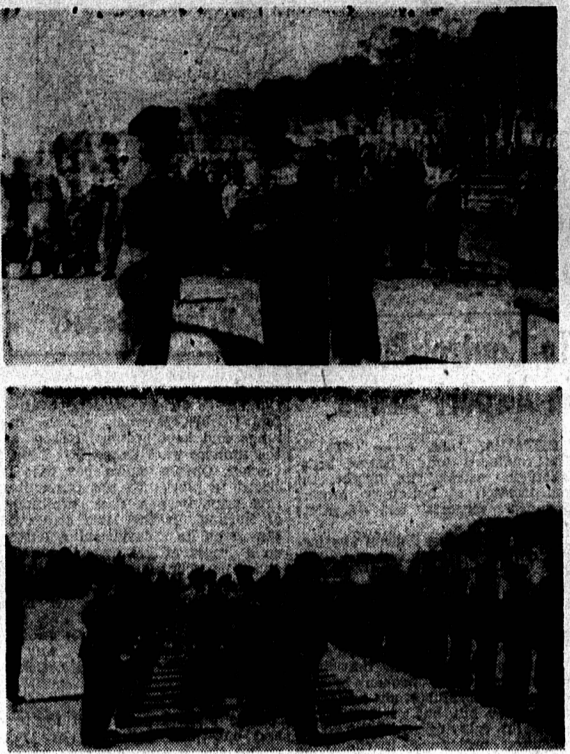
Further Increase In Inquiries From Prospective Visitors Another increase in the number of inquiries received by the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau from prospective visitors was registered during the month of May when a total of 2,731 letters came in the Bureau's mail. The increase was 1,100 over the figure for May last year which was 1,666.

Most of the inquiries came from residents of the United States. Close to 2,000 Americans wrote to the Island bureau requesting vacation literature. The exact number of inquiries from the U. S. during last month was 1,847. A total of 577 Canadians also wrote for literature.

Those who completed plans for definite holiday periods in the province as a result of last month's inquiries amounted to 236. Of this number 125 were Americans and 111 Canadians. The number's mail also included the usual number of school children who sent for literature in connection with class projects. There were also 67 inquiries from other than Canada and the United States. Resort operators in Prince Edward Island reported the heaviest May 24th weekend business they have ever had. The Island bureau at Aulac which opened the weekend of the 24th reports a large number of inquiries for fishing licenses from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia sportsmen.

Fine Display At Red Cross Centre

A most impressive display of beautifully made children's clothing is to be seen at Provincial Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown prior to its being packed in large shipping cases to be forwarded overseas for the needy in the countries still suffering as the result of World War II. These garments are then distributed by the Red Cross in the countries in which there is the greatest need.

Thousands of children's garments of every type are piled around the walls of the large women's workroom at Red Cross headquarters. The job of doing up layettes has already been started. A blanket, several diapers, two vests, a sweater and bonnet, along with soap and baby powder complete the layette which is neatly packed in a terry cloth towel and fastened with half a dozen safety pins. The sweaters are all done up in bundles of five as are the dresses, panties, the overalls, socks, nighties and pyjamas.

All of this work has been done since last October, when the sewing and knitting activities for the current year were begun. Some was done by individuals and various independent women's organizations, but the bulk of it was done by the Women's Institutes of Prince Edward Island who deserve great credit. The garments are cut out at Red Cross headquarters, then distributed across the Island. The Summerside Red Cross branch handles large quantities through its workroom in the Town Hall. Officials at Red Cross House remarked particularly on the improvement in the quality of the work, since it was started during the last war. The completed garments are returned to Red Cross to be sorted out and packed for shipment.

Last year's P.E.I. contribution was sent to Turkey, at that time flooded with refugees. Where this year's work will be sent will not be determined until shipping instructions are received from the National Headquarters. Wherever it does go, many children will be made warmer and happier thanks to the nimble fingers of those who have made such an amazingly large consignment of garments possible.

