NEARLY AN ACCIDENT.—On Friday afternoon a party of excursionists were enjoying themselves on board the steam yacht Lady Lansdowne. When near Hickey's Wharf one of the number noticed near the shore what they thought to be a number of wild geese. A capture was proposed and the guns put in readiness. The yacht steamed nearer when Mr. Burt, a sporting man of Mount Stewart, suspecting the design of the party, bobbed up serenely amidst the numerous decoys which he had arrayed to lure destruction to the unfortunate flocks. He narrowly escaped injury, as the firearm was pointed directly towards him at the time he arose.

EXHIBITION NOTES.—The Secretary's office opened at the Drill Shed this morning, and clerks are busy all day receiving exhibits at the buildings in farm implements, manufactured articles of all kinds, fine arts, fish, etc. To-morrow, up to 2 o'clock, the exhibits in cheese, butter, grain, seeds, roots, vegetables, etc., will be received at the Exhibition buildings. Mr. Wm. J. Palmer's fine herd of Hereford cattle will be on exhibition on the Fair grounds on Wednesday and Thursday next. As these are the first and only cattle of this celebrated breed ever exhibited at any of our Provincial shows, all lovers of good cattle should not fail to come and see them.

A CASE OF BRUTALITY.—Rather strange logic and worse law was heard in the Recorder's Court, Montreal, a few days ago, where a man named Doran was up for beating and seriously wounding his wife. It appears that the inhuman husband had thrown his wife on the floor and for several minutes rained blow after blow upon the face and body of his unfortunate better half. The poor woman could hardly stand up in the box to give her testimony against her brutal husband, but the advocate for the defence coolly observed, "My client perhaps inflicted a more serious punishment than his wife merited, but she deserved to be wounded because she had refused to give a cup of tea to her husband." "Doran had to fight," continued the man of law, "against three women—his wife, mother-in-law and step-daughter—and was not justified in defending himself as he did." However, his honor did not think so, and Doran was condemned to five months imprisonment and \$30 fine, or five additional months in durance vile.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

PERILS OF THE SEA.

A Splendid Steamer in Jeopardy.

NARROW ESCAPE.

MONCTON, Sept. 30. The Allan Line steamer Parisian, Capt. Smith, R. N., commander, had a narrow escape last Thursday afternoon. About three o'clock on the afternoon of Wednesday, the 26th, the ship was steaming at half speed. The fog, which had prevailed during the first five days of the passage, lightened up for a few minutes, when rocks and breakers were discovered dead ahead, apparently about three lengths of the ship away. The engines were promptly reversed and the ship backed astern at full speed. The fog immediately shut down again. The ship was then headed for sea, and after steaming of for about an hour, was hove to awaiting the fog to break or for daylight, but there was no change in the situation on Thursday. This state of affairs continued until Friday morning, when the fog, to some extent, lifted. The ship was run alternately slow and half speed. On Friday afternoon the Beaver Line steamer Lake Haron, bound from Quebec for Liverpool, emerged from the fog and ran across the bows of the Parisian. Shortly afterwards the fog cleared and the Parisian was at full speed. The Parisian arrived at Rimouski at 7 o'clock Sunday morning.

YELLOW JACK AT SEA

Ship's Crew in a Sad Plight.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 30. The Norwegian brig, Hardi, Capt. Nielson, from Cuba for Boston, with sugar, was spoken off Delaware Capes Thursday morning with yellow fever raging on board. Two of the crew had died, while three others were on the point of death. To add to the misery, Captain Nielson said they were completely out of provisions. A pilot sent them off provisions. The four men who were well on board were worn out from overwork, but together with Capt. Nielson they thought it would be best to proceed as far north as possible to get into cool weather. It is doubtful whether the brigantine will reach Boston, and it is probable that they will go into Vineyard Haven or some other harbor along the coast.

A Defaulting Bank Official

Meets His Deserts.

MONTREAL, Sept. 29. C. A. Pitcher, late Teller in the Union Bank of Providence, R. I., was, this morning, sentenced to seven years' imprisonment in the penitentiary for bringing stolen money into Canada. His Honor said there was no doubt but that Pitcher had committed a grave crime, for he had done his best to wreck the bank. Not only had he defrauded in the States, but he had tried the same game in Montreal by purchasing a bill of exchange with stolen money. Pitcher received his sentence unmoved.

Tenants' Defence.

MONTREAL, Sept. 30. The objects of the Tenants' Defence Association, which is to be inaugurated next week, are to place a check upon the exactions of unscrupulous landlords and speculators, to exempt from taxation all tenants and dwelling houses and their conveniences to the value of \$2,000 or less. The abolition of the lease system, etc., to enable a tenant, on application to the building inspector, to have reasonable repairs done at the expense of the landlord.

Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 30. There has been a decrease the past day or two in the havoc made by yellow fever, and it has wonderfully cheered the people. Many think the worst is over. The distress, however, is as great as ever. There were 79 new cases to-day and 6 deaths. The total number of cases to date is 2,626, and 255 deaths.
