

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 15. The University opened to-day for the present year. There are 23 applicants for admission to the freshman class, nine being from St. John. The examinations commenced this afternoon and will be concluded on Saturday. There is one female applicant for examination.

UNITED STATES.

LONG BRANCH, Sept. 15. Official Bulletin, 9 a. m.—At the morning dressing at 8.30, the President's temperature was 98.4-10; pulse 100; respiration 20. He passed the night comfortably, sleeping until three o'clock, when he was wakened for two hours, during which his pulse rose to 120, but without the marked elevation of temperature which has characterized febrile disturbances heretofore. After this he slept until morning. More nourishment was given during the night than for several nights past. In reviewing the case since his arrival at Long Branch, it may be said that in spite of various septic accidents which have for several weeks, and do still complicate his case, he has certainly not retrograded, but on the contrary has made some progress towards convalescence.

LONG BRANCH, Sept. 15. The following was sent to-night: To Mr. Lowell, Minister, London: The President's condition does not appear to have undergone any material change to-day. All the symptoms are continuing substantially the same as yesterday, except that the expectation from the right lung is rather less difficult and less profuse. He is still very weak, and as this weakness is due to the condition of the blood, while it continues grave anxiety must also continue.

McVEAGH. BOSTON, Sept. 15. Thirty thousand people were at Beacon Park to-day.

The St. Julien race for \$10,000 was won by Santa Claus, Piedmont second, Wedgewood third, best time 2:17. Only three started; the others were drawn on account of lameness. Santa Claus was entered by Hickcock, the owner of St. Julien.

The running race for \$1,000 was won by Mattie Hunter, the best time being 2:16. The attempt of Marie Trickett to beat her time (2:17) was a success, her best time being 2:16.

The double team Mill Boy and Blondine trotted against the best double team record (2:23), but they only made their best mile in 2:23. St. Julien exhibited but did not trot.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 15. After receiving the Mayor's letter yesterday, Governor McEnery, revoked his proclamation of Tuesday, peace and order having been restored. He thanked the militia for their promptness in reporting for duty, their steady discipline and soldierly conduct.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15. At Creedmore, yesterday, in the Military Team match, the 20th Separate Company of Binghampton, won first prize—a flag valued at \$100. The score was 143. The second prize, \$25, was won by Company A, U. S. Engineers; score 141. Third prize by Company D, 1st regiment Massachusetts infantry; score 141.

COLLINGSVILLE, Sept. 15. Masked burglars last night robbed John McCreary of \$9,000.

OSWEGO, N. Y., Sept. 15. A fire to-night destroyed ten or twelve twelve tenement buildings and a large quantity of lumber in an adjoining yard. Total loss estimated at \$400,000.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

DUBLIN, Sept. 15.

The Land League Convention will be composed of about 1,500 delegates from all parts of the country. Its promoters boast it will be a far more representative assembly than the old Irish parliament. Immediately after the Dublin Convention a series of monster land meetings will be commenced. The first will be held at Irish town, on Sunday, on the very spot where Michael Davitt inaugurated the Land League movement in 1879. Parnell will preside.

The Exhibition committee includes Justice Fitzgerald, Duke of Leinster, Lord O'Hagan and a large number of members of Parliament and Justices of the Peace. Despite the obstruction of the Land League it is believed that the Exhibition will be successful. Archbishop McCabe subscribed £10 towards the Exhibition.

About 1,000 delegates were present at the opening of the National Convention, to-day, including twenty-one members of Parliament. Parnell presided, and made a vigorous speech denouncing the Land Act. He advised farmers to borrow money under the Act to give work to laborers, and pledged himself to head the laborers' movement, if the farmers did not give them fair play.

ROME, Sept. 15.

Rev. Mr. Campbell, canon of St. Peter's Cathedral, last evening, adjured catholicism.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

VENICE, Sept. 15.

The King and Queen of Italy formally opened the Geographical Congress, to-day. Mr. Delesseps delivered the inauguration speech.

LONDON, Sept. 15.

A great fire has broken out in Pentre Colliery in Glamorganshire. No loss of life. The fire is being subdued.

LONDON, Sept. 14.

According to the conditions of the race Troquois, by his victory in the St. Leger, incurs no extra weight for the Czarwitch.

GALETTA, Sept. 15.

The water supply of Tunis is entirely cut off by Arabs. Workmen, accompanied by 500 French troops, have gone to repair the canal. The tank containing a reserved quantity of water will supply Tunis for a week.

PARIS, Sept. 15. Gambetta's organ the Paris asserts that Ferry's cabinet will resign as soon as the decree summoning the new chamber is published, but will remain in office until the new ministry are appointed.
