A first class ordinary Diploma will be given to those who have taken the first and second years' course, and who have made at least 75 per cent. of the number of marks attainable in the written examinations for the ordinary diploma. 3rd. A second class ordinary Diploma will be given to those who, under the same circumstances have gained at least 60 per cent. in the examinations in Latin and Greek, and classics, English, French, mathematics, science and history.

POLICE COURT.

Another Rumseller Fined \$300.

On information laid by Officer Carter, George Offer was arraigned before his honor Monday morning, on the charge of violation of the liquor regulation act between July 1st and Aug. 23rd. Mr. J. H. Good appeared as counsel for the defendant. Following is a summary of the evidence.  
Brenton F. Longworth said he had been through the lower part of Offer's house. He drank liquor in the sitting room, but paid for it at the bar. The last time he did so was Saturday week. There were three others in the sitting room at the time. He ordered beer and whisky. It was bought to the sitting room by a waiter. He went round to the bar through the front door. He had been in the bar several times but bought no liquor in the house.  
Oliver Mason had been in the house several times. He was in the day Mr. Longworth stood the treat. The last time he was in was Friday last. He drank liquor in the sitting room three or four times, but did not know how it came there. He could not buy any liquor in the house. He could drink it there.  
R. Toombs said he was in Offer's place the day Mr. Longworth stood the treat. He (Mr. Toombs) stood the treat also. He ordered the liquor in the sitting room and paid for it there. It was in the afternoon. He gave the order to a woman who was visiting the house. He was in the room about an hour. He was in the bar several times since the first of July.  
Robert Dewar said he was in Offer's place when Longworth and Toombs called for the drinks. Mr. Toombs ordered liquor from a woman who was passing through the sitting room. She brought in the liquor and set it on the table. He did not see the woman supply liquor at any other time. She brought the liquor in through the back door. There were no other treats.  
Andrew Doyle, jr., said he had purchased liquor in the bar several times but never in the house.  
Arthur Newman also drank liquor in the sitting room. He bought liquor at the bar and carried it into the house and drank it there. He told Offer at the time he bought it where he was going to drink it.  
Offer was allowed on the witness stand. He said that the woman who carried the liquor in for Mr. Toombs was only on a visit to his house. She is a relative of his sister-in-law's husband. He had never given her permission to serve liquor to anyone outside the bar. She could only get into the bar from the street. He could not or would not swear whether any liquor was drunk in his house. He did not bother his head to find out. After he sold the liquor he considered it none of his business where the purchaser drank it.  
His Honor summed up the evidence and said that it revealed nothing beyond the open and flagrant violation of the law. He therefore imposed a fine of \$100 or 2 months' imprisonment.  
Offer asked for time to make an appeal to the Supreme Court Judges. He was granted 10 days to do so.
