WEDNESDAY

Dr. J. H. Shaw, Provincial Pathologist, was elected president of the Prince Edward Island Medical Society at the closing session of the two-day annual business meeting on Saturday. The meeting Saturday morning heard reports from various committee chairmen and concluded its business prior to the afternoon discussions. The visiting doctors were luncheon guests at the P. E. I. Hospital at noon and then continued their gathering with the annual Medical Ball held at Dalway.

A group of approximately 45 delegates from all parts of the world to the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association will arrive here by train tonight for a two day visit to this Province. They will be met at the station by a number of members of the Provincial Cabinet. Tomorrow morning they will pay the customary courtesy calls and during their visit to Confederation Chamber will meet the rest of the members of the Legislative Council. They will then call on His Honor Lieutenant Governor T.W.L. Prowse before going to visit the Bunbury Farm of Premier J. Walter Jones.

Mr. Earle G. Cannon, Summerside was elected president of the Provincial Command at the annual convention held in the Legion Home here yesterday. He replaces Maj. A. H. Peake. The largely attended meeting of the local command of the Canadian Legion also named Lieut. Col. J. A. MacPhee, also of Summerside, as the honorary president. Other officers named included: Ist. vice president, E. Foch MacDonald, Souris; 2nd vice president, W. L. Miller, Kensington; honorary treasurer, Arthur H. Corney, Summerside; secretary, James Walker, Charlottetown; chaplain, T. E. MacNutt, Charlottetown; chairman, Bayfield Ellis, O'Leary; vice chairman, Vincent King, Charlottetown. Appointed as Dominion representative was Major J. A. MacDonald, Cardigan.

There was another increase right across the board in August for the amount of traffic handled by the Northumberland Ferries Limited. The number of passengers increased by 2,313, with auto buses up 215 and trucks 272. The totals in each case, with the August 1951 figures in brackets, are: Passengers 23,451 (21,238); auto buses 5,774 (5,559); trucks 1,183 (911). Traffic figures for the entire period of navigation from May to the end of August this year also show an increase over the comparable period of 1951. The totals are: Passengers 57,341 (55,674); auto buses 14,620 (14,479); trucks 3,732 (3,248). The increases this year respectively are 1,667; 141; and 490.

Mr. Paul Hansen, superintendent of the Island Fertilizer Company plant, accompanied by his wife and children, Gerda and Niels, arrived in Charlottetown on Friday after having completed a trip to Denmark which lasted for two months. The party, which composed part of a group of 119 making a cruise trip, sailed from New York on June 3rd, for Copenhagen, where they arrived after an unusual Atlantic crossing, it being perfectly calm throughout. A formal reception by city officials and the gathering of friends from many parts of the country added greatly to the enjoyment of the voyagers, many of whom had not visited their birthplace since leaving there a quarter of a century previous.

The sudden death of Mr. Bruce Butler, Charlottetown, occurred last night when he was found dead at the foot of the stairs of his rooming house at 112 Richmond Street. The body was reportedly found by two boys about 8:30. They told Mrs. Roy MacKinnon, a neighbor, who in turn called her husband. Mr. MacKinnon examined the man but could find no heartbeat and notified the City Police. Com. The late Mr. Butler, 67, was a native of Peters Road and had represented the Fourth District of Kings in the Provincial Legislature from 1923 to 1927. In the latter year he became a member without portfolio in the Saunders Government. He also served for a time as bursar at Falconwood Hospital.

Mrs. J. J. Hornby, widow of the late Mr. J. J. Hornby, lobster packer and shipper of this city, died yesterday after a long illness. She was 73.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Theude Butler, Little Sands, and a daughter, Mrs. Gordon McLean, Little Sands. Funeral arrangements had not been announced last night.

A native of Dartmouth, N. S., the former Miss May Camilla Hornsby, came to this Province when she was seven years old and received her education in local schools. She was a long time member of St. Elizabeth's Aid Society and of Holy Redeemer Parish. Funeral arrangements have not been completed pending word from several absent members of the family.

The steady upward trend in the number of enrolments at city schools continued yesterday as the four of them once more opened their doors for another term. The increase this year was 205 over the high of last year with 2,375 entering yesterday compared to the 2,170 last year. It is expected that this total will be increased as several children who are presently ill or away report to classes.

Seaman Vernon Sorenson and Sgt. Berg who deserted their Swedish ship, M.V. I. W. Winck at Georgetown on August 21st, have not as yet been found, it was learned last evening.

