food from subsidized steamship companies. The products were taken into St. John's and from there loaded on small boats and taken to the outports. The Dominion Government subsidized these companies by the amount of one and one-quarter million dollars a year and the people in the outports had to pay twice the normal price for their food, he added.

"The Dominion Government would not give us a subsidy because we were a Crown corporation," he stated in speaking of the Eskimo. "But we did not do so badly. On \$900,000 worth of trade the loss was very small, somewhere around one and a half per cent."

"Before the Eskimo was brought here the Dominion Government subsidy amounted to \$4,400 a trip to Newfoundland," he said in answer to a question by Mr. Phillip Matheson. "If we had run to St. John's with the Eskimo we would not have had any losses," he stated. He did not think that the new purchasers would run to the Newfoundland outports.

Speaking about the trade opportunities here, he compared this Province to an oasis in the middle of a desert. We have big possibilities with no one producing food within five hundred miles of us.

Reports Keen Interest In Dragger Operations

King's County fishermen, influenced by the operations of the Prince Edward Island dragger, Souris II, are showing an increasing interest in dragger fishing, it was indicated by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources during the debate on the Draft Address in the Legislature yesterday.

"I feel that the Souris II has been reasonably successful, although not outstandingly so," he stated, "but a great many fishermen from the eastern part of the Province have been applying to the Loan Board for money with which to purchase draggers."

Questioned about the number of applications he stated that there were five, and there were at least five men required before an application could be submitted. Asked by Mr. R. R. Bell about the application of North Rustico fishermen last year for a dragger, he stated that he believed it was still on file. "We did not want to endanger the dragger experiment on account of the hazards in this harbour," he explained.

He believed that the exports from the Province last year were equal to those of the best years. He stated that 612 telegrams had been received in the trade office during the year.

The Eskimo, he stated, had made 19 trips from the Province during the past season and transported 4,200 tons of produce. About 2,750 tons were exported to Newfoundland and 1,446 tons had come into the Province on the boat.

Large quantities of goods were taken to Sydney by truck and shipped to Newfoundland by boat. He recounted that the trade director had received many enquiries for butter late in the year and that many enquiries had been received as a result of the department's booth at the Maritime Winter Fair last November.

An industrial survey of the Province is being made by Messrs. B. Graham Rogers, Director of Transportation, and W. E. Agnew, Director of Trade, the Minister stated. He commended the work of both men.

Following is an outline of some of the work done by the two machines: 204 jobs done; 190 1/2 acres cleared; 1,873 chains ditched; six and a half acres levelled; private lanes ditched, 171 chains; water holes and cellars excavated, 10 each; dams filled; land for schools, churches and other buildings graded; and springs dug out that had been dry for some years.

Over \$11,000 was paid out in fox, crow and skunk bounties, he stated. 7,445 skunk and 793 crows were turned in, 856 foxes and 793 crows feet.

The Fish and Game Department had taken in a revenue in licenses of \$10,391, he added. Two dams were constructed by the Department, one at Coleman, the other at Pisquid.

Mr. Cullen condemned the practice of people and companies from outside the Province purchasing lands here and holding them without putting them in use. Land is too cheap in some areas of the Province," he said. "Large companies can afford to put hundreds of thousands of dollars into land and buy large areas. This will be bad for the future."

Forestry Legislation He stated that the Government was considering introduction of some legislation on forestry. Premier Jones interjected that there is nothing to prevent a man from selling wood off his land and avoiding the payment of income tax.

Morris Deacon, Fieldman, spoke on "Community Organizations" and stressed the set up of grain clubs. The meeting closed with the National Anthem.

Mr. H. J. MacDonald, Dairy Superintendent, gave an interesting talk to a group of 30 or more Junior Farmers at Bear River South school on Thursday, March 8th. He stressed the value of good type dairy cows, of testing the milk and of cutting down the cost of feed and labor. The chairman was James Whelan and a vote of thanks was tendered to the speaker.

A few Junior Farmers gathered at Farmington School on Friday, March 9th to see a demonstration of milk testing and to hear a talk on the value of milk testing, given by Mr. Earle Adams, Assistant Dairy Superintendent. It is regrettable that this meeting was no more widely advertised as this talk was one which would be valuable to any milk producer.

A public meeting sponsored by the Linkletter Calf Club gathered at the school, Friday evening, March 9th to see films shown by Morris Deacon, Fieldman. These films were on loan from the National Film Board, the titles being: "Hog Family Supreme"; "Let's All Sing Together"; "Square Dance Medley"; "Maple Sugar Time"; "Broncho Busters."

A short talk on club work was given by the fieldman and a few questions from the club members were cleared up. The meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.

Education Week At Stella Maris School

During Education Week the classes of Stella Maris School, North Rustico, were visited by their Supervisor, Mr. F. E. Doiron, B.A. As usual both teachers and pupils found this visitation very helpful and encouraging, for, as an examiner Mr. Doiron never fails to create in the classroom an atmosphere conducive to responsiveness on the part of the pupils.

Thursday of Education Week was Parents' Day in the School. A large number of enthusiastic fathers and mothers visited the classrooms. It was a source of genuine satisfaction to them to visit their children in their respective classrooms and to see the work that is being done there. The tiny tots of Grade I sang very sweetly and showed their ability in number work. Grades II and III exhibited their work in sewing. The pupils of Grade IV gave a Physical Drill demonstration which was enjoyed immensely by the visitors. Grades V and VI excelled in singing English and French songs. The pupils of Grade VII had a very interesting spelling match. Grades VIII and IX showed their knowledge of Geography. Grade X pupils proved their skill in Algebra and those of Grade XI met the visitors in the auditorium.

Mr. Doiron expressed his great pleasure on meeting so many of the parents in the school. He congratulated them on the interest they thus showed in the education of their children and gave them an inspiring talk on co-operation between parents and teachers.

worked to the disadvantage of the Maritimes by limiting markets abroad and increasing the cost of imported supplies. It is impossible to say how great the United States market for Maritime goods might have been, the commission declared, because it cannot be assumed that the U. S. would have admitted Canadian goods duty-free.

As to the argument by some Maritime spokesmen that the tariff tended to concentrate industry in Central Canada, the commission said one of the tendencies of industry is to seek the centre of the community, even where there is no tariff protection. That gave a transportation advantage.

No Chrome On Cars, Wooden Covers For Washing Machines Condition Improves

OTTAWA, March 15 — (CP) — A wide range of metals which go into the production of washing machines, electric stoves, and virtually every other durable product has been officially declared "essential" by the government. Action was taken through the promulgation of an order-in-council in the Canada Gazette and means that the government now has the power to enforce compulsory rationing. Officials today emphasized, however, that this did not mean that any compulsory rationing orders would be issued immediately.

Declaring the metals "essential" gives the government authority to go ahead with planning for the so-called range of "austerity" civilian durable goods. Chrome likely will disappear from automobile trim and wood may replace metal as washing machine covers. These are only a few of the items that may be hit by the program to save metals, fight inflation and provide more materials for the accelerated defence program. Metals declared "essential" for the purpose of compulsory control are: Aluminum, nickel, copper, lead, zinc, cobalt, antimony, tin, tungsten, molybdenum and such minerals as asbestos and industrial diamonds.
