

# Find Empty Lifeboat And Dory From Pilot Vessel

S. JOHN, N.B. (CP)—The hand of sorrow was heavy on this eastern seaport as relatives and friends mourn seven men lost to the Bay of Fundy aboard a harbor pilot boat.

Hope that the men escaped their frail craft after it collided with a freighter evaporated Monday with a transport department announcement that the pilot boat's only lifeboat and dory were found Saturday off the Nova Scotia coast.

The lifeboat will be brought here and added to the grim evidence awaiting an expected formal inquiry into the tragedy. A 10-foot square section of hull and the pilot boat's mast were found last week by a searching ship. They were identified as part of the missing vessel.

The empty lifeboat and dory were found by lobstermen living within three miles of each other on Nova Scotia's rocky Fundy coast. Although positive identification will have to wait until

transport officials check their design and construction here, a department spokesman said he is convinced they came from the pilot boat.

**OTTAWA ON BOAT**  
A fisherman in the small village of Gulliver's Cove, about 17 miles north of Digby, N.S., said the "badly-damaged" lifeboat bore the word Ottawa, indicating it was federal government property. A pilot confirmed the missing lifeboat had Ottawa printed across its stern.

"The lifeboat looked like it was torn right off," the fisherman said. "It sure was damaged."

The dory, like the lifeboat, contained no trace of the missing men. The oarlocks lay unused at the bottom of the boat but it was undamaged.

The pilot boat disappeared in a dense fog immediately after the collision.

**CUT IN TWO**  
The few pieces of wreckage discovered late last week and the lifeboat and dory lend strength to

an unofficial theory that the pilot boat was either cut in two by the 3,500-ton freighter Fort Avalon or so badly damaged she capsized before the men could abandon their vessel.

Meanwhile, the Walter E. Foster continues her daily soundings in the unruly bay, trying to find the sunken boat with her underwater radar. There was no indication when the hunt will be called off.

Transport Minister Marler told the House of Commons he expected to receive a preliminary report of the incident Monday. He predicted a formal inquiry.

A solemn high mass of requiem will be held Thursday for pilots William P. Traynor, 66, senior pilot in the service here and William J. Murray, 39, and crew member Frank Coughlin, 60, in St. John the Baptist Church by Rev. W. Thomas Traynor of Woodstock, Ont., son of the missing man. A memorial service for a third missing pilot and three other crew members was held in the church Sunday.

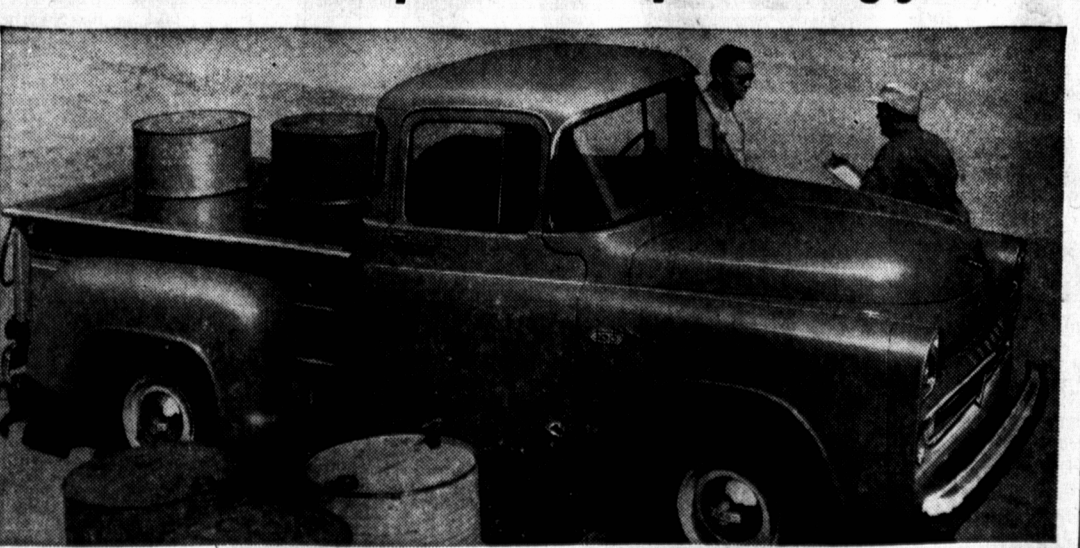