Queen Square School had the highest registration total with 664 compared to 644 a year ago. West Kent this year had 540 while in 1951 there were 431. Prince Street had 618 as against 550, and Rochford Square had 553 compared to the 540 of a year ago. The beginners classes generally

account for the heavy increases. The figures for the youngsters with last year's totals in brackets are: Kent Square 88 (76); West Kent 65 (30); Prince Street 72 (64); and Rochford Square 68 (54).

285 students enrolled at the Montague School yesterday morning for the opening day of the new school year, a number which is an all time record. Nor is this the first number, as it is probable several more may enrol before next week. 39 little tots are making their first appearance this year, a number which immediately resulted in a special meeting of the Trustee Board last evening to deal with a further problem of overcrowding. At present there are ten rooms in use, six on the first floor, three in the basement, and one room elsewhere in the town. With the large grade enrolment, a division of this grade is necessary, and as a consequence another room and teacher will be needed, making eleven rooms in use during the present year.

THURSDAY

A large group of delegates to the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association arrived by train last evening to be greeted by Premier J. Walter Jones. The visitors come from all parts of the Empire and expressed a keen interest in this Province. Heading the United Kingdom delegates is Rt. Hon. Lord Llewellyn, C. B. E., M. C., who spoke informally of his pleasure in the visit and his hope of seeing much more of the Province during today's whirlwind tour.

Among those with him is Sir Jocelyn Lucas who will be favorably remembered by countless island servicemen for the help he gave to many at the Overseas League in London. Sir Jocelyn said last night he hoped to have the pleasure of seeing some of the friends he made during the war years. Arriving in the city for a week's holiday was Miss Lyle Creelman, R.N., recognized as one of the outstanding nurses in the world. She is a sister of Dr. P. A. Creelman of this city and has just returned from three years at Geneva where she was Nursing Consultant to the World Health Organization.

Miss Creelman, a native of Nova Scotia, makes her home in Vancouver when she is in Canada. She trained in the Vancouver General Hospital and later studied at the University of British Columbia. She was Director of Nursing of the Metropolitan Health in Vancouver prior to joining U.N.R. A. in 1944 and going to Germany with that world-wide organization.

FRIDAY

Delegates of contending states sat amicably side by side with other representatives of British Commonwealth countries yesterday as they enjoyed the scenery and hospitality of Prince Edward Island and were enthusiastic in their expressions of appreciation.

They were all members to the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association now visiting this Province as part of their tour of Canada. Among them were men and women from such widely scattered parts of Empire as Pakistan and British Guiana, India and Canada. Here for a two-day call the delegates, who arrived Wednesday night, spent a full day yesterday as they visited the Confederation Chamber, Government House, Bunbury Farm, the Experimental Fox, the Summerside Experimental Fox Station and the National Park.

Acting Lieut. A. K. MacKenzie has been appointed temporary commanding officer of H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte pending the naming of a permanent commanding officer. His appointment was effective September 1 and he succeeds Lieut. Commander J. J. Trainor who resigned to enter the permanent Naval Force.

Announcement of the temporary appointment came last night from Naval Service Headquarters, Ottawa.

Thanks for the welcome accorded them in this "happy island" and for the hospitality shown by everyone, was expressed on behalf of all the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association delegates last night by the Rt. Hon. Lord Llewellyn, C.B.E., M.C., leader of the group, at a dinner tendered them at Stanhope Beach Inn by the Provincial Legislature.

Mr. C. E. Shaw, recently retired Chief Inspector of the Fruit and Vegetable Division, Charlottetown, was the guest of honour at a dinner provided by the inspectors and office staff with whom he was for many years associated. The function took place last evening at the St. Edward's Restaurant. Mr. Shaw was presented with an address accompanied by a beautiful La-Z-Boy chair and a Rolex wrist watch. Mrs. Shaw, who was unable to attend through a slight indisposition, was also suitably remembered with a presentation of American Beauty roses, which Mr. Shaw suitably acknowledged along with the personal tokens of regard.

"It has been said we have a limited market for turnips, but that is not so," said Mr. R. E. Robinson, Chief of Fruit and Vegetable Service, Ottawa, in an address before an assembly of producers, shippers and buyers, in the Prince of Wales College hall yesterday.

"We have a competitive market, however, which calls for a selective quality of product, more than ever before," Mr. Robinson added. "It is the policy and desire of the Department I represent to help in every way to achieve that end. We know full well however, that a meeting of this kind can give the Department direction and prove most helpful in many ways."

Many other interested growers, dealers and shippers took part in the discussion, all of whom expressed appreciation at what is being done, and with the information developed at the meeting.
