## SAMPSON HAS BEEN REINFORCED

### By Several Hundred Cubans.

### ATTACK MADE BY THE COMBINED FORCES

On a Spanish Camp Resulted in a Victory.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Admiral Sampson reports that he has been reinforced by several hundred Cubans, and that his forces at Guantanamo are in a very satisfactory condition.

The town of Aenceros has been occupied by the troops under General Rabi.

The men under General Garcia are cooperating with the American forces.

The United States marines and Cubans on Tuesday attacked the Spanish camps situated five miles from the Americans entrenchment. They completely routed a force of 4000 Spaniards, breaking up their camp and destroying the well which supplied them with water.

One American was slightly wounded and two Cubans were killed and four wounded.

The Spanish loss is believed to be forty killed.

### PARRSBORO VESSEL LOST.

Schooner Gypsum Princess Sunk at Sea.

New York, June 16.—The schooner Ems has arrived from Guaoa via Naples and Gibraltar and brought six ship wrecked seamen of the schooner Gypsum Princess, of Parrsboro, N. S., which was sunk at sea on June 14th.

The Captain, wife and four others were drowned.

## WILL GERMANY RAISE A ROW?

### Believed She Wants to Interfere

### AS REGARDS THE SETTLEMENT OF THE PHILIPPINES,

In Which Case John Bull Most Be Reckoned With.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, June 16.—Germany's attitude in regard to the Philippines is regarded as a most interesting phase in the war question.

For the moment the Germans are credited with a desire to find work for their navy, despite official repudiation.

The matter is regarded with some anxiety.

It is certain that Germany will have to count upon the opposition of England, and perhaps Japan.

The Daily News says:

"We do not quite believe the rumors of the proposed seizure by Germany in the Philippines, and for one good reason: England would have to be reckoned with.

### SPANISH VERACITY.

Many U. S. Sailors Killed and Wounded in Santiago Bombardment.

MADRID, June 14.—In the Chamber of Deputies, yesterday, the Minister of the Interior, Senor Capdepon, replying to questions on the subject, said that, according to the semi-official despatches, during the last fight at Santiago de Cuba, "a Spanish shell burst on the deck of the Massachusetts, dismounting a gun, killing and wounding a number of men, and seriously injuring the vessel, while the New York and several other vessels were compelled to withdraw in a badly damaged condition. In addition, three of the American ships were sent back to the repairing yard."

### THE NIGER QUESTION.

The Details of the Anglo-French Settlement.

LONDON, June 14.—The Anglo-French Convention with reference to the disputed territory in the Niger valley, was signed yesterday. France agrees to evacuate Kisi, Roria, Assigere, Kiam, Bousa, Comba and Ilo, but she retains Nikki. Furthermore, on the left bank of the Niger the French get a triangular piece of territory, whose base extends from Say to Ilo. In return they give Great Britain Bornu, including the portion east of the meridian passing through Barua.

On the right bank of the Niger the French get the country from Say to Ilo and also Curma. Beyond this they grant thirty years' leases of bonded areas at Liabe and facilities for transit in bond. This is to secure the benefit of the navigable portion of the river.

In return they give thirty years of reciprocity for the whole west coast colonies from the Diberian frontier to the Niger. With respect to the Gold Coast, the French evacuate Wa and probably Punn and Leo. In return Great Britain gives up Bono and Dawkita and accepts the Volta as the best natural boundary. The French retain Mo-s, which they have held for eighteen months.

The Marquis of Lansdowne, secretary of state war, announces that the officers implicated with Dr Jameson in the Transvaal raid of December 30th, 1895, with the exception of Major Sir John Willoughby and Colonel Francis Rhodes, brother of Cecil Rhodes, who are regarded as being responsible for the invasion, will be reinstated in the army on half-pay.

## YANKEE MARINES HAVE A FIGHT

### And Capture Eighteen Spaniards

### ALSO A QUANTITY OF RIFLES AND AMMUNITION

Had a Number of Fights and Beat the Spaniards.

NEW YORK, June 16.—A Journal despatch from camp McCalla, Guantanamo Harbor, June 15, says:

Scouting parties of marines which were sent out yesterday returned here last night with eighteen Spanish prisoners, one of them an officer.

The party also captured a hundred Mauser rifles and 10,000 rounds of ammunition.

They report having had series engagements with the Spaniards in which 190 Spanish soldiers were killed and 200 wounded.

### HONG KONG CONCESSIONS.

Important Statement Made by Lord Salisbury.

LONDON, June 14.—In the House of Lords yesterday the Marquis of Salisbury, replying to the Earl of Camperdown, confirmed the reports of the concessions granted to Great Britain in the vicinity of Hong Kong, which, he said, in addition to giving a slight extension to the colony, also secured strategical surroundings which so far commanded Hong Kong that in case of war Great Britain would have been put to certain disadvantages. The concessions, the Premier further pointed out, had become imperative in consequence of the events of the last few years. He could not say that an immediate danger was apprehended. In fact, the concession has been demanded for a long time, but, "recent events made the Chinese Government more sensible to the possibility of unexpected occurrences and they quite understand and appreciate the solicitude displayed for the maintenance of peace and the commercial interests of Great Britain, which are those of the whole world."

—The Dominion Alliance has issued an appeal to prohibitionists to turn out and work for the plebiscite. Whereupon the Montreal Gazette remarks that after they have turned out and worked, and quite probably obtained a majority of votes, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues—as he has told them—will consider what they will do about the matter.
