Supreme Court—Prince County.

SUMMERSIDE, WEDNESDAY, Oct. 4.

To-day was the first day for the trial of
Jury cases. The Court opened at ten
o'clock sharp, and continued without inter-
mission (except a half hour at dinner time),
until after six o'clock. The Judge seems
determined to lose as little time as possible,
and in this he is right. Too much time
is often lost by delays in opening and wait-
ing on lawyers and suitors who are not
ready when they should be.

The first case called was—*The President,
Directors, and Company of the Bank of
Prince Edward Island, versus Joseph R.
Breckin, an absent or absconding Debtor.* A
verdict was found for \$10,185.72, being
the amount of the defendant's overdrawn
account.—Hazard for plaintiffs.

*Judith Dolaney and others vs. the Mer-
chants Bank of Halifax.*—A verdict was
found in this case against the plaintiffs by
direction of the Court—McLennan for
plaintiffs; Hodgson, Q. C., for defendants.
Patrick Blake and ano. vs. L. B. Disney,
absent Debtor.—Verdict for plaintiffs for
\$864.23.—Sullivan, Q. C., for plaintiffs.

Murdock McLeod vs. Thomas Richards,
absent Debtor.—Verdict for plaintiff for
\$36.74.—Wright for plaintiff.
John A. McLeod vs. William Clark,
absent Debtor.—Verdict for plaintiff for
\$770.24.

Donald Matheson vs. Archibald McKenzie.
—No defence. Verdict for \$36.58. Haz-
ard for plaintiff, Martin for defendant.

James E. Wiggins vs. John R. Larkins.
—This case is now on and will likely occupy
part of to-morrow, unless the parties settle
in the meantime which is not improbable.
Warburton & Davies, Q. C., for plaintiff.
C. Palmer, Q. C., and D. C. McLeod for
defendant.

A number of cases have been confessed
or otherwise settled and the court is not
expected to last over Friday.

Our Legislative Council Abolition.

The *Packet*, of Orilla, Ont., has the
following:—The question of the abolition
of the Legislative Council is exciting
much discussion in Prince Edward Island
the Grits working night and day to main-
tain the second Chamber. The *Sum-
merside Journal* the most abusive of the
Opposition newspapers in the Province,
has the following:—"THE EXAMINER
gives us a second instalment of its cut-
and-dried platitudes about Ontario hav-
ing but one Chamber, as a reason why
this province should have but one. The
cases are entirely different, as we shall
elsewhere prove, premising here that
Ontario has a court of General Reference
which costs much more than our Legis-
lative Council." This is news indeed,
and is an illustration of the adage that
one must go from home for that com-
modity. It is strange that if there is
such a thing as a "Court of General
Reference," the people of this Province
should have remained ignorant of its
existence.

The Situation in Egypt.

The *Sun's* London special dated Oct.
1, says:—The situation in Egypt is most
embarrassing. The disaffection of the
population is complete, and the Khedive
and his adherents and the British are
everywhere regarded with distrust and
hostility. It is asserted that a note will
be addressed in a few days to the powers
requesting their opinion as to the best
course to pursue. Some encouragement
in this direction has undoubtedly been
derived from the cordial tone adopted by
Germany, and which has been noted in
France with astonishment and disgust.
Public opinion in England is divided;
the more hot-headed and impetuous wish
to see Egypt turned into another India.
These people are sure the great powers
would not interfere, and they urge Mr.
Gladstone to defy all Europe. But Mr.
Gladstone is not likely to adopt such a
policy. It is more than likely that the
policy of the British Government will be
to make Egypt a peaceful and prosperous
country, and thus secure the interest of
England in that quarter of the globe
from all interference in the future.

Gladstone and Northcote.

Telegraphic despatches dated London,
Oct. 4th, says:—Gladstone replying to
an address presented to him at Pen
Maenmawr, yesterday, referred to the
question of procedure in the Commons.
He said the House could never meet the
tremendous calls upon its energies unless
it could shake off all timidity and fear of
cant phrases and set itself resolutely to
the task of bringing procedure into har-
mony with the calls upon it. Referring
to Egyptian affairs Gladstone said he
thanked God for the success of the British
in Egypt. He thanked the army
there and its skilful general. The war
had proved that the army was composed
of men as brave as their forefathers every-
where. The war had been carried out
from love of peace and on the principles
of peace. In concluding Gladstone said
he trusted that Egypt would again be
prosperous and happy. His remarks
were received with prolonged cheers. A
telegram from Glasgow on the same day
informs us that Sir Stafford Northcote,
in a speech there to-day, said he believed
the Egyptian war unnecessary and un-
justifiable. Had the Government made
a firm stand at the commencement it
might have been averted.

Intercolonial Railway Accidents.

The express from Campbellton, on
Wednesday night, ran over a section man
named Crossman, who was walking on
the track near Dalhousie, killing him
instantly, deceased was a son of section
foreman Crossman at Canaan. On the
same day a Frenchman named Thaddeus
Terrio, aged twenty-three, and who lives
at Shediac with his wife and two chil-
dren, met with a serious accident. He,
it seems, was employed as a brakeman
on a ballast train. At Memramcook
station yesterday morning the train
stopped a short time, and Terrio got off.
Soon after the conductor got orders to
leave, and the train was put in motion.
Terrio was not on board at the time, and
was late in getting on. Instead of wait-
ing to board the rear he jumped between
the van, and missed his hold. In his
descent his left arm struck the track, and
the wheels passed over it. The poor
fellow lost his left arm and two of his
toes.

Murder Diabolical.

The murder for which Edward Hovey
was found guilty in New York the other
day was one of the most diabolical on
record. Mrs. Vermilyea, his sister-in-
law, gave an asylum to Hovey and his
wife, her sister, and their sick child.
Hovey had been a shiftless, querulous
fellow, and had failed to support his
family. On the day before the shooting
he furnished a revolver threateningly.
Mrs. Vermilyea took it from him and
hid it. Hovey vowed to be revenged.
He pawned a coat on the following day,
and with the money thus obtained bought
a pistol. He concealed this in his
pocket, and returning to his sister-in-
law's house, shot her. His own child
died of fright. Yet he boasted of the
crime, and when he heard the jury's ver-
dict he said, sneeringly, "That's just the
verdict I expected!"

Of Interest to Lumbermen.

It will be interesting for lumbermen
and forwarders to know that in connec-
tion with the late disturbances in relation
to the entering of the different thicknesses
of lumber in the United States from
Canada, more especially in relation to
what is commonly known as split deals,
that the United States Treasury Depart-
ment at Washington have issued the fol-
lowing decision:—Half inch and under
3/4 inch is to be called 3/4 inch; 3/4 inch
and under 1 inch is to be called 1 inch;
1 inch and under 1 1/4 inch is to be called
1 1/4 inch; 1 1/4 inch and under 1 1/2 inch is to
be called 1 1/2 inch, and so on upwards.—
News.

There is great grumbling in Newfound-
land over the discriminating duty of two
shillings a quintal levied upon Newfound-
land codfish in Spain. Strong representa-
tions have failed to induce the British
Government to take any action in the
matter. It seems that the duty has been
imposed in retaliation for the high British
wine duties. A St. John's paper says:—
"It is clear that Newfoundland is made to
suffer for supposed wrong on the part of
England; and we can only hope for relief
when the two nations arrive at a settle-
ment of their difference."

In consequence of the protests of Great
Britain, the United States, and Sweden,
the Spanish Government will in all pro-
bability reduce the maximum of the fines
imposed for irregularities on vessels arriving
at Spanish ports.
