Baltimore was rained out of a doubleheader with California, only the fifth time major league baseball has been rained out in Los Angeles. In the other AL games, Chicago trimmed Cleveland 7-5, New York stopped Detroit 3-0 and Boston nipped Kansas City 3-2.

In the National League, San Francisco maintained its 3 1/2 game lead with a 4-2 triumph over Milwaukee. Hal Lanier snapped a 2-2 tie in the eighth, racing home from first base on a bunt while the Braves' Joe Torre argued with umpire Billy Williams.
