Quebec Aces Fall On Bad Times

VANCOUVER (CP)—Defence-man Nelson Bulloch says Quebec Aces of the Quebec Hockey League have fallen on financially bad times and players with the professional club have been getting only part of their salaries during recent weeks.

"We were being paid only part of our salaries," said Bulloch, who arrived here during the weekend to join New Westminster Royals of the Western Hockey League.

"Crowds were so bad," he said in an interview. "I don't think Joe Crozier, our manager, could have done anything else, but it was still tough on the players."

ASK FOR SALARIES
Bulloch said that last Friday, the day he left Quebec City to come west, the club's players called a meeting and demanded that Crozier pay up all salaries in full within two games or place them elsewhere in pro hockey.

Bulloch said Crozier and Pench Milach, Toronto Maple Leafs general manager, are 51-per-cent owners of the Aces.

Ted Williams Credits Eyes For Great Hitting Record

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Ask any pitcher what makes Ted Williams one of the greatest hitters baseball has ever known and he'll tell you his eyes and great power of concentration. Well, pitchers, here's news—bad news for you. The 40-year-old Williams, who looks more like 21, says his concentration powers are better than ever. As for his eyes, here's a story to take to bed with you on a cold, hot stove league night: The slugging Boston Red Sox outfielder strode into the armory where he is demonstrating some fishing equipment. A fellow operating an eye-testing machine asked him to try it out.

"Sure, why not," said Ted, who prides himself on his 20-20 vision. Ted peered into the instrument. The man asked him: "Where is the black-filled circle, up or down, right or left?" "Right," said Ted quickly. "No, it's left," said the eye man. "Right," insisted Ted.

Two others took a look. Each said it was right. The operator of the machine started to protest again when suddenly he exclaimed, "Oops, my fault. I have the wrong picture in. It's right." Williams, after asserting he would play-again in 1959, said he didn't feel his baseball age. "I think it's how you think and how you act, not what the date says. I think I can do everything I ever did and I mean that with no ifs, ands, or buts."

The American League batting champion said age so far as he was concerned increased his powers of concentration. "You get more settled as you get older in this game. You're able to sit back, relax and take things in, concentrate more. You're not over-anxious."

Asked if he might play longer if he switched to first base, Williams said he thought it was a pretty good idea for good hitting older players to prolong their careers by playing a more stay-put position. He said, however, it was too late for him.

He is shooting at one more record. He'd like to reach 500 home runs. Ted has 482 now, fourth in history to Babe Ruth, (714), Jimmy Fox (534), and Lou Gehrig (493).

Regan, claimed for the \$15,000 waiver price, is expected to join the National Hockey League Leafs at Montreal Thursday.

Leaf general manager George Imlach said his club was not interested in the other Bruins—Real Chevrefils, Norm Johnson and Earl Reibel.

But he said Regan, a right winger and centre, "should give us more stability at centre ice and he could help us out on the point on our power play."

Bruins got Regan from Quebec Aces of the Quebec League in 1956. During the 1956-57 season he scored 14 goals, picked up 19 assists and was the NHL rookie of the year. Last year he missed 11 games with injuries but had 12 goals and 28 assists. He added three goals and eight assists in playoffs.
