Mr. Blake in New Brunswick.

The Leader of the Opposition is in New Brunswick. We are glad to hear that he has been well and courteously received.

But even though he be an angel, and commence to talk politics, he cannot, in common fairness, complain of being badly treated if opinionous, hostile to the powers that be, to which he may give utterance, are called in question and criticized.

"Nobody denies Mr. Blake's right to perform the part of a constitutional missionary in the Maritime Provinces, either as a volunteer or in response to calls, loud or little, from Opposition supporters in these Provinces.

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"At Murray Harbor, North, on the 26th ult., after a long and distressing illness, which she bore with christian resignation to the Divine Will, Elizabeth Reid, relict of the late Benjamin Clow, in the 70th year of her age.

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The Monetary Conference.

At the Monetary Conference in Paris it is generally admitted that grave monetary evils exist, that some remedy is urgently needed, and that some of the labours of the conference, such as its ascertainment of the views of States and its collection of materials, have been of the utmost importance.

The French and American delegates at the Conference have submitted a declaration, in which they say that the depreciation and great fluctuations in the value of silver relatively to gold, which of late years have shown themselves, and which continue to exist, have been and are injurious to commerce and general prosperity; that the establishment and maintenance of a fixed relation of value between silver and gold would produce most important benefits to commerce, as would a convention entered into by an important group of States by which they should agree to open their mints to the free and unlimited coinage of silver and gold at a fixed proportion of weight between gold and silver contained in the monetary unit of each metal, and with full legal tender; that the faculty to coin money thus issued would cause and maintain stability in the relative value of the two metals suitable to the interests and requirements of commerce; that a ratio now or of late in use by any commercial nation if adopted by such an important group of States could be maintained, but the adoption of the ratio of 15 1/2 silver to one gold, would accomplish the principal object with less disturbance in the monetary systems to be affected by it than any other ratio; that without considering the effect which might be produced towards the desired object by a lesser combination of States, a combination which should include England, France, Germany, and the United States, with the concurrence of the other States, both European and on the American continent, which this combination would ensure, would be adequate to produce and maintain throughout the commercial world a relation between the two metals that such combination should adopt.
