Politics in New Brunswick.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 6. Political conventions are taking place all over the province.

In Charlotte Mr. Blair has as his candidates Provincial Secretary Mitchell, George Hill, John Russell and O'Brien.

The Opposition convention in St. John nominated A. A. Stockton, Silas Alward, A. C. Smith and Wm. Shaw for the city, and H. McKeown and Wm. Rourke for the county.

The Opposition in Sunbury have renominated W. E. Peley, with Arthur Glasier for his colleague. Mr. Glasier is another revoltor from Blair's party.

A convention of Government supporters at Sackville nominated Hon. A. D. Richards, the Solicitor-General, A. E. Killam, J. W. Y. Smith and Councillor Copp.

Home News From Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Oct. 6. Hon. Donald Ferguson, who recently visited the Northwest, is here on his return to Manitoba.

He has formed a strong company to conduct farming operations on an extensive scale, and his present trip is with a view to the selection of lands.

Official reports from Victoria state that ten Canadian schooners were seized by Russian cruisers, and that skins to the value of \$76,000 were confiscated.

A Desperate Fight.

COFFEYVILLE, Kan., Oct. 6. Six members of the Dalton gang attempted to rob two banks here. The citizens were aroused and a fight ensued.

Robert Grant Dalton and two others of the gang, besides the City Marshal and five other citizens were killed. Emmett, the cashier of the First National Bank, and one other citizen were mortally wounded. Two citizens were slightly injured.

The Insurance Case.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 6. The preliminary hearing in the graveyard insurance case resulted in the Rev. Sydney Welton being committed for trial on one charge of conspiracy to defraud, while his brother, C. B. Welton, and Dr. Randall are committed on two charges relating to separate insurance.

Fatal Collision.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 6. A collision on the Northern Pacific resulted in twelve persons being injured and two killed.

Man Killed.

MONCTON, N. B. Thomas Kinread, aged 72 years, fell off a building yesterday and was killed.
