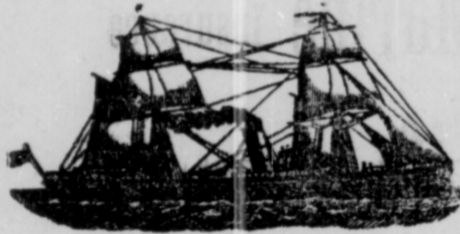

SOIL AND CLIMATE OF CANADA.

PROFESSOR ROBERTSON, in the course of his last report, says:

"The soil of Canada is not excelled by that of any land where the people follow farming for a living. But fertility of soil alone is not a source or assurance of wealth to the people who live on it. It must be managed by skilful, industrious, economical farmers, with methods adapted to meet the changed and still changing demands of such markets as are accessible.

"Canada has a climate admirably adapted for growing very large quantities per acre of such plants as are suitable for the cheap production of cattle products. No country is superior to Canada as a home for cattle, swine, poultry, horses and sheep. The bracing weather of Canadian winters is followed by the warmth and humidity of genial summers, under which crops grow in almost tropical luxuriance. At the same time the cool evenings and nights give to plants a robustness of quality which are not to be found in tropical regions, and also make life for the people comfortable and healthful.

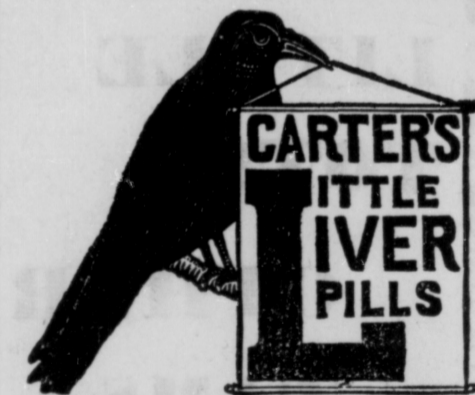
"All the world knows that Canadian-grown wheat is the finest for bread-making that is to be found anywhere. The oats and oatmeal of Canada are unsurpassed in substance and flavour; and the peas, beans and rye are second to none. While the matchless quality of Canadian cereals is acknowledged, the superior character of many other Canadian food products has been overlooked. Wheat, flour, oatmeal and peas, are not perishable food products and have found their way into distant markets into condition as good, or almost as good, as when they left the granary and the mill. It is quite otherwise with many other things. Until the cold storage system was introduced, the damaging influence of warm weather on animal products such as butter, eggs, meats, cheese and poultry, was not adequately guarded against.

In all the settled districts of Canada lying eastward of the great lakes and westward of the Rocky Mountains, apples of the finest quality in flavour, in substance, in colour and in size can be grown; and in areas containing hundreds of square miles, pears, peaches and grapes are grown in large quantities in the open air. Everywhere the climate is favourable to the growth of small fruits, such as strawberries, raspberries, currants, gooseberries and many others.

It is thus possible to follow such mixed or diversified farming as will best maintain the fertility of the soil, give employment to a large rural population for the area occupied, and permit the sale of concentrated or relatively high price products. It can be profitable in proportion to the wisdom and skill with which the intelligence and energy of the people are applied.

TO REDUCE THE ABDOMEN.

There is an old fashioned rhyme which it will hurt none of us to repeat and to ponder:

Hold up your head and bridle your chin,
Turn out your toes and your stomach hold in.

"And your stomach hold in!" That is the crucial test of bodily excellence, and many there be that fail to meet it. It can never be done until control of the abdominal muscles is acquired, and for this control—a difficult one to acquire—every effort must be made, and all the mind directed to the effort. Here is one of the rules by which it may be accomplished: Stand in an erect position for half an hour every day, and for five or six minutes at a time practise drawing the abdomen in and letting it out.

