Testing the Water.—The Summerside Journal reports: "On Saturday last, Mr. R. Hunt, Chairman of the Town Council, forwarded fifteen bottles of water, from as many different wells and tanks of this town to Mr. Frank T. Shutt, M. A., F. I. C., F. C. S., Chemist of the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, for chemical test and analysis. In view of the prevalence of typhoid fever here, which many attribute to bad water, there is a commendable one. It will be a good thing to know just what sort of water the citizens are obtaining from the present source of supply."

Senator Sherman Renews His Attack.—Senator Sherman renewed his attack and refused to be convinced even by the oratory of the Iowa Senator. He wanted the Senate to do the straight-forward thing, and not to fiddle about it. "Give the Fair \$5,000,000, and do not make believe that you are deceiving yourselves in giving it a 70-cent silver dollar, or two 35-cent half-dollars." OTTAWA, Aug. 30.

At the Canadian Bisley to-day the weather was exceedingly hot. Our boys were very successful. In the first match Lieut. Moore and Gunr. McLaren won good prizes. In the Hamilton powder match, Sergt. Davidson and Corp. Baird won good prizes. In the McLaughlin match, Sergt. Davidson won \$10 and Capt. Longworth \$4. In the standing match, Staff-Sergt. Longworth, Sergt. Davidson and Corp. Baird won good prizes. Sergt. J. M. Davidson is within five points of the aggregate with Capt. Longworth and Corp. Baird in the bunch.

OTTAWA, Aug. 31.

The riflemen made some splendid scores yesterday. First in the competition was standing match, seven rounds at 200 yards. The first prize of \$20 was captured by Capt. Griffith, of the 37th Battalion. Smaller prizes were won by Sergt. Longworth, Sergt. Davison and Corp. Baird, all of Charlottetown.

The afternoon was devoted to the Dominion of Canada match at three ranges. Private W. G. Mitchell, of Port Elgin, won the first prize, a badge and \$30, making 94 out of a possible 105. HALIFAX, Aug. 31.

R. B. Gardner, of Boston, the manager of the steamer Worcester, who is at Pictou, was arrested there yesterday by the Canadian Atlantic Steamship Company for an amount alleged to be owing that company. He gave bonds and was released. The Marine and Fisheries department have decided to send by next steamer to Sable Island three carrier pigeons for service between there and Halifax. The birds after months of training, are now considered fit for work. The pigeons have been taken to Canso twice and liberated, and have returned in very quick time to this city.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Aug. 29.—A firm here has received an order from the authorities of Hamburg for 30,000 gallons of disinfecting fluid and 35 tons of disinfecting powder.

SOUTHAMPTON, Aug. 29.—Many complaints are being made here that the authorities are not taking adequate precautions to guard against cholera. Fishing vessels arriving from infected ports, such as Havre, enter Southampton without any inspection of them or their crews.

ATHENS, Ga., Aug. 30.—A farmer named Wilson, living in Madison County, on returning home a few days ago, from mill, found his wife lying on the floor insensible with four dead children about her. When the mother was restored to consciousness she said she had taken the baby to the spring, leaving the other children in the house. Hearing their cries she put down the baby and hurried back to the house, where she found two dead and the other dying. The living one said they had been poking their fingers through a crack in the floor and a hen had been picking at them. The mother went back to the spring after her baby and found it had fallen into the water and was drowned. The third child was dead when she got back to the house, and the mother swooned away. Investigation showed that the supposed hen was a rattlesnake.

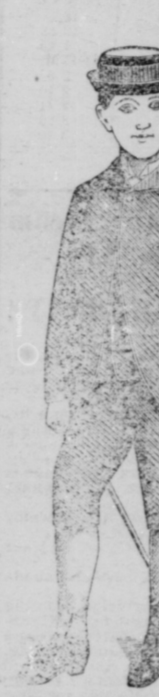
