MR. TARTE'S CAMPAIGN.

(St. John Sun.)

Mr Tarte's organ, La Patrie, of Montreal, gave a warm welcome to Sir Charles Tupper, Mr Foster and Hugh John Macdonald when they arrived at that city. A third of the first page of Monday's paper is used to accuse Hugh John of inspiring certain utterances which appeared two years ago in a Winnipeg paper, and which Mr Macdonald has already repudiated.

Turning to the editorial page we find a leader under a double column "care head," asking Sir Charles Tupper to explain certain things to the people of Quebec. These are the demands:

"Sir Charles, the French-Canadian people love to know from you why you have all the fanatics on your staff

"Explain to the French-Canadians why Clarke Wallace, the high priest of the intolerants, is your right hand man in Ontario.

"Why Mr Hetherington who preached a few months ago to the people of New Brunswick the impious doctrine that the next elections should be run between English and French, Protestants and Catholics, is your chief organizer in New Brunswick?

"Why Mr Hastings, the insulter of the French in Manitoba, is your chief organizer in that province?

"Why the Mail, the Hamilton Spectator, the Toronto News, the St John Sun, the Winnipeg Telegram, the Wiarion Canadian and a number more of your principal organs, regularly outrage the French-Canadians and vomit forth their attacks on our province?

"Explain, Sir Charles, why you have never repudiated a line of the articles, often incendiary and always hateful, of the infamous press at your service?

"The French-Canadians want to know why you allow them to be insulted by your lieutenants and your personal organs, and why all the fanatics go with you."

Another article in the same issue explains why Hugh John has been asked to take part in the present campaign. Mr. Tarte's organ sets forth that Mr Macdonald did nothing to help the Roman Catholics of Manitoba to obtain justice, and that the French-speaking people of that province voted for Greenway, "while the Protestants and Orangemen were taught to vote en masse for Hugh John." La Patrie proceeds to say that Mr. Greenway was beaten because he made too many concessions to the French Canadians, and therefore Hugh John was the man for Sir Charles in the west. It adds: "Hugh John is the hope of the Tory Orange party because he satisfies the fanatical hordes of the Northwest who make him a popular chieftain. This is why they place him in opposition to Mr. Sifton, ex-minister of the Government, who made the agreement with Mr. Greenway on the school question.

"Hugh John has beaten Greenway sold to the Catholics, it is necessary that he should inflict the same penalty on Greenway's former colleague, the minister of the interior. This is the 'why' and the 'because' of the re-entrance into federal politics at the right hand of Sir Charles Tupper."

Still another article describes the St. John conservative meeting, making some thing significant out of the charge that Sir Charles was greeted here by a band playing "He is an Englishman." Mr. Monk is accused of having denounced Mr. Tarte for reasonable and patriotic speeches in France "and of having affirmed that the French-Canadians were ready to pour out their blood for the British empire."

All through there is the same appeal to prejudice, the same unfair and false statements calculated to make the English Conservatives hated and feared by French-Canadians who did not know the facts; the same studied attempt to hold up to aversion and contempt the French Conservatives who support Sir Charles Tupper and are friendly with Hugh John Macdonald.

A CHALLENGE.

Sir,—In last night's issue of your paper I was surprised to find the following letter, and if you will kindly grant me space I would like to make a few remarks concerning it and its writer:

Sir,—Why is it that while forty-five per cent. of the population of Charlottetown is Catholic not one could be found competent to take office in the Young Liberal Association last night?

YOUNG LIBERAL.

If "Young Liberal" means to assert that among the Catholics of this city there cannot be found one competent to take the office to which he refers, he makes a contemptible, lying statement. Whether one could be found means-spirited enough to take office in any association composed of such men as "Young Liberal" is a different matter. Perhaps he considers their little gathering to be representative of the Catholic population; if so I am inclined to think he is mistaken. As a Catholic, and on behalf of the Catholics of Charlottetown, I challenge him to come out, man-fashion, over his own signature, and name the office he means, and I will name as many Catholics as he wishes capable of filling that office. But I will not promise that they would be contemptible enough to accept that office.

DEERING PRIZES AT PARIS.

The Deering Harvester Company received notification from abroad that it was awarded the grand prize, as well as two gold and one silver medal, at the Paris Exposition. These were the highest awards obtainable.

The six Deering exhibits excited much comment, not only from American and foreign visitors, but were inspected by President Loubert in person, who complimented Mr. James Deering upon the enterprise displayed by the manufacturing company of which he is a member.

The Deering Harvester Company was designated by the French Government to make the retrospective exhibit of harvesting machinery, showing the improvements in that line during the past century. This exhibit was the most complete ever attempted, and probably no one ever again will be willing to expend the amount of money and patience necessary to equal it. In addition, the Deering Harvester Company exhibited in the United States annex a full line of the machines manufactured by it as well as a separate exhibit of twine, showing the process of cultivating fibres and manufacturing them into this important staple.

A number of automatic metal working machines, such as are employed in the Deering shops, were exhibited. Some of these machines do the work of fifteen hands.

One of the features of the now famous corn-kichen was a miniature Deering corn harvester, illustrating the method of harvesting corn in America.

The model of the Deering Harvester works, of which there were two, were so unique and interesting that one of them was installed in the Department of Civil Engineering.—Farm Implement News, Chicago.
