

### Three Injured In Collision Near Cardigan

The near head-on collision Monday morning of a three-ton gravel truck and a half-ton 1952 Ford truck, sent three persons to the King's County Hospital. The accident occurred at Alley's Hill near Cardigan, shortly after twelve midnight.

Mr. George James of Morell, driver of the gravel truck, was uninjured. Mr. Roddie MacKenzie, Primrose, driver of the other vehicle, suffered a knee injury, facial and head lacerations. His wife, a passenger in the same truck, received five broken ribs and a fracture of the left arm, while the second passenger, Mr. MacKenzie's father, Mr. Wallace MacKenzie, received facial lacerations and undetermined injuries.

The truck in which the MacKenzie's were passengers, was damaged beyond repair. The damage to the gravel truck was to the extent of \$200.00. The Montague detachment of the R. C. M. P. is investigating the accident.
