Hawks Swamp Islanders 7-1

MONCTON (CP)—Moncton Hawks ran wild in the first and third periods, slamming in three goals in each to swamp Charlottetown Islanders 7-1 in a fast and rugged Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League game here Saturday. The odd goal was scored by Moncton in the second.

Dewar Thomson and Bert Hirschfeld led the attack with two goals apiece. Bob Bowness, Tod Campeau and Ross Watson shot the others. Veteran Roy (Buck) Whitlock notched the lone Charlottetown goal late in the first period. It was his 30th of the year and his 390th of his career which spans over nine years.

The Hawks showed their best stuff of the season at home before the largest crowd of the campaign. Moncton goalie Nick Pidsodny and right-winger Orin Carver tangled just before the end of the game and both were banished with majors.

The triumph shoved Moncton Hawks back into a first-place tie with the Prince Edward Island team. Both have 57 points. Amherst comes next with 49 while Fredericton Capitals hold down the cellar position with 45.

MONTRÉAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens needed a big working margin Saturday night to stave off a late uprising by Chicago Black Hawks who were finally defeated 5-3.

Montreal's usually low-scoring contingent took charge, Dickie Moore scoring twice and Floyd Curry and Tom Johnson one each. Ken Mosdell was the only high-ranking scorer to get into the act. Harry Watson, Eddie Litzberger and Dave Creighton scored for the Hawks.

The victory, coupled with Detroit's loss to Toronto, left Canadiens alone at the top of the National League standings. The Hawks and Canadian went at it again Sunday night in Chicago.

Montreal ran up a 5-1 lead in the final, when the Hawks all-out offensive had the home crowd of 14,360 jittery.

BOSTON (AP)—Hal Laycoe broke a 1-1 tie early in the second period and Boston Bruins went on to defeat New York Rangers 3-1 in a National Hockey League game here Saturday night.

Laycoe's winning goal came at 5:15 when he took a picture pass from Ed Sanford and beat Ranger goalie Lorne Worsley with a 18-footer.

Doug Mohs sent the Bruins into a 1-0 lead in the first period and a little over a minute later Dean Prentice tied the score with a 15-foot shot. It was Prentice's 12th goal, sixth against the Bruins.

Lorne Ferguson made it 3-1 for Boston after just 38 seconds of the third period when he grabbed a behind-the-net pass from Cal Gardner and scored from the edge of the crease.

Canadiens In 5-3 Win Over Black Hawks

CHICAGO (AP)—Montreal's Canadiens maintained their two-point National Hockey League lead by beating the Chicago Black Hawks 5-3 at the stadium here Sunday night.

The triumph was Montreal's 10th over the last place Black Hawks in 12 contests. Two games have ended in ties.

Montreal's attack was paced by Jean Beliveau, the league scoring leader and Kenny Mosdell. Beliveau picked up a goal and two assists, Mosdell two goals.

Mosdell's second marker came in a wild final minute in which three goals were scored. Dave Creighton of the Black Hawks picked up the other two, both on passes from Nick Mickowski.

Other Montreal scorers were Jackie Leclair and Dickie Moore. Harry Watson of the Black Hawks also scored in the final period as the Hawks put on one of their finest rallies of the season.

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit Red Wings, rebounding from a disastrous road trip, cracked a three-game losing streak with a 4-0 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs Sunday night as goalie Terry Sawchuk registered his 10th shutout—most in the National Hockey League this season.

Returning home after successive losses in New York, Boston, and Toronto, the Red Wings were sharp in their skating and shooting. They gave Sawchuk strong protection and the Red Wing netminder was called on to make only 14 stops.

NEW BURY, Eng. (AP)—Queen Mother Elizabeth gained her first success in the national hunt season Saturday as her Grand National hope M'As-Tu-Vu romped to a 15-length victory in the three-mile Ogbourne Handicap steeplechase here.

M'As-Tu-Vu covered the course in 6:44.8 to win the first prize of £204. The nine-year-old brown gelding carried 153 pounds and started at odds of 11 to 4.

