Agrees To Canals In U.S.

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada Wednesday agreed to allow the United States to build an important four-mile, \$70,000,000 link of the St. Lawrence seaway on the American side of the International Rapids section at Barnhart Island, southwest of Cornwall, Ont.

In any "unreasonable or unwarranted interference with Canadian shipping."
At the same time, the Canadian government, in an exchange of notes with the U. S., announced its intention to participate in construction of the International Rapids section by building a 4,000-foot, \$14,000,000 canal and lock on the Canadian side at Iroquois, Ont., about 27 miles up-river from Cornwall.

\$2,000,000 worth of dredging work on the American side in the Thousand Islands region, but aside from the International Rapids decisions, the long-awaited project will be a \$180,000,000, all-Canadian construction allowing sea-going vessels to sail through the narrow St. Lawrence into the Great Lakes.

Life-or-Death Conference On European Army

BRUSSELS (AP)—France's five European allies ranged solidly behind the United States and Britain Wednesday night in rejecting Pierre Mendes-France's plan to revamp the EDC.

But it reserved the right to build a parallel link on the Canadian side if traffic volume requires it, or if the American construction results in any "unreasonable or unwarranted interference with Canadian shipping."

External Affairs Minister Pearson, who held a press conference at the time the notes were made public, said there are still some points to be cleared up, but that construction can proceed at once, aimed at completion by the end of 1968.

They apparently killed and maimed just for the thrill of it. District attorney Edward S. Silver admitted in court Wednesday that he doesn't know the answer. He said:

"There's no greed, no revenge and no sex behind these crimes... In 12 days, the boys reversed a life pattern of decency. They allegedly beat and kicked one man to death, tortured another and threw him to his death in the East river, whipped young girls, and viciously beat almost anyone who crossed their path."

They roamed Brooklyn parks in search of prey. Their arrest Tuesday came after a passerby saw a man beaten.

Dr. Dicks said the mother's life is driven into conflict owing to loneliness, with a husband away at the factory all day and in no mood to share her domestic burdens when he comes home.

After their arrest Silver said: "They committed crimes for pleasure and hatred and got a kick out of seeing blood flow." It was the second gang of Brooklyn youths accused within six weeks of senseless homicide. Another group beat and stomped to death 40-year-old Thomas A. Condon last July 10.

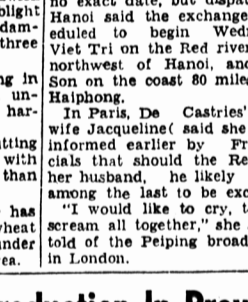

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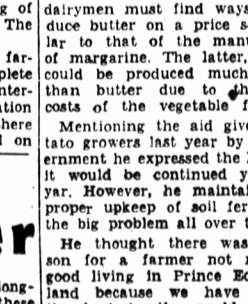
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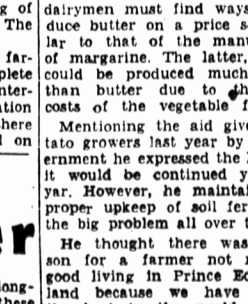
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Makes Successful Atlantic Flight
