

# Officials Searching For Peace Formula

nesian and Malaysian officials are meeting here in search of a formula to satisfy both countries' honor in reaching a peaceful end to Indonesia's three-year-long confrontation of Malaysia, informed sources have reported.

The officials began discussions after delegation leaders, Indonesian Foreign Minister Adam Malik and Malaysian Deputy Prime Minister Tun Abdul Razak, were reported to have reached broad agreement Monday on ending the undeclared war.

Sources said the dominant issue is whether the Malaysian Borneo states of Sabah and Sarawak had freely decided to join the federation. When the British-sponsored federation was formed in 1963 Indonesia claimed it was a neo-colonialist conspiracy and began the confrontation.

Sources said officials are looking for the most suitable means of demonstrating that Sabah and Sarawak had voluntarily joined the federation according to their people's wishes.

Malik said in Jakarta May 19 that all Malaysia has to do is to convince Indonesia that this was the case.

Tied together with the Sabah and Sarawak issue is Malaysia's insistence that its sovereignty over all the federated territories must not be infringed upon by any foreign country, sources said.

## NDP Suggestions Suffer Defeat Report

OTTAWA (CP)—New Democrat MPs fired a salvo of amendments at the government in the Commons without scoring a hit.

They saw one suggestion on what department should be responsible for the RCMP defeated and another on a consumer affairs then was ruled out of order.

The NDP tossed the amendments in during debate of a government bill to reorganize the responsibilities of certain departments. One key move is to create a solicitor-general's department, which would take over from the justice department responsibility for the RCMP.

Andrew Brewin (NDP—Toronto—Greenwood) moved an amendment to keep the federal police force under the justice department, where he maintained it belongs.

That was voted down 66 to 42. The motion drew some Conservative support but not enough to overcome Liberal and Social Credit votes.

Then the Commons started looking at the proposed registrar-general's department, which would handle bankruptcies, trademark registration and patents under the proposed reorganization.

Grace MacInnis (NDP—Vancouver-Kingsway) proposed an amendment that would hand consumer affairs to the registrar-general. That went down 28 to 8, gaining support only from the eight New Democrat MPs in the House at the time.

When Stanley Knowles (NDP—Winnipeg North Centre) proposed another amendment seeking the same end, it would have handed the registrar-general the power to review prices and "matters of concern" to consumers.

Deputy Speaker Herman M. Batten ruled that one out of order.

## Attorney States Policy

MONTREAL (CP)—An inquiry into land purchases for the Quebec Liquor Board will continue as long as there is any possibility of finding out more about the operations of Cangro (Bermuda) Ltd., a government attorney said here.

The hearing was adjourned Monday until June 6 by Mr. Justice Arthur Smith, appointed by the provincial cabinet to inquire into the purchases.

But Attorney Laurent Belanger said it will continue as long as there is any hope of further revelations about Cangro, which realised about \$618,000 of the deal.

The adjournment will allow for the arrival of a lawyer from London, England, who is expected to testify at the hearings.

During Monday's session Mr. Belanger said he was still awaiting a definite answer from Charles T. Collis, secretary of Property Holdings Ltd. (formerly known as Cangro (Bermuda) Ltd.) about testifying before the inquiry.

The inquiry was ordered by the provincial government after it had been reported that the liquor board had paid \$2,122,381 for land in the Montreal suburb of LaSalle which 10 days earlier had been sold for \$959,247.

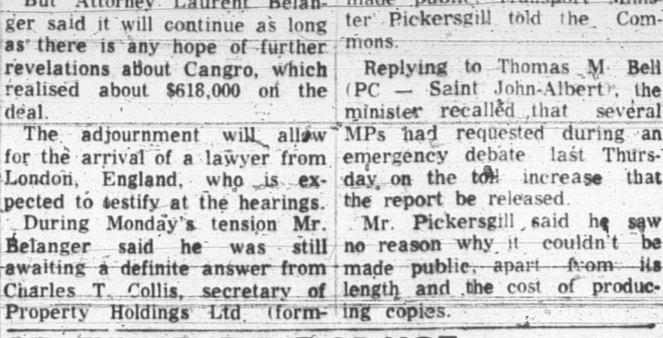
## Scheduled For Release

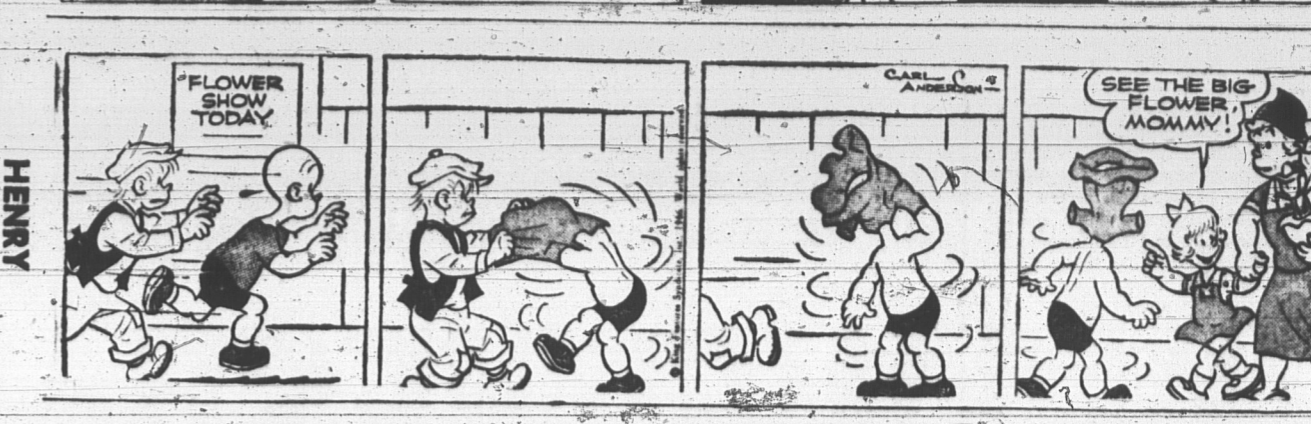

## Stormy Debate Seen On Pollution Control

NORTH BAY (CP)—A demand for full co-operation between Ontario and federal authorities to implement effective pollution control brought stormy discussion at a policy session of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce here.

The subject was brought to the floor of the forum by the Sudbury Chamber of Commerce and was discussed by Fern Gratton and Dr. Bob Ghent, Sudbury medical officer of health.

Dr. Ghent challenged chamber statements of policy as tending to be vague and generalized.

Pollution must be looked upon a much broader basis than it has been, and consideration of people must be the main issue. "People are talking about animals, fish and trees in trouble. They should talk about people for a change."

It would require years and generations of constant study to see the full extent of pollution. A problem is the multiplicity of departments handling it, without provision for integration and co-operation.

He said a central federal authority could make manufacturers directly responsible for standards, move toward reclamation of polluted and sterile areas, and bring together all organizations working to solve the problems.

The Sudbury proposal outlined by Mr. Gratton pointed to the "great multiplicity of legislation, commissions and various government departments involved in the many facets of pollution and investigation and control." It recommended that Ontario co-operate fully with federal authorities to investigate existing legislation and to develop and implement "truly effective measures" for environmental pollution control.

Entry by the government into such fields of enterprise as joint laundry service could lead to other encroachments into the realm of private business, a delegate charged in other discussions.

Jack Moore of Hamilton asked the delegates to amend the OCC's policy statement to restrict public ownership in fields efficiently and competitively serviced by private enterprise.

The motion was defeated after it was pointed out that the amendment in effect was a repetition of policy statements already on the books.
