty years he was connected with the civil service.

The deceased was a native of P E Island and at one time held a commission in the British Navy.

His father was the late John McNeil, at one time clerk of the House of Assembly, of P. E. Island.

The Mail Service.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—The Department of Trade and Commerce has decided not to accept any of the tenders for the steamship service for carrying the British mails for two years from May next.

It is likely that new tenders will be called for.

A Curious Mistake.

HALIFAX, Nov. 16.—Investigation is being held into the mistake by which several cars of war material shipped here and destined by the British authorities for the Pacific were sent to St. John instead of to Esquimaux. The explosives were intended for coast defences and ships on the Pacific station. It is said address tickets were transferred on the cars from St. John and Esquimaux, and that the result was the ammunition has not yet reached the Pacific.

St. John Star: Shortly after the dissolution of the last parliament, Mr. Mulock introduced a bill to make it unlawful for any member of parliament to accept a position in the gift of the crown. He and several other members of the party denounced such appointments as a scandal and an outrage. Mr. Mulock and his colleagues have been in office a little more than two years and have already made eleven appointments from the house of commons. They have given judgeships to four members, senatorships to four, a governorship to one, and departmental appointments to two.

Montreal Gazette: Mr John Yeo, M. P., for East Prince, P. E. I., has followed the example of more illustrious fellow Liberals who held that members of the House of Commons should not take places from the Government, and has accepted a senatorship. He is a man of good repute in his home province, and will be a good enough Senator. His entry into the upper chamber will, however, somewhat enlarge the hole that the M. P.'s' rush for office has made in a much advertised Liberal pretence.

A Statesman in Trouble

PEKING, Nov. 16.—Li Hung Chang has memorialized the dowager empress, begging to be excused from the appointment to consult with the viceroy of the province of Shang Tang as to the steps to be taken to prevent any further overflowing of the Yellow River, pleading age and infirmity as his excuse. He had a special audience on the subject with the dowager empress today and the latter, while thanking him for his services to the throne, requested the Chinese statesman to proceed to the Yellow River without delay.

In some quarters it is believed Li Hung Chang's appointment is due to the enmity of Yung Lu, who replaced Li Hung Chang in the Tzung Li Yamen early in September, and to the animosity of Kang Yu.

The Prima Donna Again.

LONDON, Nov 16—Mrs. Patti, during an interval in a concert at Albert Hall last evening, informed her friends of her intention to marry again. The man who will become the prima donna's third husband is Baron Cederstrol, a Swede. The marriage will take place in February.
