HILLSBOROUGH BRIDGE

Resolutions Passed at Alberry Plains.

At a meeting held at Alberry Plains on April 19th by the F and D. I. A. the following resolution was unanimously adopted: Whereas a large portion of the inhabitants of Queen's and King's Counties, east and south of the present line of railway, are at considerable expense and inconvenience, at all seasons and particularly at the opening and closing of navigation, in crossing the Hillsborough to and from the City of Charlottetown, and. Whereas the Federal Government seems disposed to grant a sum sufficient for a branch line of railway for the accommodation of this section of the country, which branch we hope may extend at least as far east as Summersville, on condition that the Province of P. E. I. contribute thereto by an annual subsidy.

Therefore resolved, that in the event of the branch line not coming from Peake's, we consider the Government of this Province in duty bound to grant a sum not exceeding \$12,000 yearly, as a subsidy to a bridge across the Hillsborough River, for railway purposes and general traffic.

Tax on Colonial Wine.

LONDON, April 24.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks Beach, and the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, have consented to hear a protest laid by the Colonial Agents-General, headed by Lord Strathcona, against the proposed increase of the wine duties. It is reported that Mr. Chamberlain inclines to a reduction, favouring the colonial product, but that it is improbable that he will be able to move the Government to grant any direct preference to colonial wines. The tax, however, may be lightened upon cheap wines, thus indirectly favouring the colonies.

LONDON, April 24.—The Times, which prints extracts from the adverse criticisms of Major Hutton on the condition of Canadian forces, says: "It is to be hoped that the reforms he has suggested will assume practical shape without delay. Patriotism demands the sacrifices entailed."

Another Outrageous Deed.

PLAMETTO, Ga., April 25.—The body of Lige Strickland, a negro preacher, who was implicated in the Cranford murder by Sam Hose, was found swinging to the limb of a persimmon tree within a mile and a quarter of this place early yesterday.

Before death was allowed to end the suffering of the negro his ears were cut off and the small finger of his left hand was severed at the joint. These trophies were in Plametto to-day.

On the chest of the negro was a piece of blood-stained paper attached by an ordinary pin. On one side of this paper was written: "New York Journal—We must protect our ladies 23 99."

The other side of the paper contained a warning to the negroes of the neighbourhood. It reads as follows: "Beware all darkies. You will be treated the same way."

The mobs still on the hunt for other negroes, and probably more will be lynched. One report says they have killed Albert Sewell, a very offensive black man.
