

New Slaughter House Rules Are Announced

SUMMERSIDE — Regulations to insure that all meat sold for human consumption on Prince Edward Island shall be of good quality are embodied in new provisions added to the Public Health Act, and announced yesterday by Hon. Hubert B. MacNeill, provincial minister of health.

The new "Slaughter House Regulations" have been approved by the provincial cabinet following study of the new provisions in the Public Health Act by the provincial department of health and the provincial department of agriculture during the past two months.

As a result of the new regulations all slaughter houses in the province will be required to obtain a license from the department of health which Dr. MacNeill said will assist them in every way possible to meet the standards in the new regulations.

All meat for sale to the public will, in future, be inspected and stamped by the chief health officer or a veterinarian.

Dr. MacNeill said the new regulations regulated largely as to public safety against the sale of unhealthy or contaminated meat in similar methods which were expounded in the province of Ontario a few months ago.

Dr. MacNeill emphasized that there had been no cases of this kind in P.E.I. and felt that the regulations on the island were doing an exceptionally good job.

He said that there are upwards of 50 killing plants, large and small, on the island, that will be affected by the new regulations, and that the majority of these slaughter a very limited number of animals.

FOR OWN USE
The new regulations do not apply to farmers who slaughter animals on their premises for their own use exclusively and not for sale to the public. Applications for licenses to operate a slaughter house must be made to the department of health, and no person will be permitted to operate without first obtaining a license.

Each slaughter house will be required to be located in a place free from conditions that might injuriously affect the sanitary operation of the plant; must be fully lighted and equipped with a refrigerated compartment of maintaining a temperature of not less than 32 degrees and not more than 42 degrees; must have a slaughter room, and be provided with a supply of cold water adequate for the operation of the plant.

Any carcass condemned by the inspecting officer or veterinarian as unfit for human consumption will be stamped or marked to indicate its condemnation for human consumption and be buried or disposed of in a manner recommended by the inspector.

VETERAN TO CUT RIBBON

New Fire Hall in S'ide To Be Opened Officially

SUMMERSIDE — A man who has been associated with the Summerside fire department for the past 60 years will cut the ribbon this evening that will officially open the new fire hall, one of Canada's finest.

Claude T. Kenny, Sr., who retired from active duty at the fire hall last January will perform the ribbon cutting ceremony in the presence of many dignitaries including Premier Walter R. Shaw who will lay the cornerstone.

Mr. Kenny was a regular

fireman for 58 years and for the past seven years until last January, was duty fireman at the fire hall answering phone-calls and alerting the firemen to action.

Mr. Kenny who is 84, worked up through the ranks and as well as being captain of the town company for a long period was assistant to the chief for several years.

The magnificent new fire hall contains a full basement which will be used for civil defence purposes as an emergency headquarters. The ground floor which is 92 by 64 has double doors on both the north and south sides to permit instant exit of the trucks. The large aluminum and glass doors are controlled by push buttons located at the dispatching desk. The doors are hinged in sections and run on tracks set in the ceiling.

Also on the ground floor is an electric hose dryer in which 550 feet of hose can be dried rapidly. A hose rack with a capacity of 1,800 feet is also situated nearby; also a workroom and the dispatcher's office. The control panel in the dispatcher's office operates the horn, siren, and doors.

A panel is provided hooking up the sprinkler system in business houses in the town and a signal flashes on the board when any of these sprinklers is triggered by the heat of a fire, started by the host of a fire, these and the females 81.

Employment Remains High In Prince Area, UIC Reports

SUMMERSIDE — The employment situation in Summerside and vicinity differs very little from that of a year ago while a building boom was in progress it was learned yesterday from East Canon, manager of the local National Unemployment Office.

A year ago a total of 730 unemployed applicants were registered compared to 763 at the end of June. Broken down these figures reveal that 521 males and 221 females are seeking employment at present, while a year ago the statistics showed 533 males and 215 females were registered unemployed.