This is one of the hardest of all things to do, and requires much patience. One will be astonished to discover at first how unresponsive the muscles are, and how next to impossible it seems to make one move. When a little flexibility has been acquired, then hold the abdomen in and lift the chest and draw down the shoulders. Keeping the shoulders down, begin again to contract and expand the abdomen. Then begin again, holding in the abdomen, lifting the chest, and drawing down the shoulders; you will find your whole body straightened as well. Nothing is strained by these movements. When the muscles have become flexible one will discover that when one leans over, even to pick something up from the floor, one no longer does so without involuntarily contracting the abdominal muscles, until day or day a greater compactness in those regions is gained, and the "stomach" learns to do the work for itself. Its size in the meantime is reduced. Many persons have gone down several inches in the abdomen by following no other prescription than this.

To "hold up your head" properly, you must learn not to indulge in the contortions of those persons who bend the body backward, throwing the line of the spine out of gear, in their well-meant efforts to get the head erect. Nothing can exceed the ugliness and the awkwardness of the result, for the whole body is thrown into abnormal lines. The proper way is this—a rule, by the way, which is given by a well known teacher to her pupils—a teacher who combines with a knowledge of the body and its laws unusual mental endowments: Feel the ball of your feet as you stand and press the floor; then tip the body forward, using the hip joint hinges, and without bending the spine.

The right tip has been acquired when an imaginary straight line falling from the bust would touch the ends of the toes. Then simply lift the head until the eye is brought to a place where one can look straight out from the pupils, and not from under the lids. The eye level controls the poise of the head, and regulates its relation to the spine. Walk retaining the same position and always letting the chest in the advance, as though one were really following that. When this rule is followed a large abdomen is concealed, and almost forgotten; it is certainly never obtruded.—Harper's Bazar.

—L'Ever new of Quebec gives currency to the report, said to be on good authority, that the Government has in effect abandoned the idea of a fast Atlantic mail service, and instead, has begun negotiations with the Allan and Dominion lines for a service of sixteen or seventeen knot boats, which would make the run across in about seven days, instead of the ten or eleven that is now taken. Various figures are mentioned for the subsidy, which, it is thought, will be in the neighbourhood of \$200,000 or \$250,000. The idea of a 20-knot service or better is seemingly given up.

BRITAIN'S INTERVENTION.

Would be the placing of her fleet at the Disposal of the United States.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—The Spectator says, it has reliable information that M. Hanotaux, late French Minister of Foreign Affairs, had designated a plan of intervention between Spain and the United States, which he in turn proposed to the continental powers. The latter agreed to the proposal, and it was presumed that Great Britain would also assent.

The French Government heard with the most unfeigned surprise, however, that the only intervention that Great Britain would participate in would be that of placing her fleet at the disposal of the President of the United States.

New York, Aug. 30.—Commenting on the above, Mr. Ford, in his cabled letter to the Tribune says—

"The optimistic Spectator is not satisfied with explaining today that the British Government, when approached early in the spring by M. Hanotaux on the subject of European intervention in the Cuban affair gave warning that it would place its fleet at the disposal of President McKinley. It also goes to the length of advocating in a leading article the abrogation of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, and the substitution for it of another treaty, by which England and America shall mutually bind themselves to allow no Government except that of the United States States to make or control any canal across the Isthmus between North and South America. This article goes even beyond Mr Blaine's famous letters to Mr Lowell on the canal question, over which Lord Granville quibbled, and the English press ragged and imagined vain things, 17 years ago.

"The Spectator's article, which deserves to be printed in large type in every American newspaper, is a convincing demonstration of English friendliness, and if acted upon by the Foreign Office here, would remove the only serious question remaining unsettled between the two countries. It would leave the Suez and Nicaragua canals subject to the same general principles of regulation in peace and war, with one under the control of England and the other under the control of the United States.

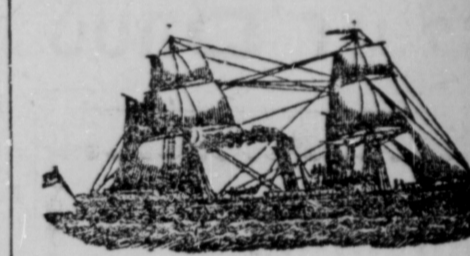
