### A Country Garden

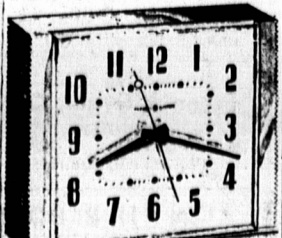

In the warm summer days. There are many beautiful plants that do well in a shady garden. Columbinas, ferns, and tuberous begonias do well here and there are many perennials like phlox and delphinium that enjoy some shade and last much longer in flower. Some seasons when it is dry and hot a garden that is shady is a blessing. I am always thankful that there is a shady garden here with the woods nearby. Foxglove is blooming at the edge of this wood where seed was scattered some years ago and nothing more done about it. Every year I am surprised to see tall spikes of rose and creamy white flowers under the branches of the beech-wood trees.