Pointsmen, top weight with 162 pounds and 8-to-4 favorite, fell. There were only four runners. Blow Horn, 5 to 1, was second, and Steel Lock 100 to 6 third.

Sign For Bout In Edmonton Jan. 31

EDMONTON, (CP)—Johnny Arthur, heavyweight boxer from Johannesburg, South Africa, has agreed to make an Edmonton ring appearance Jan. 31.

Arthur, who stopped Jimmy Walls of Cliffside, N. J., in three rounds of a 10-rounder in Vancouver Thursday, agreed to the bout through his manager in a telephone call Friday with Edmonton boxing promoter Jack Berry.

Berry said Arthur's opponent will be chosen from a field of three, Rex Layne of Utah, Chubby Wright of New York and Eddie Cameron, Florida state heavyweight champion.

Canada, U. S. Football Heads Map Course

PHILADELPHIA (CP)—Canadian and American football officials mapped a program Saturday for halting international player raids but then had to suspend the agreements because of a dispute over whether the pact should apply to new imports already signed for the 1955 season.

At a two-hour morning meeting, commissioner Bert Bell of the National Football League and officials of the Big Four reached agreement on five major points, including a promise to honor contracts and options.

However, during two further hours of bargaining, they were unable to settle the vital question of retroactivity, on which all the agreements hinged. The meeting broke up with the understanding that the two leagues would pursue their efforts to reach agreement on this matter.

Both Canadian and American officials expressed optimism that a final agreement would be reached. "We will come to an agreement, possibly within the next month or sooner," said Big Four president Ralph Cooper of Hamilton.

Islanders Out To Increase Lead Tonight Against Caps

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Mr. Jim MacDonald, manager of the Moncton club, stormed from the meeting when the three other clubs refused to listen to the defence of the Moncton club. Mr. MacDonald later stated that he was signing a counter protest with the league against the use of Lucien Gilbert by the Fredericton Capitals.

The argument arose over the eligibility of player Ross Watson who recently joined the Moncton team. Amherst and Charlottetown protested violently to the use of the right-winger and took their case to the MAHA where several negative answers were forwarded. MacDonald claimed that before bringing in Watson, from Cincinnati of the IHL, he checked with MAHA secretary Charlie Campbell and that Campbell gave him the O.K. Three or four days elapsed before Watson was given a playing card by the MAHA.

In a press statement, MacDonald said the Moncton club was well aware that they could register several more protests but as yet they are undecided to do so as the protest would "in all probability wreck the four-team league and cause all the teams to be suspended from Allan Cup competition this year."

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Welshmen Best Celtics 67-34

The Prince of Wales College squad defeated the YMCA Celtics 67-34 in the only City Basketball League fixture over the week-end, played at the PWC auditorium on Saturday evening.

Alan MacKenzie and Joe Revell, both of the Welshmen, each had a total of 20 points while high-scoring Mark Ladner collected 19 points. For the Celtics, Ron Atkinson had 14 points.

Trotters Win Over Acadians

The Sport Lodge Trotters of Charlottetown, Saturday night defeated the Moncton Acadians 61-60 in a very fast encounter played in the Hub City. The Charlottetownians, led by Donnie MacLean with 31 points, overcame a 12 point deficit in the first half to edge the Acadians in the finale.

Runs Spectacular Indoor Mile

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Gunnar Nielsen of Denmark ran a spectacular 4:09.5 indoor mile Saturday night to beat Wes Santee of the United States by 15 yards in the Evening Star games. It was one of the fastest miles ever raced over a flat board indoor track.

Nielsen evened his score with Santee, the former Kansas ace, who beat him in the Inquirer games in Philadelphia the previous night.

The Dane's time was nearly four seconds better than the old meet mark set last year by Len Trues of Ohio State, who covered the distance in 4:13.4.

In the pole vault, Rev. Bob Richards set a meet mark by leaping 15 feet, four inches. It was the 61st time Richards had broken the 15-foot mark in his career.
