Lawyer Committed For Stamps Theft

MONTREAL, (CP) — Lucien Gagnon, 45, Montreal lawyer and city councillor, was committed for trial by Judge Lucien Clendron Monday on a charge of receiving \$21,000 in stolen stamps.

The committal came at voluntary-statement proceedings in the case, usually a formal intermediate stage between preliminary hearing and trial at which the defence may offer evidence if it wishes.

Gagnon exercised his right to reserve defence evidence until the trial and none was offered Monday.

CECIL LAIRD
