SAD DEATH AT TRYON—The sad death of Mr. Nathan Wood, age about fifty years, occurred Thursday night at Tryon. The late Mr. Wood who had been in ill health for the past two months left his home at noon Thursday, telling his wife that he would take a walk in the adjoining woods. For a time came around and as he did not return a search party went out after him but was prevented from searching the woods on account of the approaching darkness. Yesterday morning about 7 o'clock the body of the unfortunate man was discovered by Messrs. F. Leard, C. Holland, and others hanging from a tree in the woods some three quarters of a mile from his home. Mental depression caused by ill health was no doubt responsible for the tragedy, though at the time Mr. Woods left home on Thursday he appeared in cheerful spirits. Coroner Dr. N. R. Boyver of Crapaud was called in and after viewing the remains decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The deceased was respected in the community in which he lived and was a kind husband and father. He leaves to mourn a wife and two children to whom the deep sympathy of the province will be extended.

\$20,000 A Minute For the Winner

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 14.—More than twenty thousand dollars a minute will be paid to the owner of the winner in the Kentucky derby here next Saturday for the two minutes more or less the horse is in action. The gross value of the stake of the ten horses to face the barrier will be \$57,300 which includes the purse of fifty thousand dollars offered by the club fees from 92 nominees at 25 dollars each and five hundred each from ten starters. The winner takes it all except six thousand dollars to the owner of the second horse; three thousand in the third and one thousand to the 4th leaving forty seven thousand three hundred dollars in prize money for the three bred which noses out the field.

Dreams of negro stable boys that out of Kentucky once again will come the winner of the super classic of the turf gave way to stern reality in the form of Morvich, favorite of the East with the announcement from the E. R. Bradley stable that "only by a miracle" could Busy American the acknowledged hope of the West face the barrier in the Kentucky derby.

Coming hard upon the report of Busy American's final derby trial yesterday, the announcement cast a gloom over the Bradley quarters and incidentally sent the Morvich stock to a higher mark. However, the Bradley stable still boasts two good candidates and according to trainer Thompson, Morvich will not take first place from Bet Moses and By Gosh.

Hope has not been given up for Busy American as Trainer Thompson said he was banking on the miracle. TAKE ON MORE MEN IN SYDNEY—Sixty additional men have been taken on at the steel plant, and the rod mill of the Dominion Iron & Steel Corporation goes on double shift Monday night. Business in steel continues to show a slight improvement here.