Three In Cells After Fight Outside Jail

Wild excitement and a free for all fight across the street from the jail last night ended with one man requiring hospital treatment, another confined to bed in his home and three city youths placed in the jail pending their appearance in Police Court this morning. Mr. Bruce Pound, manager of the New Method Cleaners plant on Longwood Avenue, was driving to the plant when a Plymouth coupe with four young men met him on Euston street and yelled at him to dim his lights. He did so and continued to the plant. Just after he arrived he heard a crash and found the driver of the Plymouth had apparently turned and followed him. The young man jumped out of the car and started to give Mr. Pound a beating. A neighbour, Mr. Walter Burhoe, heard the noise and immediately went to Mr. Pound's assistance. He too was attacked and his face badly battered, possibly from a kick. The two sailors across the street ran over to enter the fray and someone else called the City Police. In the police patrol with Sgt. A. J. Dowling and Const. Russell Downe was R.C.M.P. Constables James Arvay. By the time they arrived the fight was in full progress, but the Police soon broke it up. Only one of the four young men was allowed to go as there was no evidence that he had taken any part in the fracas. The other three were lodged in the Queen's County Jail overnight and will appear in Police Court today. Mr. Burhoe was taken to hospital to have his facial injuries attended to and Mr. Pound went to his home to rest.

Italian Film Depicts Life Of Saint Maiden

The feature picture now being shown at the Capital Theatre is creating much interest and is strikingly different from films produced on this continent. Entitled "The Girl of the Marshes", it was filmed in Italy and won six European awards including the grand prize at the 10th International Exhibition of Cinema at Venice in 1949. It is provided with English subtitles and can be readily followed by English-speaking audiences.

The story is a tragic one, and is given with the stark realism of a news reel, but with exquisite feeling and sensitivity. A young Italian with her family, finds it necessary to resist the repeated advances of an over-ambitious farm boy, until one occasion and in the heat of the moment she is seduced. The scene is so horrible with a knife. On her death bed she forgives him, and prays for his soul. It is in fact the authentic story of the girl, Maria Goretti, who was later canonized by Pope Pius XII and became "the Patroness of Purity in Modern Youth."

Ines Orsini, a young Italian actress of about 16 years of age, hitherto unknown, gives a marvellous interpretation of the little girl. The picture is not intended primarily for entertainment, but for the moral lesson it imparts. The scenery is limited to the grim and watery wastes of the marshes of the Corinaldo district of Italy and the costumes are the ragged dress of the farmers of the district. One is impressed by the vibrant life as well as the moral tone of the picture. It is also outstanding for the uncompromising sincerity both of the actors and the producers.

Experimenting With Chemical Weed Killers

Officials of the Department of Public Works and Highways are waiting to determine the efficiency of a chemical used as an experiment last year to burn the weeds along the roadside. They believe that it was successful and that only occasional patches which may have escaped the first spraying will need to be re-done.

The chemical was demonstrated by a company from Woodstock, N.B., and approximately 30 miles of roadside was sprayed. Some of the work was in the vicinity of Tea Hill and some more on the St. Peter's Highway near Wright's Bridge. Whether or not more will be done this year is a matter which is still under consideration by the Department. The stuff used is known by the chemical formula of 2-4-D and 2-4-5-T, but its component parts are unknown here.

Patching Completed Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of the Department, said that practically all the patching work necessary on the roads had been completed. However, he said they were being held up on permanent work by weather conditions. The workmen cannot get on the roads during heavy rain and in recent weeks there have been few days fine enough. Mr. MacKinnon expressed the fear that "we had to be in for another summer like the last one."

Death Yesterday of Dr. W. H. Pethick

The death occurred suddenly at his home in Charlottetown yesterday morning of Dr. William Hammond Pethick, retired senior officer, Health of Animals Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, and widely known and esteemed throughout the Province. A native of Charlottetown, and son of the late Thomas Pethick and Fannie Johnson Pethick, Dr. Pethick was educated at Prince of Wales College, McGill University and the Ontario College of Agriculture. After spending some years in Western Canada he returned to Prince Edward Island where he married Miss Grace Holland, of Bedouen, and where he engaged in private practice as a veterinarian before joining the Dominion Department of Agriculture staff in 1896.

In this work he continued until his retirement as a senior officer in 1928. During his years of service he resided for the most part in Charlottetown, but spent a few years in Antigonish and later served in Montreal and Northern New Brunswick. Dr. Pethick's services were of great value to the livestock industry in connection with the eradication of bovine tuberculosis and the establishment of Prince Edward Island as the first disease-free cattle area in the Dominion. He was also widely esteemed for his personal qualities, and for his unvarying courtesy and conscientiousness in the performance of all his duties.

For many years a member of the Masonic Order, he was also an active worker in St. Paul's Church and was an honorary superintendent of St. Paul's Sunday School. He is survived by his widow and by one son, Mr. Richard H. Pethick, retired manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at New Glasgow, N.S. A brother, Harry S. Pethick, also a former bank manager, and one sister, Etta, Mrs. (Rev.) W. H. Sampson, Saint John, N. B., predeceased him some years ago.
