TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Carnival of Crime. CINCINNATI, June 6. On Saturday J. H. Fields, a farmer, of Marysville, Ky., fatally shot his wife for alleged improper conduct, fatally shot his two sons who interfered, and then cut his own throat. All are dead. HURON, Dak., June 6. Simon Nelson shot and killed Mrs. Shaw, her son, aged 15, and her sister, aged 22, this morning. Nelson also shot a man named Kilsby, fatally wounding him, after which he returned home and placing the muzzle of a rifle to his temple blew out his own brains. CINCINNATI, O., June 6. This afternoon Fred Bauer shot Pauline Bogenschauer and then shot Mrs. Zulla, and immediately shot and killed himself. Mrs. Bogenschauer had been married, but separated from her husband, and had been living with Bauer. PITTSBURG, Pa., June 6. Fred Harman, aged 35, a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, has been considered sober and intelligent. His wife recently had the baby baptised secretly by a priest. When the husband heard of it he beat his wife so that she will probably die. He killed the little daughter and cut his own throat. FLOODS IN HUNGARY. VIENNA, June 6. The efforts of thousands of workmen for three days, and the use of tons upon tons of stones and earth have not proved sufficient to stop the gap in the dyke in the submerged district of Hungary. LOST IN A CYCLONE. CALCUTTA, June 6. It is proved beyond a doubt that the steamer Sir John Lawrence was lost in the recent cyclone. The steamer carried 730 passengers and it is believed all were lost. ANOTHER COLLISION. LONDON, June 6. A collision took place in the Channel between the British bark Hamburg and the British steamer Turk. The steamer was sunk and there were four persons drowned. Rum Did It. HALIFAX, June 6.
