### Fine-Texture Yeast Bread To Bake In Record Time

"I suggest something to please the whole family as a filler-upper—an assortment of easy-to-sweet breads like these I have just baked in the test-kitchen. QUICK METHOD

"Are they not beautiful, Madame, with decorations of nuts, candied cherries, silver dragees? Have they not a marvelous fragrance?"

"They are a new type of yeast bread of fine texture. They are made by a newly-invented, quick method so they are ready to bake in record time—a mere two hours from start to finish!" All measurements are level. Fruit Pin Wheels: Dissolve 1 pkg. active dry yeast in 1/2 c. warm (not hot) water. Add 1 beaten egg, 1 tsp. sugar and 2 1/2 c. biscuit mix. Beat vigorously. Turn onto a surface well-oiled with butter or margarine. Roll into a 12 inch x 12 inch square. Brush with melted butter or margarine, then strew with 1 c. mixed candied fruits. Roll up as for jelly roll. Seal by pinching edge of dough into roll. Cut in 12 slices. Place in oiled 2 1/4 inch by 1 1/4 inch muffin pans. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, from 45 min. to an hour or until doubled in size. Bake 25

### The Russians Acclaim Soprano Lois Marshall

The Canadian soprano, Lois Marshall, and her accompanist Weldon Kijburn have been acclaimed during their recent tour of Russia. Lois Marshall wrote home as follows: "Our first concert was an incredible experience. The audience gave us the works—rhythmic clapping, endless applause. They shouted. They rushed up to the stage and leaned as far as they could, smiling and laughing in sheer delight. They wouldn't go home."

Miss Marshall began her continental tour in September. Scala in Milan was the setting for her debut. After Italy came Russia. Here she was soprano soloist in Beethoven's Missa Solemnis giving an inspired performance. From Italy she came to Russia. After Russia came Amsterdam and then England.

An appreciation of Miss Marshall's artistry is summed up by the critic of The Times.

"The real success of the concert, well worth anybody's trip to Bournemouth, was Miss Lois Marshall's performance of Strauss's four last songs—uplifting ecstasy. When it was all over she threw off in In Questa Reggia in brilliant and imposing style—and gave the impression that a soprano music is beyond her."

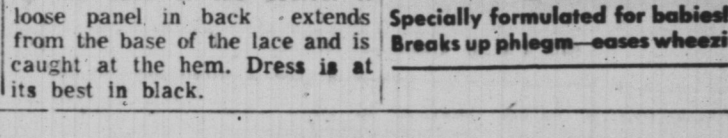
**TELEVISION ADDRESS**
