Hockey enthusiasts have been fortunate during the past three years to get such helpful instruction on hockey through the Department of Physical Fitness which holds an annual school in the fall and now the ball players, too, will be given similar opportunities.

Recent announcements of two tournament dates in local tennis circles indicate that the racket wielding sport will hold the spotlight here in local sporting interest during this week and next. Representatives of the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association, Jimmy Palmer, released the dates Monday for the first Charlottetown junior tourney to be held here for a good many years. The tourney will be held at the Holy Redeemer Club on Thursday and Friday of this week.

Junior tourneys have been confined pretty much to inter-club competition in recent years but this year, through the sponsorship of the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association, both City and Provincial competitions will be held. It is all part of a Canada-wide program under the C. L. T. A. to promote and develop junior tennis in the Dominion and Mr. Palmer has been appointed to take charge of the program here. Assisted by a voluntary staff of local tennis enthusiasts, an interscholastic tournament is also planned on the program, and should do much to revive the interest among the younger enthusiasts here.

The City tournament is the first step of this summer's program and officials are looking forward to a good turnout for the events here on Thursday and Friday. The competitions are open to all junior players in the City and entries are being received at the Bike Shop. There will be two separate sections held during the tourney in both boys and girls singles divisions—those 18 years and under and those 15 years and under.

The other big date announced was made by the Charlottetown Tennis Club which will sponsor the annual Provincial Closed Senior championships at the club's courts commencing on Wednesday, July 18th. Title will be declared in all divisions of men's and ladies' singles, men's and ladies' doubles and mixed doubles. A strong representation from the R.C.A.F. station at Summerside, who added so much to the success of the tourney last year, will be on hand to contest leading honors here next week.
