CELEBRATIONS NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 2. In the House, this afternoon, before going into supply, Sir Richard Cartwright called the attention of the Finance Minister to what he believed to be the serious consequences of statements in the prospectus of the late three per cent. loan negotiated by the High Commissioner in London.

Hon. Mr. Foster, who was absent from the House yesterday when notice was given of this matter, stated that he would communicate with the High Commissioner and furnish the desired information at the earliest possible hour.

The afternoon was consumed in supply over the item of immigration, the Ontario, Quebec, and Manitoba members discussing the protection of immigrants on arrival, the necessity of guarding against undesirable classes, the establishment of a Canadian Castle Garden on the St. Lawrence at Quebec or Montreal, and the cutting off of useless agencies.

In reply to Mr. Mulock, Hon. Mr. Cartwright said the agency at St. John was an important one as emigrants called here by rail as well as by sea, and the Government could see no reason for abolishing it.

Among the harbor and river items was \$40,000 for dredging in the Maritimes Provinces.

Cruelty at Sea.

SIX sailors appeared before United States Commissioner Shields to-day and charged Capt. Hockster and mates Bridge and Campbell of the bark St. Andrew, of St. John, with murdering Elias Neilson, a Norwegian sailor of the crew. The captain and two mates beat Neilson with spikes, and knocked him down with blocks of wood. He died on March 20th, and was buried at sea. The captain and two mates were placed on trial.

Hon. Mr. Pope's Funeral.

OTTAWA, April 2. The funeral of the late Hon. John H. Pope to-day was attended by every member of the Commons, a large representation of the Senate, and a great concourse of citizens. The Railway Department closed and attended the funeral in a body. The floral tributes were chaste and numerous.

Seeding Operations.

WINNIPEG, April 2. Despatches from all parts of the country show that seeding operations are progressing rapidly. Notwithstanding interruption by the late cold spell, the area will be much larger than last year, in many places being from 75 to 100 per cent. greater.

Gross Carelessness.

MONTREAL, April 2. Four hundred letters for city people from Winnipeg and the Maritime Provinces, received here since the end of February, were found in a bag in a corner of the post office this morning. They were forwarded to their addresses.

The Search Unsuccessful.

MONTREAL, April 2. The search of the police expedition for Morrison, the Megantic murderer, has so far been unsuccessful, though it is known that he slept last night within three miles of the police headquarters.

Too Much Married.

BELLEVEILLE, Ont., April 2. The Police Magistrate sentenced Joseph Douglas, bigamist, to two years in the penitentiary. Douglas was married to four women, all of whom are living.

On the Move.

QUEBEC, April 2. Capt. LeMaistre, of the steamer Beaver, has left for Pictou to join his vessel. She is to begin running Friday, a month sooner than last year.

Lord Randolph Declines.

LONDON, April 2. Lord Randolph Churchill has declined to become a candidate for the vacant Parliamentary seat in Birmingham.
